8	General Description:
9	This bill modifies the Naturopathic Physician Practice Act by amending definitions and
10	membership of a naturopathic formulary advisory peer committee.
11	Highlighted Provisions:
12	This bill:
13	 permits a naturopath to administer certain percutaneous injections;
14	 adds a licensed physician to the naturopathic formulary advisory peer committee;

In addition to the definitions in Section 58-1-102, as used in this chapter:

30	$\left[\frac{(2)}{(1)}\right]$ "Acupuncture" has the same definition as in Section 58-72-102.
31	[(1)] (2) "Administrative penalty" means a monetary fine imposed by the division for
32	acts or omissions determined to constitute unprofessional or unlawful conduct, as a result of an
33	adjudicative proceeding conducted in accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 4, Administrative
34	Procedures Act.
35	(3) "Board" means the Naturopathic Physicians Licensing Board created in Section
36	58-71-201.
37	(4) "Diagnose" means:
38	(a) to examine in any manner another person, parts of a person's body, substances,
39	fluids, or materials excreted, taken, or removed from a person's body, or produced by a person's
40	body, to determine the source, nature, kind, or extent of a disease or other physical or mental
41	condition;
42	(b) to attempt to conduct an examination or determination described under Subsection
43	(4)(a);
44	(c) to hold oneself out as making or to represent that one is making an examination or
45	determination as described in Subsection (4)(a); or
46	(d) to make an examination or determination as described in Subsection (4)(a) upon or
47	from information supplied directly or indirectly by another person, whether or not in the
48	presence of the person making or attempting the diagnosis or examination.
49	(5) "Local anesthesia" means an agent, whether a natural medicine or <u>nonscheduled</u>
50	prescription drug, which:
51	(a) is applied topically or by injection [in superficial tissues] associated with the
52	performance of minor office procedures;
53	(b) has the ability to produce loss of sensation at the site of minor office procedures;
54	and
55	(c) does not cause loss of consciousness or produce general sedation.
56	(6) "Medical naturopathic assistant" means an unlicensed individual working under the
57	direct and immediate supervision of a licensed naturopathic physician and engaged in specific

58	tasks assigned by the licensed naturopathic physician in accordance with the standards and
59	ethics of the profession.
60	(7) (a) "Minor office procedures" means:
61	(i) the use of operative, electrical, or other methods for repair and care of superficial
62	lacerations, abrasions, and benign lesions;
63	(ii) removal of foreign bodies located in the superficial tissues, excluding the eye or
64	ear; [and]
65	(iii) the use of antiseptics and local anesthetics in connection with minor office surgical
66	procedures[-]; and
67	(iv) if approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, percutaneous
68	injection into skin, tendons, ligaments, muscles, and joints with:
69	(A) local anesthetics and nonscheduled prescription medications; and
70	(B) natural substances.
71	(b) "Minor office procedures" does not include:
72	(i) general or spinal anesthesia;
73	(ii) office procedures more complicated or extensive than those set forth in Subsection
74	(7)(a);
75	(iii) procedures involving the eye; [or] and
76	(iv) any office procedure involving tendons, nerves, veins, or arteries.
77	(8) "Natural medicine" means:
78	(a) food, food extracts, dietary supplements as defined by the federal Food, Drug, and
79	Cosmetics Act, all homeopathic remedies, and plant substances that are not designated as
80	prescription drugs or controlled substances;
81	(b) over-the-counter medications;
82	(c) other nonprescription substances, the prescription or administration of which is not
83	otherwise prohibited or restricted under federal or state law;
84	(d) prescription drugs:
85	(i) that, except as provided in Subsection (8)(e), are not controlled substances as

defined in Section 58-37-2;
(ii) the prescription of which is consistent with the competent practice of naturopathic
medicine; and
(iii) the prescription of which is approved by the division in collaboration with the
naturopathic formulary advisory peer committee; and
(e) testosterone, if the testosterone is:
(i) bio-identical;
(ii) designed to be:
(A) administered topically, for transdermal absorption; or
(B) absorbed across the mucosal membranes of the mouth; and
(iii) prescribed or administered, in accordance with the requirements of federal and
state law, solely for the purpose of treating a patient with a low testosterone level in order to
restore the patient to a normal testosterone level.
(9) (a) "Naturopathic childbirth" means uncomplicated natural childbirth assisted by a
naturopathic physician, and includes the use of:
(i) natural medicines; and
(ii) uncomplicated episiotomy.
(b) "Naturopathic childbirth" does not include the use of:
(i) forceps delivery;
(ii) general or spinal anesthesia;
(iii) caesarean section delivery; or
(iv) induced labor or abortion.
(10) "Naturopathic mobilization therapy":
(a) means manually administering mechanical treatment of body structures or tissues
for the purpose of restoring normal physiological function to the body by normalizing and
balancing the musculoskeletal system of the body;
(b) does not mean manipulation or adjustment of the joints of the human body beyond
the elastic barrier; and

