2020 Interim Committee Report

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Executive Summary

Background

JR7-1-401 requires each interim committee to adopt a list of items to study over the course of the interim. This "study item list" comprises issues that were added by the interim committee chairs, the Legislative Management Committee (LMC), or members of each respective interim committee. The study item list is approved by majority vote at the interim committee's first meeting and is used to guide each committee meeting agenda.

After an interim committee's final meeting, JR7-1-611 requires the chairs to report to LMC on the outcome of each issue studied by the committee. The Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel has compiled this report on behalf of the interim committee chairs for LMC to review.

Organization

This report is divided according to interim committee and contains a summary of the outcome of items from the committee's approved study item list.

In addition to the issues on a committee's approved study item list, committees will often consider additional issues that arise during interim. While not on the study item list, these items represent work of the committee and are included in this report. Items that are on the committee's study item list are identified by a "*".

The 2020 interim also included three special sessions, and interim committees discussed 37 pieces of legislation that were introduced during the Fifth and Sixth Special Sessions of the Sixty-third Legislature. These are included in this report as a reflection of a committee's workload.

SIXTH SPECIAL SESSION

| H.B. 6005, Cosmetology and |

This bill allows a barber school, cosmetology/barber school, electrologist school, esthetics school, hair design school, or nail technology school to offer up to 50% of the school's total per program curriculum online, in accordance with standards adopted by an applicable national recognized accrediting organization. The bill provides a sunset date of July 1, 2022.

2 H.B. 6006, Alcohol License and Permit Amendments

This bill makes changes to alcohol-related licenses and permits. It delays the expiration date for several different retail licenses until December 22, 2020. For a reception center licensee, it adjusts the percentage of annual gross receipts from the sale of alcoholic products that must be maintained and determines what is included in that percentage. For a public service permit, hospitality room is defined and a public service permittee operating at an international airport is allowed to change their location. The bill also sets the commission's power and duties to approve a public service permittee's change in location request.

3 S.B. 6008, Tobacco Retailer Amendments This bill clarifies the conditions that a retail tobacco specialty business must meet to be exempt from a requirement that the retail tobacco specialty business is located a certain distance from a community location.

FIFTH SPECIAL SESSION

4 H.B. 5004, Airport-related Alcohol Modifications This bill makes three alcohol-related policy changes that are tailored to an airport environment to improve efficiency at the new Salt Lake City International Airport.

- The number of airport lounge licenses is set at 13. Licenses have been tied to the number of people that go through the airport, however, this quota system has been problematic since COVID-19 has reduced ridership.
- A lease agreement in which the lessee is an airport lounge licensee is exempt from percentage lease agreement provisions.
- Permits a central receiving and distribution center at the airport to obtain a liquor transport license to pick up and transport liquor from a state store or package agency, receive, screen and store the product, and deliver it to airport licensees.

| 5 | H.B. 5006, COVID-19 Workers' Compensation Modifications | This bill moves provisions regarding coverage for first responders diagnosed with COVID-19 from the Workers' Compensation Act to the Utah Occupational Disease Act to characterize contracting COVID-19 as getting a disease, rather than having an accident. The definition of first responder is also redefined by listing out certain occupations, rather than citing the definition of emergency responder and health care provider in the Code of Federal Regulations. It clarifies that a first responder must provide written documentation of a COVID-19 diagnosis to their employer or insurer for coverage, and finally, the bill clarifies how to calculate the benefits for volunteers, such as volunteer firefighters, by using the state's minimum wage and the number of volunteer hours to determine their disability rate. |

LEGISLATION REVIEWED FOR A 2020 SPECIAL SESSION

SIXTH SPECIAL SESSION

1 S.B. 6001, Community Reinvestment Modifications This bill allows a community reinvestment agency (CRA) to extend the tax increment collection period for certain project areas impacted by the COVID-19 emergency for up to one year. The bill also allows a CRA to, on or before December 31, 2021, use CRA funds to provide grants, loans, or other assistance to certain small businesses located within the CRA's boundaries that are negatively impacted by the COVID-19 emergency.

S.B. 6009, Cares Act and Covid-19 Assistance and Recovery Amendments This bill modifies provisions related to economic recovery programs created by the state in response to the COVID-19 emergency, including the COVID-19 Agricultural Operations Grant Program, the COVID-19 Cultural Assistance Grant Program, COVID-19 residential housing assistance, the COVID-19 Commercial Rental Assistance Program, the COVID-19 Impacted Businesses Grant Program, and the COVID-19 PPE Support Grant Program. The bill also creates the Oil, Gas, and Mining Grant within GOED and describes how a provision of the CARES Act applies to tenants under state law.

