General Description:
This bill modifies Title 58, Chapter 47b, Massage Therapy Practice Act, by exempting
the practice of Ortho-Bionomy from licensure under the act.

ethics and uses touch, words, and directed movement to deepen awareness of

(j) [naturopathic physicians] a naturopathic physician licensed under Title 58, Chap	oter

61	(l) [persons] an individual performing gratuitous massage[-]; and
62	(m) an individual engaged within the scope of practice of a profession with established
63	standards and ethics who uses touch, words, and directed movement to deepen awareness of
64	existing patterns of movement in the body or to suggest new possibilities of movement,
65	including the practice of Ortho-Bionomy.
66	(2) This chapter may not be construed to authorize any individual licensed under this
67	chapter to engage in any manner in the practice of medicine as defined by the laws of this state.
68	(3) This chapter may not be construed to:
69	(a) [ereate or] require insurance coverage or reimbursement for massage therapy from
70	third party payors [if this type of coverage did not exist on or before February 15, 1990]; or
71	(b) prevent [any] an insurance carrier from offering coverage for massage therapy.
72	Section 2. Coordinating H.B. 324 with H.B. 207 Substantive and technical
73	amendments.
74	If this H.B. 324 and H.B. 207, Massage Therapy Practice Act Amendments, both pass
75	and become law, the Legislature intends that the Office of Legislative Research and General
76	Counsel, in preparing the Utah Code database for publication, modify Subsection
77	58-47b-304(1)(m) to read:
78	"(m) an individual engaged within the scope of practice of a profession with
79	established standards and ethics:
80	(i) who limits the manipulation of the soft tissues of the body to the hands, feet, and
81	ears only, including the practice of reflexology and foot zone therapy;
82	(ii) who uses touch, words, and directed movement to deepen awareness of existing
83	patterns of movement in the body or to suggest new possibilities of movement, including the
84	practice of Ortho-Bionomy, the Feldenkrais method, the Trager approach, and body-mind
85	centering; or
86	(iii) in which touch is limited to that which is essential for palpation and affectation of
87	the human energy system."
