

- 28 (a) "Digital citizenship" means the norms of appropriate, responsible, and healthy
 29 behavior related to technology use, including digital literacy, ethics, etiquette, and
 30 security.
- 31 (b) "Educator" means the same as that term is defined in Section 53E-6-102.
- 32 (c)(i) "Parent member" means a member of a school community council who is a
 33 parent of a student who:
- 34 (A) is attending the school; or
 35 (B) will be enrolled at the school during the parent's term of office.
- 36 (ii) "Parent member" may not include an educator who is employed at the school.
- 37 (d) "Safety principles" means safety principles that, when incorporated into programs
 38 and resources, impact academic achievement by strengthening a safe and wholesome
 39 learning environment, including continual efforts for safe technology utilization and
 40 digital citizenship.
- 41 (e) "School community council" means a council established at a district school in
 42 accordance with this section.
- 43 (f) "School employee member" means a member of a school community council who is
 44 a person employed at the school by the school or school district, including the
 45 principal.
- 46 (g) "School LAND Trust Program money" means money allocated to a school [~~pursuant~~
 47 ~~to~~] in accordance with Section 53F-2-404.
- 48 (2) A district school, in consultation with the district school's local school board, shall
 49 establish a school community council at the school building level for the purpose of:
- 50 (a) involving parents of students in decision making at the school level;
 51 (b) improving the education of students;
 52 (c) prudently expending School LAND Trust Program money for the improvement of
 53 students' education through collaboration among parents, school employees, and the
 54 local school board; and

- 60 (3)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (3)(b), a school community council shall:

- 64 and the local school board regarding:
- 65 (A) the school and its programs;

134 (e) The state board may make rules, in accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah
135 Administrative Rulemaking Act, governing a school community council when, under
136 unique circumstances that the state board identifies, there are insufficient members to
137 fill the positions described in this Subsection (4).

138 (5)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (5)(f), a school employee member, other than
139 the principal, shall be elected by secret ballot by a majority vote of the school
140 employees and serve a two-year term. The principal shall serve as an ex officio
141 member with full voting privileges.

142 (b)(i) Except as provided in Subsection (5)(f), a parent member shall be elected by
143 secret ballot at an election held at the school by a majority vote of those voting at
144 the election and serve a two-year term.

145 (ii)(A) Except as provided in Subsection (5)(b)(ii)(B), only a parent of a student
146 attending the school may vote in, or run as a candidate in, the election under
147 Subsection (5)(b)(i).

148 (B) If an election is held in the spring, a parent of a student who will be attending
149 the school the following school year may vote in, and run as a candidate in, the
150 election under Subsection (5)(b)(i).

151 (iii) Any parent of a student who meets the qualifications of this section may file or
152 declare the parent's candidacy for election to a school community council.

153 (iv)(A) Subject to Subsections (5)(b)(iv)(B) and (5)(b)(iv)(C), a timeline for the
154 election of parent members of a school community council shall be established
155 by a local school board for the schools within the school district.

156 (B) An election for the parent members of a school community council shall be
157 held near the beginning of the school year or held in the spring and completed
158 before the last week of school.

159 (C) Each school shall establish a time period for the election of parent members of
160 a school community council under Subsection (5)(b)(iv)(B) that is consistent
161 for at least a four-year period.

162 (c)(i) At least 10 days before the date that voting commences for the elections held
163 under Subsections (5)(a) and (5)(b), the principal of the school, or the principal's

- 164 designee, shall provide notice to each school employee or parent of the
165 opportunity to vote in, and run as a candidate in, an election under this Subsection
166 (5).
- 167 (ii) The notice shall include:
- 168 (A) the dates and times of the elections;
- 169 (B) a list of council positions that are up for election; and
- 170 (C) instructions for becoming a candidate for a community council position.
- 171 (iii) The principal of the school, or the principal's designee, shall oversee the
172 elections held under Subsections (5)(a) and (5)(b).
- 173 (iv) Ballots cast in an election held under Subsection (5)(b) shall be deposited in a
174 secure ballot box.
- 175 (d) Results of the elections held under Subsections (5)(a) and (5)(b) shall be made
176 available to the public upon request.
- 177 (e)(i) If a parent position on a school community council remains unfilled after an
178 election is held, the other parent members of the council shall appoint a parent
179 who meets the qualifications of this section to fill the position.
- 180 (ii) If a school employee position on a school community council remains unfilled
181 after an election is held, the other school employee members of the council shall
182 appoint a school employee to fill the position.
- 183 (iii) A member appointed to a school community council under Subsection (5)(e)(i)
184 or (ii) shall serve a two-year term.
- 185 (f)(i) If the number of candidates who file for a parent position or school employee
186 position on a school community council is less than or equal to the number of
187 open positions, an election is not required.
- 188 (ii) If an election is not held pursuant to Subsection (5)(f)(i) and a parent position
189 remains unfilled, the other parent members of the council shall appoint a parent
190 who meets the qualifications of this section to fill the position.
- 191 (iii) If an election is not held pursuant to Subsection (5)(f)(i) and a school employee
192 position remains unfilled, the other school employee members of the council shall
193 appoint a school employee who meets the qualifications of this section to fill the
194 position.
- 195 (g) The principal shall enter the names of the council members on the School LAND
196 Trust website on or before October 20 of each year, pursuant to Section 53G-7-1203.
- 197 (h) Terms shall be staggered so that approximately half of the council members stand for

- 198 election each year.
- 199 (i) A school community council member may serve successive terms provided the
200 member continues to meet the definition of a parent member or school employee
201 member as specified in Subsection (1).
- 202 (j) Each school community council shall elect:
- 203 (i) a chair from its parent members; and
204 (ii) a vice chair from either its parent members or school employee members,
205 excluding the principal.
- 206 (6)(a) A school community council may create subcommittees or task forces to:
- 207 (i) advise or make recommendations to the council; or
208 (ii) develop all or part of a plan listed in Subsection (3).
- 209 (b) Any plan or part of a plan developed by a subcommittee or task force shall be subject
210 to the approval of the school community council.
- 211 (c) A school community council may appoint individuals who are not council members
212 to serve on a subcommittee or task force, including parents, school employees, or
213 other community members.
- 214 (7)(a) A majority of the members of a school community council is a quorum for the
215 transaction of business.
- 216 (b) The action of a majority of the members of a quorum is the action of the school
217 community council.
- 218 (8) A local school board shall provide training for a school community council each year,
219 including training:
- 220 (a) for the chair and vice chair about their responsibilities;
221 (b) on resources available on the School LAND Trust website; and
222 (c) on this part.