FIFTH SPECIAL SESSION

3 H.J.R. 504, Joint Resolution
Further Extending the State
of Emergency due to the
Infectious Disease COVID-19
Novel Coronavirus

The Governor issued an executive order declaring a state of emergency due to COVID-19 on March 6, 2020, which was extended by the Legislature to June 30, 2020. This resolution further extends the state of emergency to July 31, 2020.

4 S.B. 5005, Rent and Mortgage Assistance Amendments

This bill modifies the date when the Housing and Community Development Division may begin providing residential housing assistance to state residents financially harmed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic using \$20 million appropriated by the Legislature to the division from the Coronavirus Relief Fund. The bill removes a provision allowing the division to begin providing assistance August 1, 2020.

S.B. 5007, Unemployment Insurance Rates Amendments The bill also modifies provisions of the COVID-19 Commercial Rental Assistance Program, created by Third Special Session S.B. 3006, COVID-19 Financial Relief Funding, and administered by the Governor's Office of Economic Development. The bill modifies the definition of "business entity," the requirements to receive assistance under the program, and the amounts of rental assistance that may be provided.

This bill modifies provisions related to the Unemployment Compensation Fund, which the state uses to pay unemployment insurance benefits to unemployed workers. Payroll taxes paid by employers fund the Unemployment Compensation Fund. The bill caps the employer contribution rates to the fund for the 2021 calendar year. The bill caps the social contribution rate, paid by all employers, at 0.002 for calendar year 2021. It also caps the reserve factor, used

| to calculate the basic contribution rate, paid by certain employers, at 1.005 for calendar year 2021. |

Discussed A Performance Audit of Public Education Reporting Requirements from the Office of the Legislative Auditor General. Staff from the Utah State Board of Education discussed actions they have taken in response to audit findings. Additionally, a school district superintendent and charter school leaders presented about the administrative burdens associated with reporting requirements.

The draft legislation:

- requires the State Board of Education to establish a policy or procedures to evaluate the impact any report required in a rule proposed by the state board may have on reporting requirements for a local education agency;
- removes education reporting requirements related to:
 - o the program evaluation of the dual language immersion program;
 - o the digital teaching and learning program; and
 - o the state board's progress implementing certain employee evaluations;
- repeals the Student Leadership Skills Development Program; and
- repeals provisions related to the appropriation for accommodation plans for students with Section 504 accommodations.

Heard a presentation from the State Board of Education about the effects of the statewide assessment waiver put in place for 2020 due to the COVID-19 related to public school closures, including the potential impact on accountability reporting in future years. The committee also discussed potential assessment and accountability issues in the 2020-2021 school year.

2 Campus safety*

Received a presentation from the University of Utah and the Utah System of Higher Education about campus safety issues, including policies to oversee student complaints, students' access to victim advocate resources, and handling sensitive information related to student victims.

3 COVID Recovery and Response*

Heard multiple presentations from the State Board of Education, local education agency leaders, the Utah System of Higher Education, and institutions of higher education about their response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including:

- the impacts of school closures;
- plans for restarting instruction in schools and institutions of higher education following school closures;
- managing COVID-19 outbreaks in local education agencies and institutions of higher education;
- the status of the federal CARES act in Utah; and
- other issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Heard about state and local health and safety guidelines and plans for reopening public schools in the 2020-2021 school year.

4 Transition to a single system for higher education governance* Discussed the Learn and Work Program, which, through institutions of higher education, provides training programs for workers who were displaced by the COVID-19 pandemic.

2020 General Session S.B. 111, <u>Higher Education Amendments</u>, merged the technical college system and the higher education systems to into one system with one governing board. The committee heard a presentation from the Board of Higher Education about this transition,

including the benefits of transitioning to a single governance system and the roles and missions of the state's institutions of higher education and technical colleges.

LEGISLATION REVIEWED FOR A 2020 SPECIAL SESSION

SIXTH SPECIAL SESSION

H.B. 6004, School Emergency Drills Amendments This bill amends requirements related to emergency evacuation drills for Group E occupancies, which include schools, for the 2020-2021 school year. The bill provides that through February 28, 2021, Group E occupancies are exempt from statutory requirements to conduct emergency evacuation drills but are required to provide in-class instruction on the procedure for emergency evacuation for fire at least once each calendar month beginning no later than 15 days after the first day of school.

