Local Government

Enactment of this legislation is likely to increase the costs to secondary water suppliers requiring them to install meters on new and existing connections. There are approximately 218,700 secondary water connections in the state; the estimated cost to retrofit an existing connection with a meter is up to \$1,100 per connection. The total costs to meter the use of existing secondary water for residential, commercial, industrial, and institutional uses by July 1, 2023 could be \$241 million.

Individuals & Businesses

To the extent that secondary water suppliers pass along meter installation costs to individual and business customers, enactment of this legislation could result in an estimated cost of \$1,100 per customer for an aggregate cost of \$241 million by July 1, 2023.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation could result in a small increase in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
