

Senator David L. Gladwell proposes the following substitute bill:

**FUNERAL SERVICES AMENDMENTS**

2003 GENERAL SESSION

STATE OF UTAH

**Sponsor: David L. Gladwell**

**This act modifies the Occupations and Professions Code by repealing the provisions of the Funeral Services Licensing Act and the Preneed Funeral Arrangement Act. The act enacts the provisions of those two acts within the Funeral Services Licensing Act. The act alters the membership of the Board of Funeral Service. The act eliminates the Preneed Funeral Arrangement Licensing Board and transfers the duties and responsibilities to the Board of Funeral Service. The act enacts provisions prohibiting a convicted felon from holding certain licenses. The act enacts endorsement requirements for individuals licensed in another jurisdiction. The act enacts provisions prohibiting solicitation of funeral services or merchandise after a person's death. The act establishes criminal penalties for certain violations. The act enacts provisions dealing with the right and duty to control the disposition of a deceased person. The act modifies the Utah Health Code and the Utah Uniform Probate Code to provide cross-references to the Funeral Services Licensing Act. The act makes technical changes.**

87           Section 1. Section **26-2-18** is amended to read:

88 **26-2-18. Interments -- Duties of sexton or person in charge -- Record of**  
89 **interments -- Information filed with local registrar.**

90 (1) (a) A sexton or person in charge of any premises in which interments are made may  
91 not inter or permit the interment of any dead body or dead fetus unless the interment is made by  
92 a funeral director licensed under Title 58, Chapter 9, Funeral Services Licensing Act, or by a  
93 person holding a burial-transit permit.

94 (b) The right and duty to control the disposition of a deceased person shall be governed  
95 by Sections 58-9-601 through 58-9-605.

96 (2) The sexton or the person in charge of any premises where interments are made shall  
97 keep a record of all interments made in the premises under his charge, stating the name of the  
98 decedent, place of death, date of burial, and name and address of the funeral director or other  
99 person making the interment. This record shall be open to public inspection. A city or county  
100 clerk may, at the clerk's option, maintain the interment records on behalf of the sexton or  
101 person in charge of any premises in which interments are made.

102 (3) Not later than the tenth day of each month, the sexton, person in charge of the  
103 premises, or city or county clerk who maintains the interment records shall send to the local  
104 registrar and the department a list of all interments made in the premises during the preceding  
105 month. The list shall be in the form prescribed by the state registrar.

108 (1) Where a body is held for investigation or autopsy under the provisions of this  
109 chapter or for any medical investigation permitted by law, the body shall, if requested by [~~next~~  
110 ~~of kin~~] the person given priority under Section 58-9-602., be released for funeral preparations  
111 no later than 24 hours after the arrival at the office of the medical examiner or regional medical  
112 facility. An extension may be ordered only by a district court.

117 **Part 1. General Provisions**

118 **58-9-101. Title.**

119 This chapter is known as the "Funeral Services Licensing Act."

120 Section 4. Section **58-9-102** is enacted to read:

121 **58-9-102. Definitions.**

122 In addition to the definitions in Section 58-1-102, as used in this chapter:

123 (1) "Beneficiary" means the individual who, at the time of the beneficiary's death, is to  
124 receive the benefit of the property and services purchased under a preneed funeral arrangement.

125 (2) "Board" means the Board of Funeral Service created in Section 58-9-201.

126 (3) "Buyer" means any person who purchases a preneed funeral arrangement.

127 (4) "Calcination" means a process in which a dead human body is reduced by intense  
128 heat to a residue that is not as substantive as the residue that follows cremation.

129 (5) "Cremation" means the reduction of a dead human body by direct flame to residue  
130 that includes bone fragments.

131 (6) "Direct disposition" means the disposition of a dead human body:

132 (a) as quickly as law allows;

133 (b) without preparation of the body by embalming; and

134 (c) without any attendant funeral service or graveside service.

