


What is Alzheimer's Disease?


A progressive type of dementia that causes problems with memory, thinking and behavior. Alzheimer's <u>is</u> a disease and as such is:

- Not a normal part of aging
- The most common form of dementia, accounting for up to 80% of dementia cases
- A progressive <u>fatal</u> disease
- <u>Cannot</u> currently be prevented, slowed or cured





Top Ten Causes of Death




Most Feared Disease

Current Trajectory of Alzheimer's Disease



Costs to Medicaid


Average Per Senior Medicaid Payments 2008 (Inflated to 2013 Dollars)

THE PROBLEM:

Nothing has happened since the plan was approved!

No state department "owns" Alzheimer's disease

- <u>84%</u> of the strategies relate directly to the State
 Department of Health through their effective implementation of the Core Functions of Public Health
- 16% of the strategies relate directly to the State
 Department of Human Services, specifically to the Division of Aging and Adult Services; primarily focused on meeting the needs of caregivers

Call for specific legislation originating in the Health and Human Services Committee to designate

PUBLICHEALTHISSUE designating the Utah State Department of Health as primarily responsible for implementing the Utah State Plan for Alzheimer's Disease and Related **Dementias** by incorporating it into their strategic planning process and coordinating with other state departments as necessary.

Defining Public Health Issues

1. The burden is large

- 28,000 people are living with Alzheimer's, representing 10% of our seniors over 65; projected to grow to 25% in 10 years
- Annual healthcare costs related to the disease exceeds \$300 million

2. The impact is major

- More than 140,000 Caregivers
- Additional healthcare costs for caregivers is over \$68 million
- Medicaid costs are 70% of total cost of those with the disease and caregivers over 65

3. There are ways to intervene

- Improve quality of life
- Reduce associated costs

Core Functions of Public Health



State Department of Health Alzheimer's Plan Lead Agency

- Dr. W. David Patten, Executive Director of the Department of Health has agreed to take on the plan as directed by the legislature
- Nels Holmgren, Division Director for Aging and Adult Services,
 Department of Human Services has agreed that it makes sense to have the Department of Health take the lead
- The original members of the State Alzheimer's Plan Task Force also agree that it is important to have The State Department of Health take the lead in addressing Alzheimer's as a public health issue
