3 **LONG TITLE**

4 **General Description:**

5 This bill addresses performance funding and enrollment funding in higher education.

6 **Highlighted Provisions:**

7 This bill:

- 8 ▶ defines terms;
- 9 ▶ repeals a study requirement for the Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee that
10 this legislation fulfills;
- 11 ▶ requires the Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee to ensure the inclusion of
12 certain factors in non-statutory funding formulas for technical colleges;
- 13 ▶ establishes a process and formula for determining certain enrollment-based funding for
14 institutions of higher education, including degree-granting universities and technical
15 colleges;
- 16 ▶ establishes new performance metrics and goals for performance-based funding;
- 17 ▶ amends provisions regarding certain meetings of legislative committees in relation to the
18 performance funding model;
- 19 ▶ enacts certain sunset dates; and
- 20 ▶ makes technical and conforming changes.

- 101 (a) complete a technical college capacity funding framework study for institutions
 102 described in Subsection 53H-3-602(1)(b)(iv) that contemplates:
 103 (i) a process for identifying specific technical college programs eligible for
 104 state-funded capacity expansion;
 105 (ii) identifying, validating, and quantifying, by institution and program, unmet:
 106 (A) student demand, including secondary and postsecondary students; and
 107 (B) employer demand for graduates;
 108 (iii) methodology for establishing the amount and timing of state-funded capacity
 109 appropriations, including whether the appropriations are retrospective or
 110 prospective;
 111 (iv) the availability of alternative funding sources to support capacity expansions;

121 Section 2. Section **53H-8-202** is amended to read:

122 **53H-8-202 (Effective 07/01/26). Combined requests for appropriations -- Board**
 123 **review of operating budgets -- Submission of budgets -- Recommendations -- Hearing**
 124 **request -- Appropriation formulas -- Allocations -- Dedicated credits -- Financial affairs.**

125 (1) As used in this section, "research university" means the University of Utah or Utah State
 126 University.

127 (2)(a) Subject to Subsection (3), the board shall recommend a combined appropriation
 128 for the operating budgets of institutions and the board for inclusion in a state
 129 appropriations act.

- 130 (b) The board's combined budget recommendation shall include:
- 131 (i) employee compensation;
- 132 (ii) mandatory costs, including building operations and maintenance, fuel, and power;
- 133 (iii) performance funding described in Part 3, Performance Funding;
- 134 (iv) statewide and institutional priorities, including scholarships, financial aid, and
- 135 technology infrastructure; and
- 136 (v) enrollment [~~growth~~] funding described in Section 53H-2-211.
- 137 (c) The board's recommendations shall be available for presentation to the governor and
- 138 to the Legislature at least 30 days before the convening of the Legislature, and shall
- 139 include schedules showing the recommended amounts for each institution and the
- 140 board, including separately funded programs or divisions.
- 141 (d) The recommended appropriations shall be determined by the board only after the
- 142 board has reviewed the proposed institutional operating budgets, and has consulted
- 143 with the various institutions and board staff in order to make appropriate adjustments.
- 144 (3) In the combined request for appropriation, the board shall differentiate between
- 145 appropriations requested for academic education and appropriations requested for
- 146 technical education.
- 147 (4)(a) Institutional operating budgets shall be submitted to the board at least 90 days
- 148 before the convening of the Legislature in accordance with procedures established by
- 149 the board.
- 150 (b) Except as provided in Sections 53H-9-604 and 53H-9-504, funding requests
- 151 pertaining to capital facilities and land purchases shall be submitted in accordance
- 152 with procedures prescribed by the Division of Facilities Construction and
- 153 Management.
- 154 (5)(a) The budget recommendations of the board shall be accompanied by full
- 155 explanations and supporting data.
- 156 (b) The appropriations recommended by the board shall be made with the dual objective
- 157 of:
- 158 (i) justifying for institutions appropriations consistent with the institutions' needs, and
- 159 consistent with the financial ability of the state; and
- 160 (ii) determining an equitable distribution of funds among the respective institutions in
- 161 accordance with the aims and objectives of the statewide master plan for higher
- 162 education.
- 163 (6)(a) The board shall request a hearing with the governor on the recommended

