


## Salt Lake County Overview

Behavioral Health Services



The majority of incarcerated individuals will be released at some point in time.

An offender's ability to access physical health and behavioral health services reduces recidivism, increases public safety, and allows individuals to become tax payers rather than users of tax funds.

"When someone gets discharged from the jail and they don't have insurance and they don't have a plan, we can pretty much set our watch to when we're going see them again," said Ben Breit, a spokesman for the Cook County Sheriff's Office.
