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LONG TITLE

4 General Description:

This bill amends statutory provisions related to juvenile justice.

- 9 amends the notification requirements for an offense committed by a student on school
- 10 grounds;
- recodifies and amends requirements related to the notification of an offense committed by
- 12 a student on school grounds, including statutory provisions addressing investigations,
- 13 searches, and immunity;
- 14 provides that a juvenile probation officer may not offer a minor a nonjudicial adjustment
- 15 if the minor is 12 years old or older and is referred for a misdemeanor drug offense;
- l6 clarifies that a juvenile probation officer may not offer a minor a nonjudicial adjustment if
- the minor is 12 years old or older and is referred for unlawful adolescent sexual activity;
- Provides that a court may not grant a petition for expungement of a juvenile record if the
- 19 petitioner has been adjudicated or convicted of certain drug offenses within two years
- 20 before the petition for expungement is filed;
- 21 repeals statutes regarding notification and reporting of prohibited acts by students; and
- 22 makes technical and conforming changes.

132	allegations involving school property, students, or school district employees, including a

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133	search on school property in accordance with Subsection (2).
134	(2)(a) A search on school property must be based on at least a reasonable belief that the
135	search will turn up evidence of an offense.
136	(b) The measures adopted for the search must be reasonably related to the objectives of
137	the search and not excessively intrusive in light of the circumstances, including the
138	age and sex of the person involved and the nature of the infraction.

167	(1) If the juvenile court receives a referral for an offense committed by a minor that is, or
168	appears to be, within the juvenile court's jurisdiction, or for the minor being a habitual
169	truant, a juvenile probation officer shall make a preliminary inquiry in accordance with
170	this section to determine whether the minor is eligible to enter into a nonjudicial
171	adjustment.
172	(2) If a minor is referred to the juvenile court for multiple offenses arising from a single
173	criminal episode, and the minor is eligible under this section for a nonjudicial
174	adjustment, the juvenile probation officer shall offer the minor one nonjudicial
175	adjustment for all offenses arising from the single criminal episode.
176	(3)(a) The juvenile probation officer may:
177	(i) conduct a validated risk and needs assessment; and
178	(ii) request that a prosecuting attorney review a referral in accordance with Section
179	80-6-304.5 if:
180	(A) the results of the validated risk and needs assessment indicate the minor is
181	high risk; or
182	(B) the results of the validated risk and needs assessment indicate the minor is
183	moderate risk and the referral is for a class A misdemeanor violation under

192	(4) Except for an offense that is not eligible under Subsection (8), the juvenile probation
193	officer shall offer a nonjudicial adjustment to a minor if:
194	(a) the minor:
195	(i) is referred for an offense that is a misdemeanor, infraction, or status offense;
196	(ii) has no more than two prior adjudications; and
197	(iii) has no more than two prior unsuccessful nonjudicial adjustment attempts;
198	(b) the minor is referred for an offense that is alleged to have occurred before the minor
199	was 12 years old; or
200	(c) the minor is referred for being a habitual truant.

201	(5)	For purposes of determining a minor's eligibility for a nonjudicial adjustment under
202		Subsection (4), the juvenile probation officer shall treat all offenses arising out of a
203		single criminal episode that resulted in a nonjudicial adjustment as one prior nonjudicial
204		adjustment.
205	(6)	For purposes of determining a minor's eligibility for a nonjudicial adjustment under
206		Subsection (4), the juvenile probation officer shall treat all offenses arising out of a
207		single criminal episode that resulted in one or more prior adjudications as a single
208		adjudication.
209	(7)	Except for a referral that involves an offense described in Subsection (8), the juvenile
210		probation officer may offer a nonjudicial adjustment to a minor who does not meet the
211		criteria described in Subsection (4)(a).
212	(8)	The juvenile probation officer may not offer a minor a nonjudicial adjustment if the
213		referral involves:
214		(a) an offense alleged to have occurred when the minor was 12 years old or older that is:
215		(i) a felony offense; or
216		(ii) a misdemeanor violation of:
217		(A) Section 41-6a-502, driving under the influence;
218		(B) Subsection 58-37-8(1)(a)(ii), distributing a controlled or counterfeit substance,
219		or agreeing, consenting, offering, or arranging to distribute a controlled
220		substance;
221		(C) Subsection 58-37-8(1)(a)(iii), possessing a controlled or counterfeit substance
222		with intent to distribute;
223		(D) Subsection 58-37-8(2)(a)(i), possessing or using a controlled substance analog

