441	(a) how best to provide the emergency services within the county;
442	(b) what needs to happen for the PSAPs within the county to achieve a transfer rate, as
443	defined in Section 69-2-204, of 2% or less; [and]
444	(c) whether the county could provide more cost efficient emergency service or improve
445	public safety by establishing a single public safety answering point for the county[-]; and
446	(d) the extent to which the dispatch center's policies, procedures, or interlocal
447	agreements cause a PSAP to experience difficulty in meeting the requirements of Section
448	<u>63H-7a-304.5.</u>
449	(3) (a) Each public safety answering point shall participate and cooperate in the audit
450	described in Subsection (1).
451	(b) A public safety answering point that fails to participate and cooperate in the audit
452	as described in Subsection (1) is ineligible for funding or services provided by the Unified
453	Statewide 911 Emergency Services Account described in Section 63H-7a-304.
454	(4) No later than February 28, 2025, a county required to have an audit conducted
455	under Subsection (1) shall submit to the Utah Communications Authority:
456	(a) a copy of the audit report; and
457	(b) a written plan of how and when the county will implement the audit
458	recommendations.
459	(5) A PSAP in a county that fails to comply with the requirements of this section does

460	not qualify for a distribution of funds under Section 63H-7a-304.5 for the entire calendar year
461	in which the PSAP does not qualify.
462	Section 10. Section 69-2-204 is amended to read:
463	69-2-204. Public safety answering point 911 call transfer rate requirements.
464	(1) As used in this section:
465	(a) "Fiscal year" means the period from July 1 of one year to June 30 of the following
466	year.
467	(b) (i) "Transfer rate" means the percentage of 911 calls that are:
468	[(i)] (A) received by a public safety answering point during a fiscal year; and
469	[(ii)] (B) transferred to another location in the state.
470	(ii) "Transfer rate" does not include transfers from a public safety answering point to
471	988 services or poison control.
472	(2) Subject to Subsection (3), a public safety answering point shall maintain a transfer
473	rate that is no more than 2%.
474	(3) A public safety answering point with a transfer rate for the fiscal year ending June
475	30, 2020, that is greater than 2% shall:
476	(a) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, reduce the public safety answering point's
477	transfer rate to at least 5% less than the transfer rate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020;
478	(b) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, reduce the public safety answering point's
479	transfer rate:
480	(i) to at least 15% less than the transfer rate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020; or
481	(ii) to at least 10% less than the transfer rate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021;

483	(c) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, reduce the public safety answering point's
484	transfer rate to no more than 5%.
485	Section 11. Effective date.
486	If approved by two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, this bill takes effect
487	upon approval by the governor, or the day following the constitutional time limit of Utah
488	Constitution, Article VII, Section 8, without the governor's signature, or in the case of a veto,
489	the date of veto override.