135 (7) "Disposition" means the final disposal of a dead human body by:

136 (a) earth interment;

137 (b) above ground burial;

138 (c) cremation;

139 (d) calcination;

140 (e) burial at sea;

141 (f) delivery to a medical institution; or

142 (g) other lawful means.

143 (8) "Embalming" means replacing body fluids in a dead human body with preserving  
144 and disinfecting chemicals.

145 (9) "Funeral establishment" means a place established for any of the following  
146 purposes in connection with a dead human body:

147 (a) custody;

148 (b) shelter;

149 (c) care;

150 (d) preparation;

151 (e) disposition; or

152 (f) other services.

153 (10) (a) "Funeral merchandise" means any of the following into which a dead human

154 body is placed in connection with the transportation or disposition of the body:

155 (i) vaults;

156 (ii) caskets; or

157 (iii) other personal property.

158 (b) "Funeral merchandise" does not include:

159 (i) mausoleum crypts;

160 (ii) interment receptacles preset in a cemetery; or

161 (iii) columbarium niches.

162 (11) "Funeral service" means any service, rite, or ceremony performed:

163 (a) with respect to the death of a human; and

164 (b) with the body of the deceased present.

165 (12) "Funeral service apprentice" means an individual licensed under this chapter who

166 is permitted to:

167 (a) assist a funeral service director in the embalming or other preparation of a dead

168 human body for deposition;

169 (b) assist a funeral service director in the cremation, calcination, or pulverization of a

170 dead human body or its remains; and

171 (c) perform other funeral service activities under supervision of a funeral service

172 director.

173 (13) "Funeral service director" means an individual licensed under this chapter who

174 may engage in all lawful professional activities regulated and defined under the practice of

175 funeral service.

176 (14) "Graveside service" means a funeral service held at the location of disposition.

177 (15) "Memorial service" means any service, rite, or ceremony performed:

178 (a) with respect to the death of a human; and

179 (b) without the body of the deceased present.

180 (16) "Practice of funeral service" means:

- 181 (a) supervising the receipt of custody and transportation of a dead human body to
- 182 prepare the body for:
- 183 (i) disposition; or
- 184 (ii) shipment to another location;
- 185 (b) entering into a contract with any person to provide professional services regulated
- 186 under this chapter;
- 187 (c) embalming or otherwise preparing a dead human body for disposition;
- 188 (d) supervising the arrangement or conduct of any of the following:
- 189 (i) a funeral service;
- 190 (ii) a graveside service; or
- 191 (iii) a memorial service;
- 192 (e) cremation, calcination, or pulverization of a dead human body or the body's
- 193 remains;
- 194 (f) supervising the arrangement of:
- 195 (i) a disposition; or
- 196 (ii) a direct disposition;
- 197 (g) facilitating:
- 198 (i) a disposition; or
- 199 (ii) a direct disposition;
- 200 (h) supervising sales of funeral merchandise by a funeral establishment;
- 201 (i) managing or otherwise being responsible for the practice of funeral service in a
- 202 licensed funeral establishment;
- 203 (j) supervising the sale of a preneed funeral arrangement; and
- 204 (k) contracting with or employing individuals to sell a preneed funeral arrangement.
- 205 (17) (a) "Preneed funeral arrangement" means any written or oral agreement sold in
- 206 advance of the death of the beneficiary under which a person agrees with a buyer to provide at
- 207 the death of the beneficiary any of the following as are typically provided in connection with a
- 208 disposition:
- 209 (i) goods;
- 210 (ii) services, including:
- 211 (A) embalming services; and