256	(1) An individual may petition the juvenile court for an order to expunge the individual's
257	juvenile record if:
258	(a) the individual was adjudicated for an offense in the juvenile court;
259	(b) the individual has reached 18 years old; and
260	(c) at least one year has passed from the day on which:
261	(i) the juvenile court's continuing jurisdiction was terminated; or
262	(ii) if the individual was committed to secure care, the individual was unconditionally
263	released from the custody of the division.
264	(2) If a petitioner is 18 years old or older and seeks an expungement under Subsection (1),
265	the petition shall include a criminal history report obtained from the Bureau of Criminal
266	Identification in accordance with Section 53-10-108.
267	(3) If the juvenile court finds and states on the record the reason why the waiver is
268	appropriate, the juvenile court may waive:

269	(a) the age requirement under Subsection (1)(b) for a petition; or
270	(b) the one-year requirement under Subsection (1)(c) for a petition.
271	(4)(a) Upon the filing of a petition described in Subsection (1)(a), the juvenile court
272	shall:
273	(i) set a date for a hearing; and
274	(ii) at least 30 days before the day on which the hearing on the petition is scheduled,
275	notify the prosecuting attorney and any affected agency identified in the
276	petitioner's juvenile record:
277	(A) that the petition has been filed; and
278	(B) of the date of the hearing.
279	(b)(i) The juvenile court shall provide a victim with the opportunity to request notice
280	of a petition described in Subsection (1).
281	(ii) Upon the victim's request under Subsection (4)(b)(i), the victim shall receive
282	notice of the petition at least 30 days before the day on which the hearing is
283	scheduled if, before the day on which an expungement order is made, the victim,
284	or the victim's next of kin or authorized representative if the victim is a child or an

288	(iii) The notice described in Subsection (4)(b)(ii) shall include a copy of the petition
289	and any statutes and rules applicable to the petition.
290	(c) At the hearing, the prosecuting attorney, a victim, and any other individual who may
291	have relevant information about the petitioner may testify.
292	(d) The juvenile court may waive the hearing for the petition if:
293	(i)(A) there is no victim; or
294	(B) if there is a victim, the victim agrees to the waiver; and
295	(ii) the prosecuting attorney agrees to the waiver.
296	(5)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (6), the juvenile court may grant a petition
297	described in Subsection (1) and order expungement of the petitioner's juvenile record
298	if the juvenile court finds that the petitioner is rehabilitated to the satisfaction of the
299	court in accordance with Subsection (5)(b).
300	(b) In deciding whether to grant a petition described in Subsection (1), the juvenile court
301	shall consider:
302	(i) whether expungement of the petitioner's juvenile record is in the best interest of

303	the petitioner;
304	(ii) the petitioner's response to programs and treatment;
305	(iii) the nature and seriousness of the conduct for which the petitioner was
306	adjudicated;
307	(iv) the petitioner's behavior subsequent to adjudication;
308	(v) the petitioner's reason for seeking expungement of the petitioner's juvenile record;

310	(vi) if the petitioner is a restricted person under Subsection 76-10-503(1)(a)(iv) or
311	(b)(iii):
312	(A) whether the offense for which the petitioner is a restricted person was
313	committed with a weapon;
314	(B) whether expungement of the petitioner's juvenile record poses an unreasonable
315	risk to public safety; and
316	(C) the amount of time that has passed since the adjudication of the offense for
317	which the petitioner is a restricted person.
318	(6) The juvenile court may not grant a petition described in Subsection (1) and order
319	expungement of the petitioner's juvenile record if:
320	(a) the petitioner has been convicted of a violent felony within five years before the day
321	on which the petition for expungement is filed;
322	(b) the petitioner has been adjudicated or convicted of an offense described in Section
323	58-37-8 within two years before the day on which the petition for expungement is
324	filed;
325	[(b)] (c) there are delinquency or criminal proceedings pending against the petitioner;
326	[(e)] (d) the petitioner has not satisfied a judgment of restitution entered by the juvenile
327	court for an adjudication in the petitioner's juvenile record;
328	[(d)] (e) the petitioner has not satisfied restitution that was a condition of a nonjudicial
329	adjustment in the petitioner's juvenile record; or
330	[(e)] (f) the petitioner's juvenile record contains an adjudication for a violation of:
331	(i) Section 76-5-202, aggravated murder; or
332	(ii) Section 76-5-203, murder.
