	Section 1. Section <b>53A-1-611</b> is amended to read:
2	53A-1-611. Standards and assessment processes to measure student performance
	Basic skills competency test Appeal of ineligibility for basic high school diploma
	Exemption for adult education diploma Distinguished diploma.
	(1) The Legislature recognizes the need for the State Board of Education to develop
	and implement standards and assessment processes to ensure that student progress is measured
	and that school boards and school personnel are accountable.
	(2) (a) In addition to its responsibilities under Sections 53A-1-603 through 53A-1-605,
	the State Board of Education, through the state superintendent of public instruction, shall
	design a basic skills competency test to be administered in the tenth grade.
	(b) A student must pass the basic skills competency test, in addition to the established
	requirements of the state and local board of education of the district in which the student
	attends school, in order to receive a basic high school diploma of graduation.
	(c) The state board shall include in the test, at a minimum, components on English