114	(c) does not include manipulation as [defined] used in Title 58, Chapter 73,
115	Chiropractic Physician Practice Act.
116	(11) (a) "Naturopathic physical medicine" means the use of the physical agents of air,
117	water, heat, cold, sound, light, and electromagnetic nonionizing radiation, and the physical
118	modalities of electrotherapy, acupuncture, diathermy, ultraviolet light, ultrasound,
119	hydrotherapy, naturopathic mobilization therapy, and exercise.
120	(b) "Naturopathic physical medicine" does not include the practice of physical therapy
121	or physical rehabilitation.
122	(12) "Practice of naturopathic medicine" means:
123	(a) a system of primary health care for the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of
124	human health conditions, injuries, and diseases that uses education, natural medicines, and
125	natural therapies, to support and stimulate the patient's intrinsic self-healing processes:
126	(i) using naturopathic childbirth, but only if:
127	(A) the licensee meets standards of the American College of Naturopathic
128	Obstetricians (ACNO) or its successor as determined by the division in collaboration with the
129	board; and
130	(B) the licensee follows a written plan for naturopathic physicians practicing
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131	naturopathic childbirth approved by the division in collaboration with the board, which

147	(ix) taking and using diagnostic x-rays, electrocardiograms, ultrasound, and
148	physiological function tests;
149	(x) taking of body fluids for clinical laboratory tests and using the results of the tests in
150	diagnosis;
151	(xi) taking of a history from and conducting of a physical examination upon a human
152	patient; and
153	(xii) prescribing and administering natural medicines and medical devices, except a
154	naturopathic physician may only administer:
155	(A) a prescription drug, as defined in Section 58-17b-102, in accordance with
156	Subsection (8)(d); and
157	(B) local anesthesia that is not a controlled substance, and only in the performance of
158	minor office procedures;
159	(b) to maintain an office or place of business for the purpose of doing any of the acts
160	described in Subsection (12)(a), whether or not for compensation; or
161	(c) to use, in the conduct of any occupation or profession pertaining to the diagnosis or
162	treatment of human diseases or conditions, in any printed material, stationery, letterhead,
163	envelopes, signs, or advertisements, the designation "naturopathic physician," "naturopathic
164	doctor," "naturopath," "doctor of naturopathic medicine," "doctor of naturopathy,"
165	"naturopathic medical doctor," "naturopathic medicine," "naturopathic health care,"
166	"naturopathy," "N.D.," "N.M.D.," or any combination of these designations in any manner that
167	might cause a reasonable person to believe the individual using the designation is a licensed
168	naturopathic physician.
169	(13) "Prescribe" means to issue a prescription:

170 (a) orally or in writing; or (b) by telephone, facsimile transmission, computer, or other electronic means of 171 communication as defined by division rule. 172 173 (14) "Prescription device" means an instrument, apparatus, implement, machine, contrivance, implant, in vitro reagent, or other similar or related article, and any component 174 175 part or accessory, which is required under federal or state law to be prescribed by a practitioner 176 and dispensed by or through a person or entity licensed under this chapter or exempt from 177 licensure under this chapter. 178 (15) "Prescription drug" means a drug that is required by federal or state law or rule to 179 be dispensed only by prescription or is restricted to administration only by practitioners. (16) "Unlawful conduct" is as defined in Sections 58-1-501 and 58-71-501. 180 (17) "Unprofessional conduct" is as defined in Sections 58-1-501 and 58-71-502, and 181 182 as may be further defined by division rule. 183 Section 2. Section 58-71-202 is amended to read: 58-71-202. Naturopathic formulary peer committee. 184 185 (1) The division shall establish a naturopathic formulary advisory peer committee 186 under Subsection 58-1-203(1)(f) to make recommendations to the board for the naturopathic 187 formulary which shall: (a) consist of noncontrolled legend medications deemed appropriate for the scope of 188 189 practice of naturopathic physicians; and 190 (b) include all homeopathic remedies. 191 (2) The committee shall consist of five members: 192 (a) one naturopathic physician who is a member of the board; 193 (b) [three] two naturopathic physicians who are not members of the board; [and] 194 (c) one licensed pharmacist who is also a pharmacognosist[-]; and 195 (d) one physician licensed under Chapter 67, Utah Medical Practice Act, or Chapter 68, 196 Utah Osteopathic Medical Practice Act.

197 (3) The committee members shall:

- 198 (a) be appointed by the director of the division;
- (b) be appointed and serve in accordance with Section 58-1-201, except as those
- 200 provisions are modified by this section; and
- 201 (c) serve without compensation, travel costs, or per diem for their services.
- 202 (4) The committee and the division may seek input from other licensing boards.
