Public Education Revisions

2026 GENERAL SESSION

LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill amends provisions and programs regarding the operation of the public education system.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- corrects references regarding the State Superintendent's Annual Report;
- authorizes the State Board of Education (state board) to appoint the state superintendent of public instruction as the superintendent of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind (USDB) and provides associated delegation authority;
- renames the Catalyst Center Grant Program to the Applied Educational Experience Grant Program and amends associated provisions regarding eligibility for and use of program funds;
- aligns terminology regarding juvenile justice reintegration to apply to all local education agencies rather than only school districts;
- amends provisions to allow the USDB to coordinate with the state security chief rather than the county security chief of the county for each USDB campus;
- allows the state board to reduce suicide prevention grant amounts in certain circumstances; and
- makes technical and conforming changes.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **53E-1-203** is amended to read:

53E-1-203 . State Superintendent's Annual Report.

(1) The state board shall prepare and submit to the governor, the Education Interim Committee, and the Public Education Appropriations Subcommittee, by January 15 of each year, an annual written report known as the State Superintendent's Annual Report that includes:

- (a) the operations, activities, programs, and services of the state board;
- (b) subject to Subsection (4)(b), all reports listed in Subsection (4)(a); and
- (c) data on the general condition of the schools with recommendations considered desirable for specific programs, including:
 - (i) a complete statement of fund balances;
 - (ii) a complete statement of revenues by fund and source;
 - (iii) a complete statement of adjusted expenditures by fund, the status of bonded indebtedness, the cost of new school plants, and school levies;
 - (iv) a complete statement of state funds allocated to each school district and charter school by source, including supplemental appropriations, and a complete statement of expenditures by each school district and charter school, including supplemental appropriations, by function and object as outlined in the United States Department of Education publication "Financial Accounting for Local and State School Systems";
 - (v) a statement that includes data on:

- (A) fall enrollments;
- (B) average membership;
- (C) high school graduates;
- (D) all employees, including data reported by school districts on educator ratings described in Section 53G-11-511;
- (E) pupil-teacher ratios;
- (F) average class sizes;
- (G) average salaries;
- (H) applicable private school data; and
- (I) data from statewide assessments described in Section 53E-4-301 for each school and school district;

(vi) statistical information for each school district and charter school regarding:

- (A) student attendance by grade level;
- (B) the percentage of students chronically absent;
- (C) the percentage of student excused absences; and
- (D) the percentage of student unexcused absences;

(vii) statistical information regarding incidents of delinquent activity in the schools, at school-related activities, on school buses, and at school bus stops; and

(viii) other statistical and financial information about the school system that the state superintendent considers pertinent.

For the purposes of Subsection (1)(c)(v):

- (i) the pupil-teacher ratio for a school shall be calculated by dividing the number of students enrolled in a school by the number of full-time equivalent teachers assigned to the school, including regular classroom teachers, school-based specialists, and special education teachers;
- (ii) the pupil-teacher ratio for a school district shall be the median pupil-teacher ratio of the schools within a school district;
- (iii) the pupil-teacher ratio for charter schools aggregated shall be the median pupil-teacher ratio of charter schools in the state; and
- (iv) the pupil-teacher ratio for the state's public schools aggregated shall be the median pupil-teacher ratio of public schools in the state.

The report shall:

- (i) include the pupil-teacher ratio for:
 - (A) each school district;

97 (B) the charter schools aggregated; and
98 (C) the state's public schools aggregated; and
99 (ii) identify a website where pupil-teacher ratios for each school in the state may be
100 accessed.

101 (3) For each operation, activity, program, or service provided by the state board, the annual
102 report shall include:

- 103 (a) a description of the operation, activity, program, or service;
- 104 (b) data and metrics:
 - 105 (i) selected and used by the state board to measure progress, performance,
106 effectiveness, and scope of the operation, activity, program, or service, including
107 summary data; and
 - 108 (ii) that are consistent and comparable for each state operation, activity, program, or
109 service;
- 110 (c) budget data, including the amount and source of funding, expenses, and allocation of
111 full-time employees for the operation, activity, program, or service;
- 112 (d) historical data from previous years for comparison with data reported under
113 Subsections (3)(b) and (c);
- 114 (e) goals, challenges, and achievements related to the operation, activity, program, or
115 service;
- 116 (f) relevant federal and state statutory references and requirements;
- 117 (g) contact information of officials knowledgeable and responsible for each operation,
118 activity, program, or service; and
- 119 (h) other information determined by the state board that:
 - 120 (i) may be needed, useful, or of historical significance; or
 - 121 (ii) promotes accountability and transparency for each operation, activity, program,
122 or service with the public and elected officials.

