Enactment of this legislation likely will not materially impact state revenue.

Enactment of this bill could cost the Division of Finance \$7,000 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2017 to update the payroll systems and reports. To the extent that employees take advantage of the new leave type created by this bill, it could cost state agencies and higher education up to \$9,000, on average, per event in lost productivity. Assuming 1,098 employees use the new benefit, lost productivity could total up to \$9.9 million.
