4 General Description:

This bill adds juvenile justice as a delineated talent advisory council.

- 24 (1) As used in this section:
- 25 (a) "Advisory council" means an advisory council the talent board creates under Subsection (10).
- 27 (b) "Institution of higher education" means the same as the term is defined in Section 53B-1-102.
- 29 (c) "Talent initiative" means an initiative the board creates under Subsection (2).
- 30 (2)(a) Subject to legislative appropriations and in accordance with the proposal process

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31	and other provisions of this section, the board shall develop and oversee one or more		
32	talent initiatives that include providing funding for expanded programs at an		
33	institution of higher education related to the talent initiative.		
34	(b) The board shall ensure that a talent initiative the board creates:		
35	(i) uses a name for the talent initiative that reflects the area the initiative is targeting;		
36	(ii) contains an outline of the disciplines, industries, degrees, certifications,		
37	credentials, and types of skills the talent initiative will target; and		
38	(iii) uses a corresponding advisory council created in Subsection (10).		
39	(3) In creating a talent initiative, the board shall facilitate collaborations between an		
40	institution of higher education and participating employers that:		
41	(a) create expanded, multidisciplinary programs or stackable credential programs offered		
42	at a technical college, undergraduate, or graduate level of study; and		
43	(b) prepare students to be workforce participants in jobs requiring skills related to a		
44	talent initiative.		
45	(4)(a) An institution of higher education seeking to partner with one or more		
46	participating employers to create a program related to a talent initiative shall submit a		
47	proposal to the talent board through a process the talent board creates.		
48	(b) An institution of higher education shall submit a proposal that contains:		
49	(i) a description of the proposed program, including:		
50	(A) implementation timelines for the program;		
51	(B) a demonstration of how the program will be responsive to the talent needs		
52	related to the talent initiative;		
53	(C) an outline of relevant industry involvement that includes at least one		
54	participating employer that partners with the institution of higher education; and		
55	(D) an explanation of how the program addresses an unmet regional workforce		
56	need related to a talent initiative;		
57	(ii) an estimate of:		
58	(A) projected student enrollment and completion rates for a program;		
59	(B) the academic credit or credentials that a program will provide; and		
60	(C) occupations for which a graduate will qualify;		
61	(iii) evidence that each participating employer is committed to participating and		
62	contributing to the program by providing any combination of:		
63	(A) instruction;		
64	(B) curriculum review:		

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65	(C) feedback regarding effectiveness of program graduates as employees;			
66	(D) work-based learning opportunities; or			
67	(E) mentoring;			
68	(iv) a description of any resources a participating employer will provide wi	thin the		
69	program; and			
70	(v) the amount of funding requested for the program, including:			
71	(A) the justification for the funding; and			
72	(B) the cost per student served as estimated under Subsection (4)(b)(ii)			
73	(5) In reviewing a proposal, the talent board shall provide a proposal to the relevant			
74	advisory council described in Subsections (10) and (11).			
75	(6) The relevant advisory council shall:			
76	(a) review and prioritize each proposal the advisory council receives; and			
77	(b) recommend to the talent board whether the proposal should be funded and the	ne		
78	funding amount based on:			
79	(i) the quality and completeness of the elements of the proposal described in	a		
80	Subsection (4)(b);			
81	(ii) to what extent the proposed program:			
82	(A) would expand the capacity to meet state or regional workforce need	ls related		
83	to the talent initiative;			
84	(B) would integrate industry-relevant competencies with disciplinary ex	kpertise;		
85	(C) would incorporate internships or significant project experiences, in	eluding		
86	team-based experiences;			
87	(D) identifies how industry professionals would participate in elements	described		
88	in Subsection (4)(b)(iii); and			
89	(E) would be cost effective; and			
90	(iii) other relevant criteria as the relevant advisory council and the talent bo	ard		
91	determines.			
92	(7) The board shall review the recommendations of an advisory council and may pre-	ovide		
93	funding for a program related to a talent initiative using the criteria described in			
94	Subsection (6)(b).			
95	(8) In a form that the board approves, each institution of higher education that receives	ves		
96	funding shall annually provide written information to the board regarding the ac	tivities,		
97	successes, and challenges related to administering the program related to the tale	ent		
98	initiative, including:			

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99 (a) specific entities that received funding under this section; 100 (b) the amount of funding provided to each entity; 101 (c) the number of participating students in each program; 102 (d) the number of graduates of the program; 103 (e) the number of graduates of the program employed in jobs requiring skills related to 104 the talent initiative; and 105 (f) progress and achievements relevant to the implementation timeline submitted under 106 Subsection (4)(b)(i)(A). 107 (9) On or before October 1 of each year, the board shall provide an annual written report 108 containing the information described in Subsection (8) to the: 109 (a) Education Interim Committee; and 110 (b) Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee. 111 (10) The talent board shall create a talent advisory council for each talent initiative created 112 under Subsection (2) to make recommendations to the board regarding the 113 administration of a talent initiative including: 114 (a) a deep technology initiative; 115 (b) a life sciences workforce initiative; [and] 116 (c) health professions initiatives including a nursing initiative[-]; and 117 (d) a juvenile justice workforce initiative. 118 (11) An advisory council shall consist of the following members: 119 (a) four members who have extensive experience in the talent initiative's subject matter 120 from the private sector whom the chair of the talent board appoints and the board 121 approves; 122 (b) a representative of the board described in Section 53B-1-402 whom the chair of the 123 board appoints; 124 (c) a representative of the Governor's Office of Economic Opportunity whom the 125 executive director of the Governor's Office of Economic Opportunity appoints; 126 (d) a representative from Talent Ready Utah; 127 (e) one member of the Senate whom the president of the Senate appoints; 128 (f) one member of the House of Representatives whom the speaker of the House of 129 Representatives appoints; and 130 (g) any other specialized industry experts whom a majority of the advisory council may 131 invite to participate as needed as nonvoting members.

(12) Talent Ready Utah shall provide staff support for an advisory council.

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133	(13)(a) Two advisory council members appointed under Subsection (11)(a) shall serve			
134	an initial term of two years.			
135	(b) Except as described in Subsection (13)(a), all other advisory council members shall			
136	serve an initial term of four years.			
137	(c) Successor advisory council members upon appointment or reappointment shall each			
138	serve a term of four years.			
139	(d) When a vacancy occurs in the membership for any reason, the initial appointing			
140	authority shall appoint a replacement for the unexpired term.			
141	(e) An advisory council member may not serve more than two consecutive terms.			
142	(14) A vote of a majority of the advisory council members constitutes an action of the			
143	advisory council.			
144	(15) The duties of the advisory council include reviewing, prioritizing, and making			
145	recommendations to the board regarding proposals for funding under the talent initiative			
146	created in accordance with Subsection (2) for which the council was created.			
147	(16) An advisory council member may not receive compensation or benefits for the			
148	member's service, but an advisory council member who is not a legislator may receive			
149	per diem and travel expenses in accordance with:			
150	(a) Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107; and			
151	(b) rules made by the Division of Finance pursuant to Sections 63A-3-106 and			
152	63A-3-107.			
153	(17) The board may discontinue a talent initiative and the related talent advisory council by			
154	majority vote.
