26	(1) (a) The following-named days are legal holidays in this state:
27	(i) every Sunday;
28	(ii) January 1, called New Year's Day;
29	(iii) the third Monday of January, called Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day;
30	(iv) the third Monday of February, called Washington and Lincoln Day;
31	(v) the last Monday of May, called:

47	(d) Each employee may select one additional day, called Personal Preference Day, to

49	(2) (a) Whenever in the governor's opinion extraordinary conditions exist justifying the