- 164 appropriations.
- 165 (b) After the governor delivers the governor's budget message to the Legislature, the
166 board shall request hearings on the recommended appropriations with the Higher
167 Education Appropriations Subcommittee.
- 168 (c) If either the total amount of the state appropriations or [~~its~~] the allocation of the state
169 appropriations among the institutions as proposed by the Legislature or the Higher
170 Education Appropriations Subcommittee is substantially different from the
171 recommendations of the board, the board may request further hearings with the
172 Legislature or the Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee to reconsider both
173 the total amount and the allocation.
- 174 (7) The board may devise, establish, periodically review, and revise formulas for the
175 board's use and for the use of the governor and the Higher Education Appropriations
176 Subcommittee in making appropriation recommendations.
- 177 (8)(a) The board shall recommend to each session of the Legislature the minimum
178 tuitions, resident and nonresident, for each institution which it considers necessary to
179 implement the budget recommendations.
- 180 (b) Subject to Subsection (13), the board may fix the tuition, fees, and charges for each
181 institution at levels the board finds necessary to meet budget requirements.
- 182 (9) Money allocated to each institution by legislative appropriation may be budgeted in
183 accordance with institutional work programs approved by the board, provided that the
184 expenditures funded by appropriations for each institution are kept within the
185 appropriations for the applicable period.
- 186 (10) The dedicated credits, including revenues derived from tuitions, fees, federal grants,
187 and proceeds from sales received by the institutions are appropriated to the respective
188 institutions to be used in accordance with institutional work programs.
- 189 (11) An institution may do the institution's own purchasing, issue the institution's own
190 payrolls, and handle the institution's own financial affairs under the general supervision
191 of the board.
- 192 (12) If the Legislature appropriates money in accordance with this section, the money shall
193 be distributed to the board and institutions to fund the items described in Subsection
194 (2)(b).
- 195 (13) The board shall create policies requiring an institution of higher education to waive
196 transcript fees for a student who is under [~~the age of~~] 26 years old and:
197 (a) is homeless, as defined in Section 26B-3-207;

- 198 (b) is a person who is homeless, as defined in Section 35A-5-302;
199 (c) is an individual whose primary nighttime residence is a location that is not designed
200 for or ordinarily used as a sleeping accommodation for an individual;

205 Section 3. Section **53H-8-211** is enacted to read:

206 **53H-8-211 (Effective 07/01/26). Enrollment funding.**

- 207 (1) As used in this section, in alignment with Utah System of Higher Education data
208 collection and reporting taxonomies:
- 209 (a)(i) "Advanced graduate" means the level of a doctoral course at a degree-granting
210 institution, including a juris doctorate degree.
- 211 (ii) "Advanced graduate" does not include a course in a medical field for which an
212 institution receives separate funding, including medical, dental, and veterinary
213 programs.
- 214 (b) "Basic graduate" means the level of a master's course at a degree-granting institution.
- 215 (c) "Classification of instructional program code" means a coding designation that
216 facilitates the organization, collection, and reporting of fields of study and program
217 completions that the National Center for Education Statistics develops.
- 218 (d) "Full-time equivalent" means a metric that measures student course load by
219 converting course hours into a number representing a full-time student equivalent
220 load.
- 221 (e) "High-cost upper-division" means an upper-division course in a program with a
222 classification of instruction program code of 11, 14, 51, or 52.
- 223 (f) "Level of instruction" means the following instructional or course categories:
- 224 (i) technical certificate education;
- 225 (ii) vocational education;
- 226 (iii) lower-division;
- 227 (iv) upper-division;
- 228 (v) high-cost upper-division;
- 229 (vi) basic graduate; and
- 230 (vii) advanced graduate.
- 231 (g) "Lower-division" means the level of a course that:

