The Utah Health Policy Project Supports the Healthy Utah Plan Because:


- **53,000** Utahns live in the coverage gap and have no access to affordable health care coverage (2016);
- **\$260** million of Utah taxpayer dollars will come back to the Utah economy;
- **66%** of Utahns who would benefit are already working one or more jobs;
- **4,800** veterans and their spouses living in Utah are currently uninsured;
- **75,114** Utahns are in need of, but not receiving, mental health treatment;
- **120,724** Utahns are in need of, but not receiving, substance use disorder services; and

After two years of debate, and a year of hard fought negotiations with the federal government, there is finally a Medicaid expansion alternative that is right for Utah.