- 212 (B) funeral directing services;
- 213 (iii) real property; or
- 214 (iv) personal property, including:
- 215 (A) caskets;
- 216 (B) other primary containers;
- 217 (C) cremation or transportation containers;
- 218 (D) outer burial containers;
- 219 (E) vaults;
- 220 (F) grave liners;
- 221 (G) funeral clothing and accessories;
- 222 (H) monuments;
- 223 (I) grave markers; and
- 224 (J) cremation urns.
- 225 (b) "Preneed funeral arrangement" includes a policy or product of life insurance:
- 226 (i) providing a death benefit cash payment on the death of the beneficiary; and
- 227 (ii) that is limited to providing the products and services described in Subsection
- 228 (17)(a).
- 229 (c) "Preneed funeral arrangement" does not include a policy or product of life insurance
- 230 that does not meet the requirements of Subsection (17)(b).
- 231 (18) "Provider" means a licensed funeral establishment that furnishes or will furnish
- 232 the services or property purchased under a preneed funeral arrangement.
- 233 (19) "Pulverization" means a grinding process that reduces the residue of a cremation
- 234 or calcination into a powdery substance.
- 235 (20) "Sales agent" means an individual licensed under this chapter as a preneed funeral
- 236 arrangement sales agent.
- 237 (21) "Unlawful conduct" is as defined in Sections 58-1-501 and 58-9-501.
- 238 (22) "Unprofessional conduct" is as defined in Sections 58-1-501 and 58-9-502.
- 239 Section 5. Section **58-9-201** is enacted to read:
- 240 **Part 2. Board**
- 241 **58-9-201. Board.**
- 242 (1) There is created the Board of Funeral Service consisting of:

243 (a) three funeral service directors who own or have an ownership interest in a funeral  
244 establishment, at least two of which are preneed funeral arrangement providers;

245 (b) one funeral service director who does not have an ownership interest in a funeral  
246 service establishment;

247 (c) one preneed funeral arrangement sales agent, who does not have an ownership  
248 interest in a funeral service establishment;

249 (d) one owner or officer of an endowment care cemetery; and

250 (e) one member from the general public who has no association with the funeral  
251 service profession.

252 (2) The board shall be appointed and serve in accordance with Section 58-1-201.

253 (3) The duties and responsibilities of the board shall be in accordance with Sections  
254 58-1-202 and 58-1-203. In addition, the board shall designate one of its members on a  
255 permanent or rotating basis to:

256 (a) assist the division in reviewing complaints concerning the unlawful or  
257 unprofessional conduct of a licensee; and

263 **Part 3. Licensing**

264 **58-9-301. Licensure required -- License classifications.**

265 (1) A license is required to engage in the practice of funeral service, except as  
266 specifically provided in Sections 58-1-307 and 58-9-305.

267 (2) The division shall issue to a person who qualifies under this chapter a license in the  
268 classification of:

269 (a) funeral service director;

270 (b) funeral service apprentice;

271 (c) funeral service establishment;

272 (d) preneed funeral arrangement provider; or

273 (e) preneed funeral arrangement sales agent.

274 Section 7. Section **58-9-302** is enacted to read:

275 **58-9-302. Qualifications for licensure.**

276 (1) Each applicant for licensure as a funeral service director shall:

277 (a) submit an application in a form prescribed by the division;

278 (b) pay a fee as determined by the department under Section 63-38-3.2;

279 (c) be of good moral character in that the applicant has not been convicted of:

280 (i) a felony;

281 (ii) a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude; or

282 (iii) any other crime that when considered with the duties and responsibilities of a

283 funeral service director is considered by the division and the board to indicate that the best

284 interests of the public are not served by granting the applicant a license;

285 (d) have completed a high school education or its equivalent;

286 (e) have obtained an associate degree, or its equivalent, in mortuary science from a

287 school of funeral service accredited by the American Board of Funeral Service Education or

288 other accrediting body recognized by the U.S. Department of Education;

289 (f) have completed not less than 2,000 hours and 50 embalmings, over a period of not

290 less than one year, of satisfactory performance in training as a licensed funeral service

291 apprentice under the supervision of a licensed funeral service director; and

292 (g) have successfully completed examinations approved by the division in

293 collaboration with the board.

