2. Utah Consumer Credit Code

Utah code requires a consumer lender to notify the Department of Financial Institutions annually about their credit-extending business. The committee will discuss requiring consumer lenders to submit the required notice through the Nationwide Mortgage Licensing System rather than the current process of written form.

3. Massage Therapy Practice Act

Absent further action by the Legislature, Utah Code Ann., Title 58, Chapter 47b, Massage Therapy Practice Act, will be repealed on July 1, 2024. The committee will conduct a sunset review of the statute and determine if it should be reauthorized for up to 10 years, with or without amendments, or allowed to expire.
