



Loan Funds Purpose

Division of Drinking Water

- Public Water
 - Source Development
 - Treatment
 - Storage
 - Distribution



Division of Water Quality

- Wastewater Projects
 - Sewers
 - Treatment Plants
 - Storm Water
- Non-Point Source Projects
 - Onsite Wastewater Disposal
 - Erosion Control
 - Nutrient Pollution Control



Why are these Loan Programs Important?

- Funding flexibility is critical:
 - Supports projects not eligible for federal funds
 - Allows the divisions to expedite critical and emergency projects
 - Simplifies projects for small communities by cutting the federal red tape

Why are these Loan Programs Important?

- Provide infrastructure funding for needed water and wastewater projects -- especially to small communities
- Provide critical matching funds for federal grants
- Support program operations
- Allow agencies to maintain primacy

Return on Investment

- Loan funds revolve and are reinvested in Utah communities
 - \$683.2 million of federal \$ have capitalized and revolved in DDW's and DWQ's loan programs since 1988.

 Investments in water and wastewater infrastructure are critical to the public health and economy of Utah

Growing Needs

- Many Utah water and wastewater systems are 50 to 100 years old
- Our state's population will double in in the next
 30 40 years
 - ≥20-year wastewater infrastructure need: \$3.42 B
 - ≥20-year drinking water infrastructure need: \$3.73 B
- Affordable infrastructure
- Widening gap between stream flows and pollutant loadings

Recommendations

- Maintain a sustainable funding source
- Consider funding re-allocation for protection of unique resources and furthering innovative technology:
 - Great Salt Lake
 - Water reuse
- Recognition that investment in water and wastewater treatment is an investment in Utah's quality of life