294 (2) Each applicant for licensure as a funeral service apprentice shall:

295 (a) submit an application in a form prescribed by the division;

296 (b) pay a fee as determined by the department under Section 63-38-3.2;

297 (c) be of good moral character in that the applicant has not been convicted of:

298 (i) a felony;

299 (ii) a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude; or

300 (iii) any other crime that when considered with the duties and responsibilities of a

301 funeral service apprentice is considered by the division and the board to indicate that the best

302 interests of the public are not served by granting the applicant a license;

303 (d) have completed a high school education or its equivalent; and

304 (e) have successfully completed an examination testing the applicant's knowledge of

305 the law and rules made under this chapter.

306 (3) Each applicant for licensure as a funeral service establishment shall:

307 (a) submit an application in a form prescribed by the division;

308 (b) pay a fee as determined by the department under Section 63-38-3.2;

309 (c) have in place and maintain at all times a licensed funeral service director

310 responsible for the operation of the funeral service establishment as the sole proprietor, a

311 managing general partner, or an officer of a corporation or other business entity; and

312 (d) if it is the intention of the funeral service establishment to sell preneed funeral

313 arrangements, file with the division an application for a license to sell preneed funeral

314 arrangements.

315 (4) Each applicant for licensure as a preneed funeral arrangement provider shall:

316 (a) submit an application in a form provided by the division;

317 (b) pay a fee as determined by the department under Section 63-38-3.2;

318 (c) be licensed in the state as a funeral service establishment;

319 (d) be free of activities or conduct which, when considered with the responsibilities of

320 a licensee and the public interest, is a threat to the public health, safety, or welfare;

321 (e) file with the completed application a copy of each form of contract or agreement the

322 applicant will use in the sale of preneed funeral arrangements; and

323 (f) provide evidence of appropriate licensure with the Insurance Department if the

324 applicant intends to engage in the sale of any preneed funeral arrangements funded in whole or

325 in part by an insurance policy or product to be sold by the provider or the provider's sales agent.

326 (5) Each applicant for licensure as a preneed funeral arrangement sales agent shall:

327 (a) submit an application in a form prescribed by the division;

328 (b) pay a fee as determined by the department under Section 63-38-3.2;

329 (c) be of good moral character in that the applicant has not been convicted of:

330 (i) a felony;

331 (ii) a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude; or

332 (iii) any other crime that when considered with the duties and responsibilities of a

333 preneed funeral sales agent is considered by the division and the board to indicate that the best

334 interests of the public are not served by granting the applicant a license;

335 (d) be a high school graduate or have obtained a certificate of equivalency approved by

336 the division:

337 (e) pass an examination approved by the division in collaboration with the board;

338 (f) provide evidence that the applicant will be associated with a licensed preneed

339 funeral arrangement provider upon issuance of a license under terms acceptable to the division;

340 and

341 (g) provide evidence of appropriate licensure with the Insurance Department if the

342 applicant intends to engage in the sale of any preneed funeral arrangements funded in whole or

343 in part by an insurance policy or product.

344 Section 8. Section **58-9-303** is enacted to read:

345 **58-9-303. Term of license -- Expiration -- Renewal.**

346 (1) The division shall issue each license under this chapter in accordance with a

347 two-year renewal cycle established by rule. The division may by rule extend or shorten a

348 renewal cycle by as much as one year to stagger the renewal cycles it administers.

349 (2) Notwithstanding Subsection (1), a person who has once held a license as a funeral

350 service apprentice and has not qualified for licensure as a funeral service director may be issued

351 a subsequent funeral service apprentice license for only one additional two-year term upon the

352 specific approval of the division in collaboration with the board.

353 (3) At the time of renewal, the licensee shall show satisfactory evidence of completion

354 of continuing education as required under Section 58-9-304.

355 (4) Each license automatically expires on the expiration date shown on the license

356 unless the licensee renews it in accordance with Section 58-1-308.

