-53A-15-106. Maximum class size in kindergarten through grade 3 -- Exception --

Qualifications of a paraprofessional assigned to a class that exceeds the maximum class size.

(1) As used in this section:

<u>(a) "Core curriculum course" means a language arts, mathematics, science, or social</u> studies course.

(b) "Direct supervision of a licensed teacher" means the teacher:

(i) prepares the lesson and plans the instructional support activities the paraprofessional carries out; and

(ii) evaluates the achievement of the students with whom the paraprofessional works.

(c) "Paraprofessional" means an individual who:

(i) works under the direct supervision of a licensed teacher; and

(ii) meets the qualifications established in Subsection (4).

(2) Except as provided in Subsection (3), the maximum number of students assigned to a teacher who is teaching a core curriculum course may not exceed:

(a) 20 students for a kindergarten class, beginning with the 2013-14 school year;

(b) 22 students for a first grade class, beginning with the 2014-15 school year;

(c) 22 students for a second grade class, beginning with the 2015-16 school year; and

(d) 24 students for a third grade class, beginning with the 2016-17 school year.

(3) The number of students assigned to a teacher who is teaching a core curriculum course may exceed the maximum class size specified in Subsection (2) if a paraprofessional is assigned to the class for the entire duration of the core curriculum course.

(4) A paraprofessional who is assigned to a class pursuant to Subsection (3) shall have: (a) (i) earned a secondary school diploma or a recognized equivalent; and

<u>(ii) (A) completed at least two years with a minimum of 48 semester hours at an</u> <u>accredited higher education institution; or</u>

(B) obtained an associate's or higher degree from an accredited higher education institution; or

(b) satisfied a rigorous state or local assessment of the individual's knowledge of, and ability to assist in instructing students in, reading, writing, and mathematics.

(1) Money appropriated to the State Board of Education for class size reduction shall be used to reduce the average class size in kindergarten through the eighth grade in the state's public schools.

(2) (a) A school district or charter school is eligible to receive money appropriated under Subsection (1) if the school district or charter school complies with the requirements in Section 53A-15-106 to limit class size in kindergarten through grade 3 or assign a paraprofessional to a class that exceeds the maximum class size.

(b) (i) Each district <u>or charter school</u> shall use 50% of its allocation to reduce class size in any one or all of grades kindergarten through grade [two] 2, with an emphasis on improving student reading skills.

(ii) If a district's <u>or charter school's</u> average class size is below 18 in grades kindergarten through [two] grade 2, it may petition the state board for, and the state board may grant, a waiver to use its allocation under Subsection (3)(b)(i) for class size reduction in the other grades.

(4) Schools may use nontraditional innovative and creative methods to reduce class sizes with this appropriation and may use part of their allocation to focus on class size reduction for specific groups, such as at risk students, or for specific blocks of time during the school day.

(5) (a) A school district <u>or charter school</u> may use up to 20% of its allocation under Subsection (1) for capital facilities projects if such projects would help to reduce class size.

(b) If a school district's <u>or charter school's</u> student population increases by 5% or 700 students from the previous school year, the school district <u>or charter school</u> may use up to 50% of any allocation it receives under this section for classroom construction.

(6) This appropriation is to supplement any other appropriation made for class size reduction.

(7) The Legislature shall provide for an annual adjustment in the appropriation authorized under this section in proportion to the increase in the number of students in the state in kindergarten through grade eight.

(b) The plan and report required pursuant to Subsection (8)(a) shall include the following information:

(i) (A) the number of teachers employed using class size reduction money;

(B) the amount of class size reduction money expended for teachers; and

(C) if supplemental school district or charter school funds are expended to pay for

teachers employed using class size reduction money, the amount of the supplemental money;

(ii) (A) the number of paraprofessionals employed using class size reduction money;

(B) the amount of class size reduction money expended for paraprofessionals; and

(C) if supplemental school district or charter school funds are expended to pay for paraprofessionals employed using class size reduction money, the amount of the supplemental money; and

(iii) the amount of class size reduction money expended for capital facilities.

(c) The information required to be reported in Subsections (8)(b)(i)(A) through (C) and (8)(b)(ii)(A) through (C) shall be categorized by a teacher's or paraprofessional's teaching assignment, such as the grade level, course, or subject taught.

(d) Based on the data contained in the class size reduction plans and reports submitted by school districts and charter schools, and data on average class size, the State Board of Education shall annually report to the Education Interim Committee on the impact of class size reduction money on class size.