- 232 (i) students typically complete within the first two years or 60 credits of education at
233 a degree-granting institution; or
- 234 (ii) fulfills a requirement for an associate degree.
- 235 (h) "Technical certificate education" means technical education that a technical college
236 provides to students who are seeking a certificate, continuing occupational education,
237 or enrolled as a secondary student.
- 238 (i)(i) "Upper-division" means the level of a course that:
- 239 (A) is an advanced undergraduate course at a degree-granting institution; and
240 (B) students typically complete in the last two years of a bachelor's degree.
- 241 (ii) "Upper-division" includes major-specific courses.
- 242 (j) "Vocational education" means career and technical education that a degree-granting
243 institution provides.
- 244 (2) In accordance with this section, the Legislature shall, as part of the higher education
245 appropriations budget process, annually determine the change in the amount of
246 enrollment funding for each:
- 247 (a) degree-granting institution; and
248 (b) technical college.
- 249 (3)(a) The Legislature shall determine the change in the amount of an institution's
250 enrollment funding based on the positive or negative change in enrollment at the
251 institution by:
- 252 (i) calculating the average direct instructional cost per budget-related full-time
253 equivalent at each level of instruction on a system-wide basis;
- 254 (ii) calculating the five-year average full-time equivalent budget-related resident
255 enrollment at each level of instruction at each institution for the five-year period
256 ending with the previous fiscal year and the five-year period ending with the year
257 before the previous fiscal year;
- 258 (iii) calculating the percentage change between each five-year period described in
259 Subsection (3)(a)(ii) by each level of instruction;
- 260 (iv) if the percent change in enrollment is greater than or equal to a 1% increase or
261 decrease, multiplying the average cost per full-time equivalent by the actual
262 change in full-time equivalent;
- 263 (v) applying a state cost-sharing weight based on institution type in accordance with
264 Subsection (3)(b); and
- 265 (vi) summing the amounts for the institution.

- 266 (b) The Legislature shall apply the following state cost-sharing weights in accordance
 267 with Subsection (3)(a)(v), representing the percentage of the average cost per
 268 full-time equivalent described in Subsection (3)(a) that the state funds:
 269 (i) for a research university described in Subsection 53H-3-602(1)(b)(i), 50%;
 270 (ii) for a regional university described in Subsection 53H-3-602(1)(b)(ii):
 271 (A) except as provided in Subsection (3)(b)(ii)(B), 60%; or
 272 (B) for a regional university that does not increase lower-division combined
 273 tuition and general fees from the previous year, 65%;
 274 (iii) for a community college described in Subsection 53H-3-602(1)(b)(iii), 75%; and
 275 (iv) for a technical college, 90%.

276 Section 4. Section **53H-8-301** is amended to read:

277 **53H-8-301 (Effective 07/01/26). Definitions.**

278 As used in this part:

- 279 (1) "Account" means the Performance Funding Restricted Account created in Section
 280 53H-8-302.
- 281 (2) "Award" means a degree or certificate that an institution grants.
- 282 (3) "Cohort" means a group of students, defined by the year in which the group enrolls in an
 283 institution.
- 284 [(2)] (4) "Estimated revenue growth from targeted jobs" means the estimated increase in
 285 individual income tax revenue generated by individuals employed in targeted jobs,
 286 determined in accordance with Sections 53H-8-302 and 53H-8-306.
- 287 [(3)] (5) "Full new performance funding amount" means the maximum amount of new
 288 performance funding that an institution may qualify for in a fiscal year, determined by
 289 the Legislature in accordance with Section 53H-8-303.
- 290 [(4)] (6) "Full-time" means the number of credit hours the board determines is full-time
 291 enrollment for a student.[-]
- 292 (7) "High-demand" job means:
 293 (a) a targeted job; and
 294 (b) a strategically important occupation that the board identifies in accordance with
 295 Subsection 53H-8-303(2).
- 296 [(5)] (8) "New performance funding" means the difference between the total amount of
 297 money in the account and the amount of money appropriated from the account for
 298 performance funding in the current fiscal year.
- 299 [(6)] (9) "Performance" means total performance across the metrics described in Section

300 53H-8-304.