357 Section 9. Section **58-9-304** is enacted to read:

358 **58-9-304. Continuing education.**

359 (1) As a condition precedent for license renewal, each funeral service director shall,

360 during each two-year licensure cycle or other cycle defined by rule, complete 20 hours of

361 qualified continuing professional education in accordance with standards defined by rule.

362 (2) If a renewal cycle is extended or shortened under Section 58-9-303, the continuing

363 education hours required for license renewal under this section shall be increased or decreased

364 proportionally.

365 Section 10. Section **58-9-305** is enacted to read:

366 **58-9-305. Exemptions from licensure.**

367 In addition to the exemptions from licensure in Section 58-1-307, a person may engage  
368 in the following acts included within the definition of the practice of funeral service, subject to  
369 the stated circumstances and limitations, without being licensed under this chapter:

370 (1) transportation of a dead human body in accordance with other applicable state and  
371 federal laws;

372 (2) ambulance or other emergency transportation of a dead human body;

373 (3) the sale of any of the following that is delivered to the buyer or the buyer's designee  
374 within 90 days after the day of the sale:

375 (a) funeral merchandise;

376 (b) headstones; or

377 (c) other memorial merchandise;

378 (4) the performance of funeral, graveside, or memorial services by:

379 (a) a member of the clergy; or

380 (b) other recognized individuals;

381 (5) assisting a Utah licensed funeral service director regarding disasters or special  
382 emergencies by individuals licensed in other states as funeral service directors;

383 (6) activities of an unlicensed individual employed by a funeral service establishment  
384 involving arrangement for a funeral service or the sale of funeral merchandise if the binding  
385 contract is reviewed, approved, and signed in behalf of the funeral service establishment by a  
386 licensed funeral service director; and

387 (7) nonprofessional tasks or activities which do not require independent professional  
388 judgment which are required of persons employed by a funeral service establishment under the  
389 supervision of a funeral service director.

390 Section 11. Section **58-9-306** is enacted to read:

391 **58-9-306. License by endorsement.**

392 The division may issue a license by endorsement to a person who holds a license to  
393 engage in the practice of funeral service from another state, jurisdiction, or territory of the  
394 United States, if:

395 (1) the person's license is:

396 (a) active;

397 (b) in good standing; and

- 398 (c) free from disciplinary action; and
- 399 (2) the person:
- 400 (a) meets the requirements of Section 58-1-302;
- 401 (b) is of good moral character in that the person has not been convicted of:
- 402 (i) a felony;
- 403 (ii) a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude; or
- 404 (iii) any other crime that when considered with the duties and responsibilities of the
- 405 license for which the person is applying is considered by the division and the board to indicate
- 406 that the best interests of the public are not served by granting the applicant a license;
- 407 (c) has completed five years of lawful and active practice as a licensed funeral service
- 408 director and embalmer within the ten years immediately preceding the application for licensure
- 409 by endorsement;
- 410 (d) has passed a national examination determined by the division; and
- 411 (e) has passed an examination on the rules of the state determined by the division.

412 Section 12. Section **58-9-307** is enacted to read:

413 **58-9-307. Supervision of funeral service apprentice.**

- 414 (1) A person seeking licensure as a funeral service apprentice shall submit as a part of
- 415 the application for a license:
- 416 (a) the name of the licensed funeral service director who has agreed to supervise the
- 417 applicant; and
- 418 (b) the name of the licensed funeral establishment at which the training and supervision
- 419 shall take place.
- 420 (2) A licensed funeral service director may supervise only one licensed funeral service
- 421 apprentice at one time.
- 422 (3) Within 30 days after the day on which the supervisor-supervisee relationship
- 423 between a licensed funeral service director and a licensed funeral service apprentice terminates,
- 424 the funeral service director shall furnish to the division a report of the performance of the
- 425 funeral service apprentice. The report shall be in form and content as prescribed by the
- 426 division.
- 427 (4) A licensed funeral service apprentice may apply to the division to request
- 428 supervision by a different funeral service director. The application shall be made on a form

429 prescribed by the division. A change of supervisor requires approval of the division. The  
430 supervising funeral service director shall submit to the division, in accordance with Subsection

853 applicable to specific chapters, parts, or sections, and unless the context otherwise requires, in  
854 this code:

855 (1) "Agent" includes an attorney-in-fact under a durable or nondurable power of  
856 attorney, an individual authorized to make decisions concerning another's health care, and an  
857 individual authorized to make decisions for another under a natural death act.