H.B. 6012, Public Education
Funding and Enrollment
Amendments

This bill addresses public school funding and enrollment issues, including:

- For the 2020-2021 school year, allows the State Board of Education (state board) to use any day or days in 2020 when counting average daily membership for the 2020-2021 growth factor. (Statute requires the count on October 1.)
- Amends funding distribution for Necessarily Existent Small Schools Program to provide 83 additional weighted units to local education agencies with 251 to 500 students (it is currently 56 additional weighted units).
- Reinstates a salary supplement for National Board-certified teachers and appropriates funding.
- Allows charter schools to give enrollment preference in the 2021-2022 school year to students who withdraw from the school to attend an online or home school in the 2020-2021 school year because of the COVID-19 emergency.
- Appropriates money for local education agencies to pay vendors for English learner instruction software licenses.
- Allows the state board to use certain federal funds and nonlapsing Minimum School Program funds for charter school local replacement funding in the 2020-2021 school year in anticipation of the potential for increased charter school enrollment.

5 H.B. 5002, Open and Public Meetings Act Amendments This bill addresses the relationship between the governmental immunity act and immunity related to exposure to COVID-19.

2018 General Session S.C.R. 1 initiated the replacement of Utah's statue of Philo Farnsworth in the United States Capitol with a statue of Dr. Martha Hughes Cannon, and established an unveiling date of August 2020 for the new statue. 2018 General Session H.B. 444 created the Martha Hughes Cannon Statue Oversight Committee responsible for overseeing the creation and replacement process for the statue and established a repeal date of January 1, 2021 for the committee. Due to uncertainty about timing created by the COVID-19 pandemic, this bill removes the unveiling date requirement for the Martha Hughes Cannon statue and extends the repeal date for the statue's oversight committee to January 1, 2022. The bill also removes the requirement that the statue be placed in the National Statuary Hall.

This bill permits a public body to hold an electronic meeting without an anchor location if the public body determines that conducting the meeting with an anchor location presents a substantial risk to the health and safety of those who may be present at the anchor location.

For electronic meetings held without an anchor location, the bill requires the public body to include the reasons for the health and safety risk determination in the public notice for the meeting and state them at the beginning of the meeting, provide means by which the public may hear, or view and hear, the open portions of the meeting, and provide a means by which the public can provide comments electronically to the public body. The bill also removes the requirement for a posted written notice at the anchor location, for meetings held without an anchor location.

H.B. 6007, Municipal Annexation Revisions

In the 2020 General Session, the Legislature passed H.B. 359, <u>Municipal Annexation Revisions</u>. One of the provisions of the bill allowed a municipality to annex an unincorporated area without an annexation petition or the consent of the county in which the area proposed for annexation is located, under certain conditions. This bill repeals that provision.

This bill reverses a change made by 2020 General Session H.B. 393, Municipal Annexation Amendments, which took effect on March 24, 2020. Before H.B. 393, an annexation petition in a first-class county could not propose the annexation of an area proposed for incorporation. H.B. 393 extended this prohibition to all counties. This bill reverses the change made in H.B. 393 so that the prohibition against annexing an area proposed for incorporation only applies to first class counties.

This bill changes the date on which the Governor is required to submit an audited financial statement from December 1 to December 31.

This bill, which has an immediate effective date, provides that certain financial stimulus or relief amounts received by individuals and businesses in Utah in response to COVID-19 are not subject to Utah income tax.

Types of COVID-19 stimulus or relief that will not be subject to Utah income tax include:

- proceeds from a forgiven loan under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) and similar additional federal programs that may be enacted in 2020;
- grants or forgiven loans provided by the state, a county, or a municipality using federal funds; and
- amounts received by individuals as an individual recovery rebate in 2020.

FIFTH SPECIAL SESSION

H.B. 5010, COVID-19 Economic Recovery Program This bill creates several targeted assistance programs related to the economic impacts of COVID-19 and a public information campaign to encourage healthy behavior by Utah residents during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Also appropriates money to provide translation services and technology for service providers working to address COVID-19 impacts. Also appropriates money to GOED for tourism marketing and facilitating tourist access to national parks and surrounding communities. Appropriation: \$13M