123 (4)(a) Except as provided in Subsection (4)(b), the annual report shall also include:

- 124 (i) the report described in Section [53E-3-507] 53F-5-224 by the state board on career
125 and technical education needs and program access;
- 126 (ii) the report described in Section 53E-3-515 by the state board on the Hospitality
127 and Tourism Management Career and Technical Education Pilot Program;
- 128 (iii) the report described in Section 53E-3-516 by the state board on certain incidents
129 that occur on school grounds;
- 130 (iv) the report described in Section 53E-4-202 by the state board on the development

131 and implementation of the core standards for Utah public schools;

132 (v) the report described in Section 53E-5-310 by the state board on school [turnaround]
133 improvement and leadership development;

134 (vi) the report described in Section 53E-10-308 by the state board and Utah Board of
135 Higher Education on student participation in the concurrent enrollment program;

136 (vii) the report described in Section 53F-5-506 by the state board on information
137 related to personalized, competency-based learning;

138 (viii) the report described in Section [53G-8-203] 53G-8-301 by the state board on
139 LEAs' policies and procedures related to physical restraint and interventions; and

140 (ix) the report described in Section 53G-9-802 by the state board on dropout
141 prevention and recovery services.

142 (b) The Education Interim Committee or the Public Education Appropriations
143 Subcommittee may request a report described in Subsection (4)(a) to be reported
144 separately from the State Superintendent's Annual Report.

145 (5) The annual report shall be designed to provide clear, accurate, and accessible
146 information to the public, the governor, and the Legislature.

147 (6) The state board shall:

148 (a) submit the annual report in accordance with Section 68-3-14; and
149 (b) make the annual report, and previous annual reports, accessible to the public by
150 placing a link to the reports on the state board's website.

151 (7)(a) Upon request of the Education Interim Committee or Public Education
152 Appropriations Subcommittee, the state board shall present the State Superintendent's
153 Annual Report to either committee.

154 (b) After submitting the State Superintendent's Annual Report in accordance with this
155 section, the state board may supplement the report at a later time with updated data,
156 information, or other materials as necessary or upon request by the governor, the
157 Education Interim Committee, or the Public Education Appropriations Subcommittee.

158 Section 2. Section **53E-8-204** is amended to read:

159 **53E-8-204 . Authority of the state board -- Rulemaking -- Superintendent --**

160 **Advisory council.**

161 (1)(a) The state board is the governing board of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the
162 Blind.

163 (b) The state board shall, as the state board determines necessary, establish committees,
164 policies, or processes necessary to the function and oversight of the Utah Schools for

165 the Deaf and the Blind.

166 (2)(a) The state board shall appoint a superintendent for the Utah Schools for the Deaf
167 and the Blind.

168 (b) The state board shall make rules in accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah
169 Administrative Rulemaking Act, regarding the qualifications, terms of employment,
170 and duties of the superintendent for the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind.

171 (c)(i) The state board may appoint the state superintendent as the superintendent for
172 the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind under Subsection (2)(a).

173 (ii) If the state board appoints the state superintendent as the superintendent under

201 (1) As used in this section:

202 (a) "Advisory board" means a group of individuals comprising industry, postsecondary,
203 and community representatives who review program direction and ensure alignment
204 with workforce needs.

205 [(a)] (b) "[Catalyst] Applied professional education experience center" or "APEX center"
206 means a program or facility operated by an LEA that:

207 (i) provides learning experiences and instruction that replicate professional
208 environments and workplace practices, including experiences obtained through
209 the Utah First Credential program described in Section 53E-10-310;

210 (ii) provides profession-based learning experiences by partnering with local industry,
211 business, and community organizations to develop and implement student projects
212 that address specific needs or objectives identified by those partners;

213 (iii) aligns programs with high-skill, high-demand career pathways and
214 postsecondary education opportunities;

215 (iv) incorporates industry-standard tools, technologies, and methods into instruction
216 and student work;

217 (v) prioritizes student activities and profession-based learning projects to build
218 durable professional skills aligned with industry standards and needs;

219 (vi) facilitates mentorship and participation by industry professionals to guide a
220 student and evaluate the student's work;

221 (vii) includes an advisory board composed of industry, postsecondary, and
222 community representatives to review program direction and ensure alignment with
223 workforce needs; and

224 (viii) establishes programs or activities that address gaps in training or resources
225 within the local or regional workforce.

226 (c) "Consortium" means two or more LEAs located within the same career and technical
227 education geographic planning region.

228 [(b)] (d) "Director" means the employee described in Subsection (3).

229 [(e)] (e) "LEA" means:

230 (i) a school district;

231 (ii) charter school; or

232 (iii) the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind.

233 [d] (f) "Program" means the [Catalyst Center] Applied Professional Education
234 Experience Grant Program created in this section.

235 (g) "Unwarranted duplication" means the overlap of resources that lead to inefficiencies,
236 wasted resources, or a lack of coordination in providing comprehensive career and
237 technical education programs.

238 (2) Subject to legislative appropriation as described in Section 53F-9-204, the state board
239 shall establish the [Catalyst Center] Applied Professional Education Experience Grant
240 Program to provide funding to an LEA to create or expand an existing [eatalyst] APEX
241 center.