858 (2) "Application" means a written request to the registrar for an order of informal  
859 probate or appointment under Title 75, Chapter 3, Part 3, Informal Probate and Appointment  
860 Proceedings.

861 (3) "Beneficiary," as it relates to trust beneficiaries, includes a person who has any  
862 present or future interest, vested or contingent, and also includes the owner of an interest by

863 assignment or other transfer; as it relates to a charitable trust, includes any person entitled to  
864 enforce the trust; as it relates to a "beneficiary of a beneficiary designation," refers to a  
865 beneficiary of an insurance or annuity policy, of an account with POD designation, of a security  
866 registered in beneficiary form (TOD), or of a pension, profit-sharing, retirement, or similar  
867 benefit plan, or other nonprobate transfer at death; and, as it relates to a "beneficiary designated  
868 in a governing instrument," includes a grantee of a deed, a devisee, a trust beneficiary, a  
869 beneficiary of a beneficiary designation, a donee, appointee, or taker in default of a power of  
870 appointment, and a person in whose favor a power of attorney or a power held in any  
871 individual, fiduciary, or representative capacity is exercised.

872 (4) "Beneficiary designation" refers to a governing instrument naming a beneficiary of  
873 an insurance or annuity policy, of an account with POD designation, of a security registered in  
874 beneficiary form (TOD), or of a pension, profit-sharing, retirement, or similar benefit plan, or  
875 other nonprobate transfer at death.

876 (5) "Child" includes any individual entitled to take as a child under this code by  
877 intestate succession from the parent whose relationship is involved and excludes any person  
878 who is only a stepchild, a foster child, a grandchild, or any more remote descendant.

879 (6) "Claims," in respect to estates of decedents and protected persons, includes  
880 liabilities of the decedent or protected person, whether arising in contract, in tort, or otherwise,  
881 and liabilities of the estate which arise at or after the death of the decedent or after the  
882 appointment of a conservator, including funeral expenses and expenses of administration.  
883 "Claims" does not include estate or inheritance taxes, or demands or disputes regarding title of  
884 a decedent or protected person to specific assets alleged to be included in the estate.

885 (7) "Conservator" means a person who is appointed by a court to manage the estate of a  
886 protected person.

887 (8) "Court" means any of the courts of record in this state having jurisdiction in matters  
888 relating to the affairs of decedents.

889 (9) "Descendant" of an individual means all of his descendants of all generations, with  
890 the relationship of parent and child at each generation being determined by the definition of  
891 child and parent contained in this title.

892 (10) "Devise," when used as a noun, means a testamentary disposition of real or  
893 personal property and, when used as a verb, means to dispose of real or personal property by

894 will.

895 (11) "Devisee" means any person designated in a will to receive a devise. For the  
896 purposes of Title 75, Chapter 3, Probate of Wills and Administration, in the case of a devise to  
897 an existing trust or trustee, or to a trustee in trust described by will, the trust or trustee is the  
898 devisee, and the beneficiaries are not devisees.

899 (12) "Disability" means cause for a protective order as described by Section 75-5-401.

900 (13) "Distributee" means any person who has received property of a decedent from his  
901 personal representative other than as a creditor or purchaser. A testamentary trustee is a  
902 distributee only to the extent of distributed assets or increment thereto remaining in his hands.  
903 A beneficiary of a testamentary trust to whom the trustee has distributed property received from  
904 a personal representative is a distributee of the personal representative. For purposes of this  
905 provision, "testamentary trustee" includes a trustee to whom assets are transferred by will, to  
906 the extent of the devised assets.

