Enactment of this legislation could increase revenue to the General Fund by \$3,600 beginning in FY 2018, from fees in the amount of \$300 collected by the Courts from approximately 12 individuals filing petitions to seek court-ordered substance use disorder treatment for another individual.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Courts \$11,900 General Fund beginning in FY 2018 to process petitions, conduct hearings, and issue orders related to approximately 12 individuals filing petitions to seek court-ordered substance use disorder treatment for another individual.

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Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Local substance abuse authorities may experience increased demand for evaluation and treatment services, which could be offset by charges to the petitioner. In the case that an individual is ruled in contempt of court for failing to appear at an evaluation or to undergo court-ordered treatment, a local jail could spend \$65 per day on average to detain that individual.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

An individual choosing to petition the court for court-ordered substance use disorder treatment of another individual would be responsible for associated legal, evaluation, and treatment costs not covered by health insurance. Private substance use treatment facilities and programs that are licensed by the State may experience increased demand for evaluation and treatment services, which could be offset by charges to the petitioner.

Notes on Notes

Fiscal notes estimate the direct costs or revenues of enacting a bill. The Legislature uses them to balance the budget. They do not measure a bill's benefits or non-fiscal impacts like opportunity costs, wait times, or inconvenience. A fiscal note is not an appropriation. The Legislature decides appropriations separately.
