## H.B. 393 COMPETENCY-BASED EDUCATION AMENDMENTS

Representative **Gregory H. Hughes** proposes the following amendments:

- 1. Page 1, Lines 12 through 16:
  - requires that, before the 2014 General Session, the State Board of Education make
    recommendations on a possible funding formula for competency-based {-courses-} <u>education</u>; and
    allows a school district or charter school to establish competency-based {-curriculum
    standards-} education programs and assessments that would result in course credit if the student
  - 16 demonstrates competency in the subject.
- 2. Page 2, Lines 51 through 52:
  - 51 (B) a course-level funding formula that distributes funds to school districts and charter
  - 52 <u>schools that establish competency-based</u> {<u>curriculum standards</u>} <u>education</u> ;
- 3. Page 3, Lines 60 through 61:
  - 60 (c) assist school districts and charter schools to develop and implement:
  - 61 (i) competency-based education {<u>-and competency-based curriculum standards</u>}; and

- 70 (c) distribute remaining funds based on a student's successful completion of a course
- 71 through demonstrated competency and subject mastery ; and
- 72 (d) not be dependent on the amount of time a student is instructed in the course or the
- 73 <u>age of the student.</u>
- 74 (4) {(a)} A local school board or a charter school governing board may establish
- 75 {<u>competency-based curriculum standards that exceed the minimum standards established by the</u>
- 76 <u>State Board of Education under Section 53A-1-402.</u>
- 77 (b) In establishing the competency-based curriculum standards described in Subsection
- 78 (4)(a), a local school board or a charter school governing board shall ensure that the standards:
- 79 <u>(i) promote greater educational achievement for students;</u>
- 80 <u>(ii) allow a student to progress through the curriculum to graduation at the student's</u>
- 81 <u>own pace;</u>
- 82 <u>(iii) foster student advancement based on competency and not chronological age of the</u>
- 83 <u>student;</u>
- 84 <u>(iv) eliminate requirements for the student to be in a classroom for a certain amount of</u>

- 86 <u>(v) prepare students for admission to higher education institutions in the United States</u>
- 87 <u>without the need for remediation</u> <u>a competency-based education program</u> <u>.</u>
- 88 (5) A local school board or charter school governing board that establishes **a**
- 89 <u>competency-based</u> {<u>curriculum standards under Subsection (4)</u>} <u>education program</u> <u>shall:</u>
- 90 (a) establish assessments to accurately measure competency;
- 5. Page 4, Lines 91 through 92:
  - 91 (b) provide the assessments to an enrolled student at no cost to the student; and
  - 92 (c) award credit to a student who demonstrates competency and subject mastery ;
- 6. Page 4, Lines 100 through 105:
