12	Section 1. Section 41-6-35 is amended to read:
13	41-6-35. Accident reports Duty of operator and investigative officer to forward or
14	render.
15	(1) The department may require any operator of a vehicle involved in an accident resulting
16	in injury to or death of any person or total property damage to the apparent extent of \$1,000 or
17	more to forward within ten days after the request:
18	(a) a written report of the accident to the department; and
19	(b) a supplemental report when the original report is insufficient in the opinion of the
20	department.
21	(2) The department may require witnesses of accidents to render reports to the department.
22	(3) A written accident report is not required under this section from any person who is
23	physically incapable of making a report, during his period of incapacity.
24	(4) (a) Every peace officer who in the regular course of duty investigates a motor vehicle
25	accident described under Subsection (1) shall file the original $\hat{\mathbf{h}}$ [,] <u>OR</u> $\hat{\mathbf{h}}$ an electronic copy $\hat{\mathbf{h}}$ [, or
25a	photocopy] ĥ
26	of the report of the accident with the department within ten days after completing the investigation.
27	(b) The report shall be made either at the time of and at the scene of the accident or later
