22 Section 1. Section 78A-1-103 is amended to read:

25 The number of district court judges is:

26 (1) four district court judges in the First Judicial District;

27 (2) 14 district court judges in the Second Judicial District;

28 (3) [32] 33 district court judges in the Third Judicial District;

29 (4) 13 district court judges in the Fourth Judicial District;

30 (5) [seven] eight district court judges in the Fifth Judicial District;

31 (6) two district court judges in the Sixth Judicial District;

32 (7) three district court judges in the Seventh Judicial District; and

33 (8) three district court judges in the Eighth Judicial District.

23 **Selection and functions.**

24 (1) The Supreme Court consists of [five] seven justices.

29 (a) A justice of the Supreme Court is appointed initially to serve until the first general election held
more than three years after the effective date of the appointment.

33 (b) After the first term of appointment under Subsection (2)(a), the term of office of a justice of the
Supreme Court is 10 years and commences on the first Monday in January following the date of
election.

35 (3)

36 (a) Upon any vacancy in the office of chief justice, including expiration of a term of the office of chief
justice, or upon a chief justice's death, removal, or resignation, the governor shall appoint a chief
justice from among the members of the Supreme Court, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

37 (b) Except as provided in Subsection (3)(c), the term of the office of chief justice is eight years.

38 (c)

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- (i) For a chief justice whose term of office began on April 1, 2024, the term of the office of the chief justice is four years.
- 37 (ii) The term of the office of chief justice expires on April 1, 2028, for any chief justice who is elected to serve by the justices of the Supreme Court before October 14, 2025.
- 40 (d) On and after October 14, 2025, a member of the Supreme Court may not serve as chief justice for more than one term.

(a) The Court of Appeals consists of [seven] nine judges.

73 (b) The term of appointment to office as a judge of the Court of Appeals is until the first general election held more than three years after the effective date of the appointment.

75 (c) After the first term of appointment under Subsection (1)(b), the term of office of a judge of the Court of Appeals is six years and commences on the first Monday in January, next following the date of election.

78 (d) A judge whose term expires may serve, upon request of the Judicial Council, until a successor is appointed and qualified.

80 (2)

(a) The Court of Appeals shall sit and render judgment in panels of three judges.

81 (b) Assignment to panels shall be by random rotation of all judges of the Court of Appeals.

83 (c) The Court of Appeals by rule shall provide for the selection of a chair for each panel.

84 (d) The Court of Appeals may not sit en banc.

85 (3)

(a) The judges of the Court of Appeals shall elect a presiding judge from among the members of the court by majority vote of all judges.

87 (b) The term of office of the presiding judge is two years and until a successor is elected.

88 (c) A presiding judge of the Court of Appeals may serve in that office no more than two successive terms.

90 (d) The Court of Appeals may by rule provide for an acting presiding judge to serve in the absence or incapacity of the presiding judge.

92 (e) The presiding judge of the Court of Appeals shall receive \$2,000 per annum of additional compensation for the period served as presiding judge.

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- (a) The presiding judge may be removed from the office of presiding judge by majority vote of all judges of the Court of Appeals.
- 96 (b) In addition to the duties of a judge of the Court of Appeals, the presiding judge shall:
 - 97 (i) administer the rotation and scheduling of panels;
 - 98 (ii) act as liaison with the Supreme Court;
 - 99 (iii) call and preside over the meetings of the Court of Appeals; and
 - 100 (iv) carry out duties prescribed by the Supreme Court and the Judicial Council.

 - (a) The judges of the Court of Appeals shall elect an associate presiding judge from among the members of the court by majority vote of all judges.

Effective Date.

This bill takes effect:

- 108 (1) except as provided in Subsection (2), May 6, 2026; or
- 109 (2) if approved by two-thirds of all members elected to each house:
 - 110 (a) upon approval by the governor;
 - 111 (b) without the governor's signature, the day following the constitutional time limit of Utah Constitution, Article VII, Section 8; or
 - 113 (c) in the case of a veto, the date of veto override.

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
