20	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
21	Section 1. Section 53-2d-210 is enacted to read:
22	53-2d-210 . Emergency medical service employees providing medical services in
23	non-911 emergency settings.
24	(1) As used in this section:
25	(a) "Direct supervision" means a medical director or other physician is present and
26	available for face-to-face communication with an emergency medical service
27	employee being supervised by the medical director or other physician at the time and
28	place any non-911 emergency medical services authorized by the medical director or

other physician are being provided by the emergency medical service employee.

30	<u>(b)</u>	"Emergency medical service employee" means a following individual licensed under
31		this chapter:
32		(i) a paramedic;
33		(ii) an advanced emergency medical services technician;
34		(iii) emergency medical services technician; or
35		(iv) an emergency medical responder.
36	<u>(c)</u>	"Indirect supervision" means a medical director or other physician, licensed under
37		Title 58, Chapter 67, Utah Medical Practice Act, or Title 58, Chapter 68, Utah

72	(h) assesses the education and training of the emergency medical service employee to
73	ensure that the emergency medical service employee is competent and able to
74	provide the non-911 emergency medical services sought;
75	(i) provides continuing education and training as needed to ensure the continued
76	competency and eligibility for licensure of the emergency medical service employee
77	to provide the non-911 emergency medical services sought; and
78	(j) complies with any bureau rules created in accordance with this section.
79	(3)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (3)(b), and subject to Subsection (4), an
80	emergency medical service employee employed by a company, a corporation, a
81	partnership, or other entity that complies with Subsection (2) may provide non-911
82	emergency medical services that:
83	(i) the emergency medical service employee has been trained to perform;
84	(ii) the emergency medical service employee has been credentialed, privileged, or
85	authorized to perform; and
86	(iii) are within the emergency medical service employee's scope of practice as
87	defined by the bureau.
88	(b) Notwithstanding Subsection (3)(a), an emergency medical service employee may
89	provide non-911 emergency medical services outside the emergency medical service
90	employee's scope of practice described in Subsection (3)(a) if:
91	(i) the medical service is approved by the bureau;
92	(ii) the emergency medical service employee has been trained to perform the non-91
93	emergency medical service; and
94	(iii) the emergency medical service employee is otherwise complying with the
95	requirements of this section.
96	(4)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (4)(b), an emergency medical service employee
97	may provide the non-911 emergency medical services described in Subsection (3) if

98	the emergency medical service employee is providing the services under the direct
99	supervision or indirect supervision of a medical director or another physician.
100	(b) An emergency medical service employee may provide the non-911 emergency
101	medical services described in Subsection (3) under the direct supervision or indirect
102	supervision of a nurse practitioner or physician assistant if:
103	(i) the emergency medical service employee is providing the non-911 emergency
104	medical services in a county of the fourth, fifth, or sixth class as described in
105	Section 17-50-50; or
106	(ii) if approved by the bureau.
107	(5) An emergency medical service employee providing non-911 emergency medical
108	services under this section may perform the non-911 emergency medical services in a
109	hospital, in an emergency room, in a clinic, in a community paramedicine program, at ar
110	event, or any other location where non-911 emergency medical services may need to be
111	provided.
112	(6) The bureau shall make rules in accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah
113	Administrative Rulemaking Act, to:
114	(a) define the scope of practice for an emergency medical service employee as described
115	in Subsection (3)(a); and
116	(b) establish minimum standards for the requirements listed in Subsection (2).
117	(7) This section does not expand or limit the scope of practice for an emergency medical
118	service employee when the emergency medical service employee is responding to an
119	emergency or providing 911 ambulance services.
