UTA GOVERNANCE

UTA is governed by a 16-member board of trustees appointed from within UTA's service territory. Trustees and their appointing authorities are shown to the right of this section.

Trustees set overall UTA policy and employ the president/CEO, who is given the responsibility and authority to run the day-to-day operations of UTA. Trustees also employ the general counsel and the chief internal auditor.

Meetings of the board of trustees are open to the public and are usually held on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month. Please check UTA's website at rideuta.com for exact meeting days and times. Meeting packets are published in advance, and public comment is welcome via email, phone call or personal attendance.

Services provided by UTA include bus, TRAX, FrontRunner, S-Line Streetcar, paratransit, and rideshare and vanpool programs.

UTA Quick Facts

- More than 120 bus routes run each weekday.
- During peak service, nine FrontRunner trains are running along the 89-mile long line.
- Except for Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day, transit service is available every day of the year.*
- Transit service begins as early as 5 a.m. and ends as late as 12 p.m.
- UTA's fleet is 100% ADA accessible.
- A TRAX vehicle weighs 44 tons.
- UTA's base fare of \$2.50 has been in place since April 2013.
- 25% of work trips into downtown each day are made using transit.
- UTA riders prevent over 2,000 tons of vehicle emissions each year.
- UTA has 47 CNG buses.
