SHORT TITLE: Concealed Weapon Permit for Service Members

2013 GENERAL SESSION

STATE GOVERNMENT (UCA 36-12-13(2)(b))

Enacting this bill will reduce dedicated credits revenue to the Department of Public Safety by about \$80,900 per year beginning in FY 2014. The Department of Public Safety will incur a one-time programming cost of \$10,000 from the General Fund in FY 2014.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS (UCA 36-12-13(2)(c))

Enactment of this bill likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

DIRECT EXPENDITURES BY UTAH RESIDENTS AND BUSINESSES (UCA 36-12-13(2)(d))

United States active duty service members and their spouses will benefit from the permit fee waivers by as much as \$80,900 per year beginning in FY 2014. The savings will occur as follows: 915 out of state service members who now pay \$34.50 for a new permit will not be charged and will save a total of \$31,600 per year; 300 in-state service members who now pay \$29.50 for a new permit will not be charged and will save a total of \$8,800 per year; and 2,700 service members and their spouses who now pay \$15.00 for a renewal permit will not be charged and will save a total of \$40,500 per year.
