DORA Goal and Objectives

Goal: To reduce the incidence of substance use disorders, drug-related crime, and the associated consequences for individuals, families and communities throughout Utah.

Objectives:

- ✦ Determine an individual's specific risk and substance use disorder treatment needs as early as possible in the judicial process;
- ✦ Expand substance use disorder treatment resources for individuals under corrections supervision in the community and in correctional institutions;
- ✦ Provide more intensive supervision by the Department of Corrections; and
- ✦ Integrate substance use disorder treatment and correctional supervision in a collaborative approach to managing individuals on probation and parole.

¹Parolees were not served in the DORA Pilot due to the geographic limitation of the pilot (Salt Lake County only) and the short timeframe for the Pilot which necessitated admitting participants as quickly as possible so they could complete the program and leave sufficient follow-up time to examine outcome measures. Parolees were included during the statewide implementation in FY 2008 and FY 2009, but were eliminated in FY 2010 from the Modified phase of DORA due to funding cuts and evaluation data that suggested parolees did not do as well in DORA as probationers.
