•	WHEREAS, the state of Utah is regularly recognized as among the best states for
business	j ;
•	WHEREAS, Utah has led the nation in economic growth and job creation since the
Great R	ecession;
•	WHEREAS, the state's strong economic growth has been accompanied by robust
populati	on growth;

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29	WHEREAS, Utah recently reached 3,000,000 residents and is projected to reach
30	5,000,000 residents by 2050;
31	WHEREAS, Utah enjoys a variety of community types, from rural small towns to a
32	major urban center;
33	WHEREAS, the Wasatch Front is home to more than 2,000,000 residents, representing
34	nearly 85% of Utah's population and roughly an equal percentage of the state's economy;
35	WHEREAS, Utah is already among the most urbanized states in the nation based on the
36	concentration of the state's population in metropolitan areas;
37	WHEREAS, Utah's rapid urban growth should bolster job creation in rural communities
38	through supporting tourism, business expansion and teleworking, disciplined planning and
39	investment, and expanded export opportunities;
40	WHEREAS, continued population growth will occur in the state's metropolitan areas
41	and increase urbanization;
42	WHEREAS, the growth of metropolitan areas is among the most significant changes in
43	Utah's urban dynamics in a generation, presenting significant economic opportunities;
44	WHEREAS, nearly 75% of new jobs in the state since 2008 have been created in Utah's
45	metropolitan areas;
46	WHEREAS, the intersection of Utah's two largest counties at Point of the Mountain
47	represents a monumental shift to the economic and social integration of the region;
48	WHEREAS, the United States Office of Management and Budget delineates
49	metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas according to published standards that are
50	applied to United States Census Bureau data;
51	WHEREAS, Utah's metropolitan areas along the Wasatch Front have a high degree of
52	economic and social integration, but are currently divided into three metropolitan statistical
53	areas; and
54	WHEREAS, this division does not comprehensively represent the collective
55	integration, economic growth, and urbanization of these areas, which can have a material

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56 impact on the state's national profile, economic development opportunities, and ability to create 57 a regional approach to addressing long-term population growth: 58 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah, the 59 Governor concurring therein, recognizes Utah's robust economic growth and urbanization. 60 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature and the Governor recognize that the 61 state's metropolitan areas need forward thinking planning and zoning, appropriate infrastructure 62 investment, and a talented workforce in order to continue to grow economically and enhance 63 the quality of life for Utah residents. 64 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature and the Governor request that the 65 United States Office of Management and Budget review Utah's metropolitan statistical area 66 designations to better reflect the high degree of economic and social integration along the 67 Wasatch Front. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the director of 68 69 the United States Office of Management and Budget and the members of Utah's congressional 70 delegation.
