ITEM 1

Question:

Referring to Section V.4.a.vi [page 5] - OLRGC was asked to provide all cell phone and land line numbers that will be ported in order to verify number portability. OLRGC was asked whether the LEGISLATURE is willing to consider other options (such as call-forwarding from a ported land-line) to provide local numbers for cell phones in rural areas, such as Parowan, Kanab and Ephraim.

The following is a list of area codes with prefixes that the LEGISLATURE would prefer to be able to add for some cell phones (other prefixes that serve the same local calling area as the following prefixes may also be acceptable):

435-559, 435-283, 435-644

It is the goal of the LEGISLATURE that constituents in each legislative district in Utah be able to call the cell phone number of the legislator for that district by making a local call. The LEGISLATURE has been unable to do this in the past in some of the rural areas like Parowan, Kanab and Ephraim. The LEGISLATURE is willing to consider other creative solutions, including affordable call-forwarding options, to make this possible.

ITEM 2

Question:

Other Requirements, b,ii [page 6] - How many extra phones, batteries, battery covers, home chargers, car chargers, and/or holsters with belt clips would you like?

Answer:

At least five of each.

ITEM 3

Question:

Other Requirements, b,iii [page 6] - How many extra BES client licenses do you need (all licenses are carrier agnostic)? Are you looking to upgrade your BES software?

Answer:

Most of the LEGISLATURE's BlackBerry devices interface with BES servers that are administered by the Utah Department of Technology Services (DTS) as well as one that is administered separately by the Senate. This arrangement will continue for the foreseeable future. The RFP does not seek client licenses (we already have them) or software upgrades for these. OLRGC has one BES server that OLRGC uses for research and development. This BES server operates on version 4.1.6. OLRGC desires to upgrade to version 5. OLRGC is also seeking 20 to 25 client licenses for this server. The software upgrade and client licenses described in the RFP refer only to OLRGC's BES server and the 20 to 25 client licenses.

ITEM 4

Question:

Detailed Response, i [page 9] - when would you like the demo phone and aircard? How would you like them to be delivered?

Answer:

The demo phone and any aircard should be delivered with the RFP response at the same time that the RFP response is delivered. Both will be provided to OLRGC for testing, free of charge. Neither the OLRGC nor the LEGISLATURE will pay any fees, expenses or service charges for use or possession of the demo phone or aircard.

ITEM 5

Question:

Other requirements,a iii [page 5] - When you asked to prohibit access to Legislature, do you also want the authorized user of the wireless phone account to be prohibited from this information?

Answer:

Yes.

ITEM 6

Question:

Plan b, i [page 4] - How many aircards do you wants us to bid on?

Answer:

The LEGISLATURE's preference is to have tethering services for all phones included in the monthly rate or available at a low rate. Aircards are a second option. The LEGISLATURE currently has five, but sometimes they are all in use. The LEGISLATURE would like to have at least five. More would be better.
