AN ACT RELATING TO THE CRIMINAL CODE AND THE JUDICIAL CODE; CREATING A CRIME FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM WITH EXCEPTIONS AND A PENALTY; REQUIRING A LICENSED FIREARM DEALER TO PROVIDE WRITTEN WARNING OF POSSIBLE PROSECUTION AND CIVIL SUIT FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM AND PROVIDING A CRIMINAL PENALTY; CREATING A CIVIL CAUSE OF ACTION FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING DISCRETION FOR PROSECUTOR AND ARRESTING OFFICER; ESTABLISHING A DAMAGE CAP; AND PROVIDING A STATUTE OF LIMITATION.

This act affects sections of Utah Code Annotated 1953 as follows:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **76-10-509.1** is enacted to read:

76-10-509.1. Criminally negligent storage of a firearm -- Exceptions -- Penalty.

(1) A person is guilty of a class B misdemeanor if:

(a) notwithstanding the provisions of Section 76-10-502, the person keeps any firearm that has ammunition in the chamber, cylinder, or magazine in a condition that the firearm can be discharged within any premise which is under the person's custody or control;

(b) the person knows or reasonably should know that a minor is likely to gain access to the firearm without the permission of the minor's parent, legal guardian, or property owner where the

28 firearm is stored; and

29 (c) the minor obtains access to the firearm and thereby causes death or bodily injury to
30 himself or any other person.

31 (2) This section does not apply if any of the following occur:

32 (a) the minor obtains the firearm as a result of an unlawful entry to any premises by any
33 person;

34 (b) the firearm is kept in a locked container or in a location which a reasonable person
35 would believe to be secure;

36 (c) the firearm is carried on the person or within a close proximity so that the person can
37 readily retrieve and use the firearm as if carried on the person;

38 (d) the firearm is equipped with an external locking device;

39 (e) the person is authorized to possess a weapon under Sections 53A-3-502 and 76-10-523
40 and the minor obtains the firearm during, or incidental to, the performance of the person's duties;

41 (f) the minor obtains, or obtains and discharges, the firearm in a lawful act of self-defense
42 or defense of another person; or

43 (g) the person who keeps a firearm on any premise which is under the person's custody or
44 control has no reasonable expectation, based on objective facts and circumstances, that a minor
45 is likely to be present on the premises.

46 Section 2. Section **76-10-527.5** is enacted to read:

47 **76-10-527.5. Dealer requirement for firearm warning -- Penalty.**

48 (1) Upon the retail sale or transfer of any firearm, the retail dealer or the dealer's employee
49 shall deliver to the purchaser or transferee the following written warning, printed in block letters
50 not less than 1/4 of an inch in height:

51 "AN ADULT CAN BE PROSECUTED AND SUED FOR LEAVING A
52 FIREARM WITHIN EASY ACCESS OF A MINOR. FIREARMS SHOULD BE
53 SECURED WITH A LOCKING DEVICE OR SECURELY STORED IN A
54 LOCKED BOX, CONTAINER, OR OTHER LOCATION."

55 (2) Every wholesale and retail dealer of firearms shall conspicuously post at each purchase
56 counter the same warning as provided in Subsection (1).

57 (3) Any retail or wholesale dealer of firearms who violates this section is guilty of a class
58 C misdemeanor.

59 Section 3. Section **78-11-6.3** is enacted to read:

60 **78-11-6.3. Negligent storage of a firearm -- Definitions -- Exceptions -- Provisions for**
61 **civil action.**

62 (1) As used in this section:

63 (a) "Bodily injury" means any physical injury as defined in Section 76-1-601.

64 (b) "External locking device" means a device which temporarily prevents the firearm from
65 functioning.

66 (c) "Firearm" means any pistol, revolver, shotgun, sawed-off shotgun, rifle or sawed-off
67 rifle, or any device that could be used as a dangerous weapon, as defined in Section 76-10-501,
68 from which is expelled a projectile by action of an explosive.