301 (10) "Strategically important occupation" means an occupation that:

302 (a) is not a targeted job; and

303 (b) supports strategic objectives for state workforce development in core public services
 304 or emerging industries.

305 ~~[(7)]~~ (11) "Targeted job" means a four- and five-star job that requires postsecondary training
 306 as designated by the Department of Workforce Services.

307 Section 5. Section **53H-8-304** is amended to read:

308 **53H-8-304 (Effective 07/01/26). Performance metrics for institutions --**
 309 **Determination of performance.**

310 (1)(a)(i) The board shall establish a model for determining an institution's
 311 performance.

312 (ii) The board shall:

313 (A) set a five-year goal for the Utah System of Higher Education for each metric
 314 described in Subsection (2)(a);

315 (B) adopt five-year goals for each institution that align with each goal described in
 316 Subsection (1)(a)(ii)(A);~~and]~~

317 (C) ensure the goals the board adopts for each institution described in Subsection
 318 (1)(a)(ii)(B) are sufficiently rigorous to meet the goals described in Subsection
 319 (1)(a)(ii)(A); and

320 (D) set a five-year goal for each institution for each metric described in
 321 Subsection (2)(b).

322 (b)(i) The board shall submit a draft of the model described in this section to the
 323 Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee and the governor for comments
 324 and recommendations.

325 (ii) Every five years, the board shall:

326 (A) submit the model described in Subsection (1)(a)(i) and the goals described in
 327 Subsection (1)(a)(ii) to the Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee
 328 and to the governor for comments and recommendations; and

329 (B) consider the comments and recommendations described in Subsection

344 degree-granting institutions and five strategically important occupations for

346 (A) the Talent, Education, and Industry Alignment Board created in Section
347 53H-13-302 recommends to the board; and
348 (B) the board approves;
349 (ii) if a strategically important occupation described in Subsection (1)(d)(i) becomes
350 a targeted job, the board may identify another strategically important occupation
351 in accordance with the limit described in Subsection (1)(d)(i); and
352 (iii) if a job no longer constitutes a high-demand job, either because the board
353 de-selects a strategically important occupation in favor of a different occupation
354 or because a job is no longer a targeted job, the job shall remain a factor for
355 performance funding calculations in relation to the students who were enrolled in
356 the given program at the time the job most recently constituted a high-demand job.
- 357 (2)(a) [The] For the five-year performance period beginning on July 1, 2022, and ending
358 on June 30, 2027, the board shall set the goals and establish the performance model
359 described in Subsection (1)(a)(i) for the following metrics:
360 (i) access;
361 (ii) timely completion; and
362 (iii) high-yield awards.
- 363 (b) For the five-year performance period beginning on July 1, 2027, and ending on June
364 30, 2032, the board shall establish the performance model described in Subsection
365 (1)(a)(i) and set the goals described in Subsection (1)(a)(ii)(D) for the following
366 metrics:
367 (i) for each institution:

368 (A) responsiveness to workforce needs, measured by degrees and certificates the
 369 institution awarded that map to high-demand jobs in the state; and

370 (B) institutional efficiency, measured by degrees and certificates the institution
 371 awarded per full-time equivalent student;

372 (ii) for each degree-granting institution:

373 (A) the metrics described in Subsection (2)(b)(i); and

374 (B) timely completion, meaning the percentage of a cohort that completes an
 375 award within 150% of the time in which a student typically completes the
 376 award at full-time status, measured by awards granted;

377 (iii) for each regional university and community college described in Subsections
 378 53H-3-602(1)(b)(ii) and 53G-3-602(1)(b)(iii):

379 (A) the metrics described in Subsection (2)(b)(i); and

380 (B) the number of students achieving the student's first 30 credit hours;

381 (iv) for each research university described in Subsection 53H-3-602(1)(b)(iv):

382 (A) the metrics described in Subsection (2)(b)(i); and

383 (B) the total number of research dollars the university expended; and

384 (v) for each technical college:
