8	General Description:
9	This bill modifies Title 58, Chapter 47b, Massage Therapy Practice Act, by exempting
0	certain individuals from licensure under the act.
1	Highlighted Provisions:
2	This bill:
3	• exempts an individual from licensure as a massage therapist if the individual is
4	certified by, and in good standing with, a nationally recognized association that
5	represents a profession with established standards and ethics and:
6	• engages in the manipulation of the soft tissues of the body to the hands, feet, and
7	outer ears only, including the practice of reflexology and foot zone therapy; and
8	• the individual's clients remain fully clothed from the shoulders to the knees; and
9	makes technical changes.

3	This bill coordinates with H.B. 324, Ortho-Bionomy Exemption Amendments, by
24	providing substantive and technical amendments.

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31	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
32	Section 1. Section 58-47b-304 is amended to read:
33	58-47b-304. Exemptions from licensure.
34	(1) In addition to the exemptions from licensure in Section 58-1-307, the following
35	individuals may engage in the practice of massage therapy as defined under this chapter,
36	subject to the stated circumstances and limitations, without being licensed, but may not
37	represent themselves as a massage therapist or massage apprentice:
38	(a) [physicians and surgeons] a physician or surgeon licensed under Title 58, Chapter
39	67, Utah Medical Practice Act;
40	(b) [nurses] a nurse licensed under Title 58, Chapter 31b, Nurse Practice Act, or under
41	Title 58, Chapter 44a, Nurse Midwife Practice Act;
42	(c) [physical therapists] a physical therapist licensed under Title 58, Chapter 24b,
43	Physical Therapy Practice Act;
44	(d) [physical therapist assistants] a physical therapist assistant licensed under Title 58,
45	Chapter 24b, Physical Therapy Practice Act, while under the general supervision of a physical
46	therapist;
47	(e) [osteopathic physicians and surgeons] an osteopathic physician or surgeon licensed
48	under Title 58, Chapter 68, Utah Osteopathic Medical Practice Act;
49	(f) [chiropractic physicians] a chiropractic physician licensed under Title 58, Chapter
50	73, Chiropractic Physician Practice Act;
51	(g) [hospital staff members] a hospital staff member employed by a hospital, who
52	[practice] practices massage as part of [their] the staff member's responsibilities;
53	[(h) athletic trainers who practice massage as part of their responsibilities while
54	employed by an educational institution or an athletic team that participates in organized sports
55	competition;]
56	(h) an athletic trainer licensed under Title 58, Chapter 40a, Athletic Trainer Licensing
57	Act;

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58	(i) [students] a student in training enrolled in a massage therapy school approved by the
59	division;
60	(j) [naturopathic physicians] a naturopathic physician licensed under Title 58, Chapter
61	71, Naturopathic Physician Practice Act;
62	(k) <u>an</u> occupational therapist licensed under Title 58, Chapter 42a, Occupational
63	Therapy Practice Act; [and]
64	(l) [persons] an individual performing gratuitous massage[-]; and
65	(m) an individual certified by or through, and in good standing with, an industry
66	recognized organization that represents a profession with established standards and ethics:
67	(i) who engages in the manipulation of the soft tissues of the body to the hands, feet,
68	and outer ears only, including the practice of reflexology and foot zone therapy;
69	(ii) whose clients remain fully clothed from the shoulders to the knees; and
70	(iii) whose clients do not receive gratuitous massage from the individual.
71	(2) This chapter may not be construed to authorize any individual licensed under this
72	chapter to engage in any manner in the practice of medicine as defined by the laws of this state.
73	(3) This chapter may not be construed to:
74	(a) [create or] require insurance coverage or reimbursement for massage therapy from
75	third party payors [if this type of coverage did not exist on or before February 15, 1990]; or
76	(b) prevent [any] an insurance carrier from offering coverage for massage therapy.
77	Section 2. Coordinating H.B. 207 with H.B. 324 Substantive and technical
78	amendments.
79	If this H.B. 207 and H.B. 324, Ortho-Bionomy Exemption Amendments, both pass and
80	become law, the Legislature intends that:
81	(1) this coordinating clause supersedes the coordinating clause contained in H.B. 324;
82	<u>and</u>
83	(2) the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel, in preparing the Utah
84	Code database for publication, modify Subsection 58-47b-304(1)(m) to read:
85	"(m) an individual:

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(i) certified by or through, and in good standing with, an industry organization that is			
recognized by the division, and that represents a profession with established standards and			
ethics;			
(ii) (A) who limits the manipulation of the soft tissues of the body to the hands, feet,			
and outer ears only, including the practice of reflexology and foot zone therapy; or			
(B) who is certified to practice ortho-bionomy and whose practice is limited to the			
scope of practice of ortho-bionomy;			
(iii) whose clients remain fully clothed from the shoulders to the knees; and			
(iv) whose clients do not receive gratuitous massage from the individual."