69 (d) "Locked container" means a secure container which is fully enclosed and locked by a
70 padlock, key lock, combination lock, or similar locking device.

71 (e) "Minor" means a person who is 17 years of age or less.

72 (2) As provided in Section 78-11-6, when death or bodily injury is caused by the negligent
73 storage of a firearm by another person and the dead or injured person:

74 (a) is a minor, an action for the death or bodily injury of the minor may be maintained by
75 the minor's parent or legal guardian; or

76 (b) is a person other than a minor:

77 (i) the injured person may maintain an action for his bodily injury; or

78 (ii) the heirs or the personal representative of the person may maintain an action for the
79 death of the person.

80 (3) Except as provided in Subsection (4), a person commits the act of negligent storage
81 of a firearm if:

82 (a) the person keeps any firearm that has ammunition in the chamber, cylinder, or
83 magazine in a condition that it can be discharged within any premise which is under the person's
84 custody or control;

85 (b) the person knows or reasonably should know that a minor is likely to gain access to the
86 firearm without the permission of the minor's parent, legal guardian, or property owner where the
87 firearm is stored; and

88 (c) the minor obtains access to the firearm and thereby causes death or bodily injury to
89 himself or any other person.

90 (4) Subsection (3) does not apply if any of the following occur:

91 (a) the minor obtains the firearm as a result of an unlawful entry to any premises by any
92 person;

93 (b) the firearm is kept in a locked container or in a location which a reasonable person
94 would believe to be secure;

95 (c) the firearm is carried on the person or within a close proximity so that the person can
96 readily retrieve and use the firearm as if carried on the person;

97 (d) the firearm is equipped with an external locking device;

98 (e) the person is authorized to possess a weapon under Sections 53A-3-502 and 76-10-523
99 and the minor obtains the firearm during, or incidental to, the performance of the person's duties;

100 (f) the minor obtains, or obtains and discharges, the firearm in a lawful act of self-defense
101 or defense of another person; or

102 (g) the person who keeps a firearm on any premise which is under the person's custody or
103 control has no reasonable expectation, based on objective facts and circumstances, that a minor
104 is likely to be present on the premise.

105 (5) (a) If the person who allegedly violated this section is the parent or guardian of a child
106 who is injured or who dies as the result of an accidental shooting, the prosecuting attorney shall
107 consider, among other factors, the impact of the injury or death on the person alleged to have
108 violated this section when deciding whether to prosecute an alleged violation.

109 (b) It is the Legislature's intent that a parent or guardian of a child who is injured or who
110 dies as the result of an accidental shooting shall be prosecuted only in those instances in which the
111 parent or guardian behaved in a grossly negligent manner or where similarly egregious
112 circumstances exist.

113 (c) This Subsection (5) shall not otherwise restrict, in any manner, the factors that a
114 prosecuting attorney may consider when deciding whether to prosecute alleged violations of this
115 section.

116 (6) (a) If the person who allegedly violated this section is the parent or guardian of a child
117 who is injured or who dies as the result of an accidental shooting, no arrest of the person for the
118 alleged violation of this section shall occur until at least seven days after the date upon which the
119 accidental shooting occurred.

120 (b) In addition to the limitation contained in this Subsection (6), a law enforcement officer

121 shall consider the health status of a child who suffers great bodily injury as the result of an
122 accidental shooting prior to arresting a person for a violation of this section, if the person to be
123 arrested is the parent or guardian of the injured child. The intent of this subsection is to encourage
124 law enforcement officials to delay the arrest of a parent or guardian of a seriously injured child
125 while the child remains on life-support equipment or is in a similarly critical medical condition.
126 (7) The provisions of this section do not supersede any other cause of action.
127 (8) The total amount of damages that may be awarded to any person pursuant to a cause
128 of action under this section that arises after July 1, 2000, is limited to \$500,000.
129 (9) An action based upon a cause of action under this chapter shall be commenced within
130 two years after the date of the injury.
