DORA Goal and Objectives

Goal: To reduce the incidence of substance use disorders, drug-related crime, and the associated consequences for individuals, families and communities throughout Utah.

Objectives:

<u>Smarter Sentencing + Smarter Treatment = Better Outcomes and Safer Neighborhoods</u>

- Determine an individual's specific risk and substance use disorder treatment needs as early as possible in the judicial process;
- Expand substance use disorder treatment resources for individuals under corrections supervision in the community and in correctional institutions;
- Provide more intensive supervision by the Department of Corrections; and
- Integrate substance use disorder treatment and correctional supervision in a collaborative approach to managing individuals on probation and parole.
