Enactment of this bill could reduce year-end transfers to the General Fund from the Commerce Service Fund by \$21,400 ongoing beginning in FY 2018. The ongoing cost will be offset by \$10,700 one-time in FY 2018 due to the implementation timing.

Enactment of this bill could cost the Department of Commerce \$21,400 ongoing from the Commerce Service Fund in FY 2018 for potential investigations into violations. Only one-half year of the anticipated costs are expected in the first year due to implementation timing. Spending from the Commerce Service Fund impacts year-end transfers to the General Fund. Enactment of this bill could also cost the Department of Health \$30,000 from the General Fund annually for database development and maintenance, data analysis, and administrative oversight of the data. The costs could go away in FY 2022 when the provisions of the bill are repealed.