907 (14) "Estate" includes the property of the decedent, trust, or other person whose affairs  
908 are subject to this title as originally constituted and as it exists from time to time during  
909 administration.

910 (15) "Exempt property" means that property of a decedent's estate which is described in  
911 Section 75-2-403.

912 (16) "Fiduciary" includes a personal representative, guardian, conservator, and trustee.

913 (17) "Foreign personal representative" means a personal representative of another  
914 jurisdiction.

915 (18) "Formal proceedings" means proceedings conducted before a judge with notice to  
916 interested persons.

917 (19) "Governing instrument" means a deed, will, trust, insurance or annuity policy,  
918 account with POD designation, security registered in beneficiary form (TOD), pension,  
919 profit-sharing, retirement, or similar benefit plan, instrument creating or exercising a power of  
920 appointment or a power of attorney, or a dispositive, appointive, or nominative instrument of  
921 any similar type.

922 (20) "Guardian" means a person who has qualified as a guardian of a minor or  
923 incapacitated person pursuant to testamentary or court appointment, but excludes one who is  
924 merely a guardian ad litem.

925 (21) "Heirs," except as controlled by Section 75-2-711, means persons, including the  
926 surviving spouse and state, who are entitled under the statutes of intestate succession to the  
927 property of a decedent.

928 (22) "Incapacitated person" means any person who is impaired by reason of mental  
929 illness, mental deficiency, physical illness or disability, chronic use of drugs, chronic  
930 intoxication, or other cause, except minority, to the extent of lacking sufficient understanding  
931 or capacity to make or communicate responsible decisions.

932 (23) "Informal proceedings" mean those conducted without notice to interested persons  
933 by an officer of the court acting as a registrar for probate of a will or appointment of a personal  
934 representative.

935 (24) "Interested person" includes heirs, devisees, children, spouses, creditors,  
936 beneficiaries, and any others having a property right in or claim against a trust estate or the  
937 estate of a decedent, ward, or protected person. It also includes persons having priority for  
938 appointment as personal representative and other fiduciaries representing interested persons.  
939 The meaning as it relates to particular persons may vary from time to time and shall be  
940 determined according to the particular purposes of, and matter involved in, any proceeding.

941 (25) "Issue" of a person means descendant as defined in Subsection (9).

942 (26) "Joint tenants with the right of survivorship" and "community property with the  
943 right of survivorship" includes coowners of property held under circumstances that entitle one  
944 or more to the whole of the property on the death of the other or others, but excludes forms of  
945 coownership registration in which the underlying ownership of each party is in proportion to  
946 that party's contribution.

947 (27) "Lease" includes an oil, gas, or other mineral lease.

948 (28) "Letters" includes letters testamentary, letters of guardianship, letters of  
949 administration, and letters of conservatorship.

950 (29) "Minor" means a person who is under 18 years of age.

951 (30) "Mortgage" means any conveyance, agreement, or arrangement in which property  
952 is used as security.

953 (31) "Nonresident decedent" means a decedent who was domiciled in another  
954 jurisdiction at the time of his death.

955 (32) "Organization" includes a corporation, limited liability company, business trust,

956 estate, trust, partnership, joint venture, association, government or governmental subdivision or  
957 agency, or any other legal or commercial entity.

958 (33) "Parent" includes any person entitled to take, or who would be entitled to take if  
959 the child died without a will, as a parent under this code by intestate succession from the child  
960 whose relationship is in question and excludes any person who is only a stepparent, foster  
961 parent, or grandparent.

962 (34) "Payor" means a trustee, insurer, business entity, employer, government,  
963 governmental agency or subdivision, or any other person authorized or obligated by law or a  
964 governing instrument to make payments.

965 (35) "Person" means an individual or an organization.

966 (36) (a) "Personal representative" includes executor, administrator, successor personal  
967 representative, special administrator, and persons who perform substantially the same function  
968 under the law governing their status.

969 (b) "General personal representative" excludes special administrator.

