8	General Description:	
9	This bill modifies the School Grading Act.	
10	Highlighted Provisions:	
11	This bill:	
12	defines terms;	
13	 specifies that the school grading system shall be known and referred to as "school 	
14	grading";	
15	modifies the criteria and procedures for determining school grades, including:	
16	 the calculation of learning growth; and 	
17	• the measurement of high school students' college and career readiness; and	
18	 requires the State Board of Education to annually develop a personal student 	
19	achievement report for each public school student to be delivered to the student's	
20	parent or guardian.

46	(1) "High school" means a school that includes grade 12.

160	may earn as calculated under Section 53A-1-1109 as follows:		
161	(a) A, 100% - [90%] <u>80%;</u>		
162	(b) B, [89% - 80%] <u>79% - 70%;</u>		
163	(c) C, [79% - 70%] <u>69% - 60%;</u>
