SHORT TITLE: Pharmacy Practice Act Amendments

STATE GOVERNMENT (UCA 36-12-13(2)(b))

Enactment of this bill could increase revenue to the Commerce Service Fund by \$50,000 and Dedicated Credit Revenue by \$40,000 annually. Costs to the Commerce Department to administer and maintain the new licenses could be \$53,300 annually. The Dedicated Credit Revenue could be used to pay for background checks of licensees. Spending from the Commerce Service Fund affects annual transfers to the General Fund.