970 (37) "Petition" means a written request to the court for an order after notice.

971 (38) "Proceeding" includes action at law and suit in equity.

972 (39) "Property" includes both real and personal property or any interest therein and  
973 means anything that may be the subject of ownership.

974 (40) "Protected person" means a person for whom a conservator has been appointed. A  
975 "minor protected person" means a minor for whom a conservator has been appointed because  
976 of minority.

977 (41) "Protective proceeding" means a proceeding described in Section 75-5-401.

978 (42) "Registrar" refers to the official of the court designated to perform the functions of  
979 registrar as provided in Section 75-1-307.

980 (43) "Security" includes any note, stock, treasury stock, bond, debenture, evidence of  
981 indebtedness, certificate of interest, or participation in an oil, gas, or mining title or lease or in  
982 payments out of production under such a title or lease, collateral trust certificate, transferable  
983 share, voting trust certificate, and, in general, any interest or instrument commonly known as a  
984 security, or any certificate of interest or participation, any temporary or interim certificate,  
985 receipt, or certificate of deposit for, or any warrant or right to subscribe to or purchase, any of  
986 the foregoing.

987 (44) "Settlement," in reference to a decedent's estate, includes the full process of  
988 administration, distribution, and closing.

989 (45) "Special administrator" means a personal representative as described in Sections  
990 75-3-614 through 75-3-618.

991 (46) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the  
992 Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or any territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction  
993 of the United States.

994 (47) "Successor personal representative" means a personal representative, other than a  
995 special administrator, who is appointed to succeed a previously appointed personal  
996 representative.

997 (48) "Successors" means persons, other than creditors, who are entitled to property of a  
998 decedent under the decedent's will or this title.

999 (49) "Supervised administration" refers to the proceedings described in Title 75,  
1000 Chapter 3, Part 5, Supervised Administration.

1001 (50) "Survive," except for purposes of Part 3 of Article VI, Uniform TOD Security  
1002 Registration Act, means that an individual has neither predeceased an event, including the  
1003 death of another individual, nor is considered to have predeceased an event under Section  
1004 75-2-104 or 75-2-702. The term includes its derivatives, such as "survives," "survived,"  
1005 "survivor," and "surviving."

1006 (51) "Testacy proceeding" means a proceeding to establish a will or determine  
1007 intestacy.

1008 (52) "Testator" includes an individual of either sex.

1009 (53) "Trust" includes any express trust, private or charitable, with additions thereto,  
1010 wherever and however created. The term also includes a trust created or determined by  
1011 judgment or decree under which the trust is to be administered in the manner of an express  
1012 trust. The term excludes other constructive trusts, and it excludes resulting trusts,  
1013 conservatorships, personal representatives, trust accounts as defined in Title 75, Chapter 6,  
1014 Nonprobate Transfers, custodial arrangements pursuant to any Uniform Transfers To Minors  
1015 Act, business trusts providing for certificates to be issued to beneficiaries, common trust funds,  
1016 voting trusts, preneed funeral plans under Title 58, Chapter [58] 9, [Preneed] Funeral  
1017 [Arrangement] Services Licensing Act, security arrangements, liquidation trusts, and trusts for

1018 the primary purpose of paying debts, dividends, interest, salaries, wages, profits, pensions, or  
1019 employee benefits of any kind, and any arrangement under which a person is nominee or  
1020 escrowee for another.

1021 (54) "Trustee" includes an original, additional, or successor trustee, whether or not  
1022 appointed or confirmed by the court.

1023 (55) "Ward" means a person for whom a guardian has been appointed. A "minor ward"  
1024 is a minor for whom a guardian has been appointed solely because of minority.

1025 (56) "Will" includes codicil and any testamentary instrument which merely appoints an  
1026 executor, revokes or revises another will, nominates a guardian, or expressly excludes or limits  
1027 the right of an individual or class to succeed to property of the decedent passing by intestate  
1028 succession.
