LONG TITLE
Committee Note:
The Education Interim Committee recommended this bill.
General Description:
This bill modifies and enacts provisions regarding early grade academic improvement.
Highlighted Provisions:
This bill:
requires the State Board of Education to:
 develop kindergarten entry and exit assessments for use by certain kindergarten
student academic improvement programs; and
• administer a grant program to support certain kindergarten student academic
improvement programs; and
 recodifies and makes technical changes to provisions related to early interactive
reading software.
Money Appropriated in this Bill:

37	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
38	Section 1. Section 53A-17a-167 is repealed and reenacted to read:
39	53A-17a-167. Grant funding for optional enhanced kindergarten programs.
40	(1) As used in this section:
41	(a) "Board" means the State Board of Education.
42	(b) "Local Education Agency" or "LEA" means a school district or charter school.
43	(c) "Optional enhanced kindergarten program" or "OEK program" means a program to
44	improve the academic competency of kindergarten students that:
45	(i) meets the criteria described in Subsection (4)(a);
46	(ii) receives funding from a grant program described in Subsection (3); and
47	(iii) is delivered by an LEA.
48	(2) (a) In accordance with this section, the board shall distribute funds appropriated
49	under this section to support optional enhanced kindergarten programs.
50	(b) The board may use up to 1% of the funds described in Subsection (2)(a) for the
51	administrative cost of running the grant programs described in Subsection (3).
52	(c) The board shall develop kindergarten entry and exit assessments for use by an OEK
53	program.
54	(3) (a) The board shall administer a qualifying base amount grant program and a
55	competitive grant program as described in this Subsection (3) to distribute funds described in
56	Subsection (2)(a) to LEAs that:
57	(i) apply for a grant; and
58	(ii) offer a kindergarten student academic improvement program that meets the

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59	requirements described in Subsection (4).
60	(b) For each LEA that meets the criteria described in Subsection (3)(a), the board shall
51	administer a base amount grant to fund a minimum OEK program, taking into consideration:
62	(i) the number of the LEA's students who were eligible to receive free lunch in the
63	prior school year; and
54	(ii) the LEA's overall need for an OEK program, based on the results of the LEA's
65	kindergarten entry and exit assessments described in Subsection (4)(b)(ii).
66	(c) After distributing the base amount grants as described in Subsection (3)(b), the
67	board shall, on a competitive basis, distribute remaining grant money to one or more LEAs that
58	received a base amount grant under Subsection (3)(b), taking into consideration:
59	(i) the success of an LEA's OEK program, based on the results of the LEA's
70	kindergarten entry and exit assessments described in Subsection (4)(b)(ii); and

73	(4) An LEA that receives a grant as described in Subsection (3) shall:

77	student's grade 3 year;
78	(ii) uses an evidence-based early intervention model;
79	(iii) focuses on academically improving age-appropriate literacy and numeracy skills;
80	(iv) emphasizes the use of live instruction;
31	(v) administers the kindergarten entry and exit assessments described in Subsection
32	(2)(c); and
33	(vi) is delivered through additional hours or other means; and
34	(b) report to the board annually regarding:
35	(i) how the LEA used grant money received under Subsection (3); and
86	(ii) the results of the LEA's kindergarten entry and exit assessments for the prior year.
37	(5) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (5)(b), an LEA may not charge a fee for a
88	student to participate in an OEK program.
39	(b) If an LEA determines that the LEA's OEK program has additional space at a

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90	particular school after admitting the kindergarten students described in Subsection (4)(a)(i), the
91	LEA may charge a fee and admit additional kindergarten students not described in Subsection
92	(4)(a)(i) to fill the additional space at the school.
93	(6) A parent or legal guardian may decline participation of the parent or legal
94	guardian's kindergarten student in an OEK program.
95	Section 2. Section 53a-17a-167.5 is enacted to read:
96	53a-17a-167.5. Early intervention educational technology program.
97	(1) As used in this section:
98	(a) "Dosage" means amount of instructional time.
99	(b) "License" means a license for the early interactive reading software described in
100	Subsection (3)(a) that is distributed by the State Board of Education under Subsection (3)(b).
101	(2) In accordance with this section, the State Board of Education shall administer an
102	early intervention technology program to improve reading skills of students in kindergarten
103	through grade 3 through the use of early interactive reading software.
104	(3) (a) Subject to legislative appropriations, the State Board of Education shall select
105	and contract with one or more technology providers, through a request for proposals process, to
106	provide early interactive reading software for literacy instruction and assessments for students
107	in kindergarten through grade 3.
108	(b) By August 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall distribute licenses to
109	school districts and charter schools that apply for the licenses.
110	(c) Except as provided in Subsection (4)(b), if a school district or charter school
111	received a license during the prior year, the State Board of Education shall give first priority to
112	the school district or charter school to receive an equivalent license during the current year.
113	(d) The State Board of Education shall distribute a license not described in Subsection
114	(3)(c) through a competitive process.
115	(4) (a) A public school that receives a license shall use the license:
116	(i) for a student in kindergarten or grade 1:
117	(A) for intervention for the student if the student is reading below grade level; or
118	(B) for advancement beyond grade level for the student if the student is reading at or
119	above grade level;
120	(ii) for a student in grade 2 or 3, for intervention for the student if the student is reading

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121	below grade level; and
122	(iii) in accordance with the technology provider's dosage recommendations.
123	(b) The State Board of Education may not distribute a license to a public school that
124	fails to use the early interaction reading software in accordance with the technology provider's
125	dosage recommendations for two consecutive years.
126	(5) (a) On or before August 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall select
127	and contract with an independent evaluator, through a request for proposals process, to act as
128	an independent contractor to evaluate early interactive reading software provided under this
129	section.
130	(b) The State Board of Education shall ensure that a contract with an independent
131	evaluator requires the independent evaluator to:
132	(i) evaluate a student's learning gains as a result of using early interactive reading
133	software provided under Subsection (3);
134	(ii) for an evaluation described in Subsection (5)(b)(i), use an assessment that is not
135	developed by a provider of early interactive reading software; and
136	(iii) determine the extent to which a public school uses the early interactive reading
137	software in accordance with a technology provider's dosage recommendations under
138	Subsection (4).
139	(c) The State Board of Education and the independent evaluator selected under
140	$\underline{Subsection\ (5)(a)\ shall\ report\ annually\ on\ the\ results\ of\ the\ evaluation\ to\ the\ Education\ Interim}$
141	Committee and the governor.
142	(d) The State Board of Education may use up to 4% of an appropriation provided to
143	fund this section to contract with an independent evaluator selected under Subsection (5)(a).
144	Section 3. Appropriation.
145	Under the terms and conditions of Title 63J, Chapter 1, Budgetary Procedures Act, for
146	the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017, the following sums of money
147	are appropriated from resources not otherwise appropriated, or reduced from amounts
148	previously appropriated, out of the funds or accounts indicated. These sums of money are in
149	addition to any amounts previously appropriated for fiscal year 2017.

161	(1) the State Board of Education shall use the money appropriated to the Optional
162	Enhanced Kindergarten Program as follows:
163	(a) \$7,500,000 for the qualifying base amount grant program described in Subsection
164	<u>53A-17a-167(3)(b);</u>
165	(b) \$9,250,000 for the competitive grant program described in Subsection
166	53A-17a-167(3)(c); and
167	(c) \$750,000 for the development of the kindergarten entry and exit assessments as
168	described in Subsection 53A-17a-167(2)(c); and
169	(2) the appropriation provided under this section not lapse.
