SUICIDE PREVENTION PLAN

Representative **David L. Hogue** proposes the following amendments:

1. *Page 1, Lines 15 through 18:*

15 prevention plan prior to November 1, 2006;

16 ▶ requires the division to develop the plan with the input of specified groups; ~~{and}~~

17 ▶ requires the division to submit the plan to the Health and Human Services Interim

18 Committee at or before the committee's November 2006 interim meeting ~~{-}~~ ∴

▶ requires the division to conduct a study regarding the relationship between suicide by minors and the use of illegal drugs, psychotropic drugs, and other drugs used for the treatment of mental illness; and

▶ requires the division to submit the results of the study described in the preceding paragraph to the Health and Human Services Committee at or before the committee's November 2006 interim meeting.

2. *Page 2, Lines 54 through 56:*

54 (3) The Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health shall submit the suicide

55 prevention plan developed under Subsection (1) , and the results of the study described in Subsection (4),
to the Health and Human Services Interim

56 Committee at or before the committee's November 2006 interim meeting.

(4) Within existing budgets, the Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health shall conduct a study to determine how many of the minors who committed suicide within the state during the most recent three years for which the data is available:

(a) were taking any of the following at the time that the minor committed suicide:

(i) illegal drugs;

(ii) stimulants;

(iii) antidepressants;

(iv) antipsychotic drugs;

(v) anti-anxiety drugs;

(vi) mood stabilizers; or

(vii) psychotropic drugs;

(b) were under psychological or psychiatric treatment or care at the time that the minor committed suicide; and

(c) if it is possible to obtain the data, had taken a drug described in Subsection (4)(a) within the three months immediately preceding the day on which the minor committed suicide, but not at the time of the suicide.
