40	<u>36-29-201.</u> Creation and duties of the Business Experiential Learning Task Force.
41	(1) As used in this section, "task force" means the Utah Business Experiential Task
42	Force created in Subsection (2).
43	(2) There is created the Utah Business Experiential Learning Task Force composed of
44	the following members:
45	(a) the executive director of the Department of Workforce Services or the executive
46	director's designee;
47	(b) the executive director of the Governor's Office of Economic Development or the
48	executive director's designee;
49	(c) the chair of the State Board of Education or the chair's designee;
50	(d) the state career and technical education director;
51	(e) the commissioner of technical education or the commissioner's designee;
52	(f) the commissioner of higher education or a designee of the commissioner who

65	representatives of businesses or organizations that provide employment opportunities that

67	(4) The Senate member and, as selected by the president of the Senate, one industry
68	leader appointed by the president of the Senate shall serve as cochairs of the commission.
