143	statute to ensure it is narrowly tailored to protect against present, recognizable, and significant
144	harm to the health or safety of the public.

148	or may harm or endanger the health, safety, or welfare of the public;
149	(b) whether the potential for harm or endangerment described in Subsection (3)(a) is
150	easily recognizable and not remote;
151	(c) whether regulation of the occupation or profession will significantly diminish an
152	identified risk to the health, safety, or welfare of the public;
153	(d) whether regulation of the occupation or profession:
154	(i) imposes significant new economic hardship on the public;
155	(ii) significantly diminishes the supply of qualified practitioners; or

156	(iii) otherwise creates barriers to service that are not consistent with the public welfare

163	occupations or professions that are already regulated;

181	appropriate, that would [better] avoid unnecessary regulation and intrusion upon individual
182	liberties by the state, while still protecting the health and safety of the public.