242 (3) The state board shall hire a director to oversee the program who:

243 (a) has demonstrated abilities in:

244 (i) developing and implementing innovative initiatives that transform traditional
245 education delivery models;

246 (ii) establishing public-private partnership frameworks that create student pathways
247 into high-growth industries; and

248 (iii) scaling programs that integrate real-world experiences directly into educational
249 environments;

250 (b) possesses expertise in:

251 (i) managing complex multi-stakeholder initiatives across education, industry, and
252 government sectors;

253 (ii) implementing data-driven organizational change strategies; and

254 (iii) developing sustainable funding models for innovative education programs;

255 (c) maintains active leadership roles in:

256 (i) state or national workforce innovation organizations;

257 (ii) industry associations focused on talent development; and

258 (iii) public-private collaboratives addressing workforce transformation;

259 (d) reports directly to the state superintendent or a deputy superintendent to ensure
260 appropriate program oversight and cross-departmental coordination while
261 maintaining distinct program objectives and outcomes;

262 (e) establishes formal collaboration mechanisms with the state board's career and
263 technical education director to align [eatalyst] APEX center initiatives with existing
264 career and technical education programs; and

265 (f) facilitates training and a collaborative network of experienced [eatalyst] APEX center
266 administrators and instructors across all participating LEAs.

267 (4) The director:

268 (a) shall:

269 (i) administer the program;

270 (ii) collaborate with the director of career and technical education to align the
271 program with the career and technical education standards described in Section [
272 ~~53E-3-507~~ 53F-5-224;

273 (iii) create a web-based application system to streamline submissions and allow for
274 linked supporting documentation;

275 (iv) ensure that grant funds are used in accordance with this section; and

276 (v) allow grant funds to be used for planning, including:

277 (A) feasibility studies;

278 (B) stakeholder engagement;

279 (C) labor market analysis;

280 (D) initial program design and rollout; and

281 (E) teacher and staff training specific to the delivery of profession-based learning;
282 and

283 (b) may collaborate with the Utah System of Higher Education and the First Credential
284 Oversight Committee established in Section 53E-10-310.

285 (5) An LEA applying for a grant shall demonstrate capacity for workforce alignment

286 programs within the LEA or provide a plan to establish or enhance alignment by:

287 (a) describing current or planned efforts to align programming with labor market needs
288 and local industry demands;

289 (b) outlining steps to establish or enhance partnerships with:

290 (i) local industries and employers to ensure workforce relevance; or

291 (ii) technical colleges, degree-granting institutions, or other postsecondary entities to
292 support postsecondary transitions for students;

293 (c) identifying proposed programming goals and how the goals address gaps in regional
294 workforce training or opportunities; and

295 (d) as the LEA determines relevant, planning to incorporate:

296 (i) career and technical student organizations;

297 (ii) advisory boards with representation from local industries and workforce experts;

298 (iii) professional learning opportunities for instructors to improve workforce-focused
299 skills; and

334 [(x)] (xi) a description of any proposed planning activities, including expected

335 timelines and outcomes.

336 (7)(a) The director shall:

337 [(a)] (i) prioritize an LEA that:

338 [(i)] (A) proposes innovative programming supported by local labor market data;

339 [(ii)] (B) collaborates with local postsecondary institutions and industry;

340 [(iii)] (C) demonstrates the ability to sustain the [eatalyst] APEX center after the
341 grant period;

342 [(iv)] (D) demonstrates a strong focus on student outcomes and workforce
343 alignment;

344 [(v)] (E) addresses gaps in high-demand, high-skill career pathways;

345 [(vi)] (F) ensures funds are used to enhance programming quality before
346 expansion; and

347 [(vii)] (G) provides for a large number of students to participate in [eatalyst] APEX
348 center programs without limiting participation to students based on
349 socio-economic challenges;

350 [(b)] (ii) allow an LEA to apply for:

351 [(i)] (A) smaller grants to bring existing career and technical education programs
352 to high-quality standards the state board establishes;

353 [(ii)] (B) larger multi-year grants for capital expenditures and program expansion;

355 [(iii)] (C) ensure that grant funding does not duplicate existing resources provided
356 by other state or local entities;

357 [(e)] (iii) consider the unique challenges and opportunities faced by rural LEAs in
358 developing and sustaining a career and technical education program or [eatalyst]
359 APEX center, including:

360 [(i)] (A) encouraging collaborative applications from rural consortia or regional
361 education service agencies described in Section 53G-4-410 to maximize

467 (c) the Division of Juvenile Justice and Youth Services;
468 (d) a school safety and security specialist designated under Section 53G-8-701.6;
469 (e) school safety and security director designated under Section 53G-8-701.8;
470 (f) a school resource officer if applicable; and

471 (g) any other relevant party that should be involved in a reintegration plan.

472 (2) If [a school district] an LEA receives a notification from the juvenile court or a law
473 enforcement agency that a student was arrested for, charged with, or adjudicated in the

743 (g) "State suicide prevention coordinator" means the state suicide prevention coordinator

747 collaboration with the training, programs, and initiatives described in Section 53G-9-607,
