Public Education Revisions

2026 GENERAL SESSION

LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill amends provisions and programs regarding the operation of the public education system.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- defines terms, including "general control and supervision" of the public education system;
- corrects references regarding the State Superintendent's Annual Report;
- allows the State Board of Education (state board) to authorize the state superintendent of public instruction to appoint and supervise the superintendent of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind (USDB);
- renames the Catalyst Center Grant Program to the Applied Educational Experience Grant Program and amends associated provisions regarding eligibility for and use of program funds;
- amends the allowable use of funds in the Grow Your Own Educator Pipeline Program for paraprofessionals;
- aligns terminology regarding juvenile justice reintegration to apply to all local education agencies rather than only school districts;
- amends provisions to allow the USDB to coordinate with the state security chief rather than the county security chief of the county for each USDB campus;
- allows the state board to reduce suicide prevention grant amounts in certain circumstances; and
- makes technical and conforming changes.

96 (1) The state board shall prepare and submit to the governor, the Education Interim

- 97 Committee, and the Public Education Appropriations Subcommittee, by January 15 of
98 each year, an annual written report known as the State Superintendent's Annual Report
99 that includes:
- 100 (a) the operations, activities, programs, and services of the state board;
 - 101 (b) subject to Subsection (4)(b), all reports listed in Subsection (4)(a); and
 - 102 (c) data on the general condition of the schools with recommendations considered
103 desirable for specific programs, including:
 - 104 (i) a complete statement of fund balances;
 - 105 (ii) a complete statement of revenues by fund and source;

159 summary data; and
- 160 (ii) that are consistent and comparable for each state operation, activity, program, or
161 service;
- 162 (c) budget data, including the amount and source of funding, expenses, and allocation of
163 full-time employees for the operation, activity, program, or service;
- 164 (d) historical data from previous years for comparison with data reported under

- 213 (1)(a) The state board is the governing board of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the
- 214 Blind.
- 215 (b) The state board shall, as the state board determines necessary, establish committees,
- 216 policies, or processes necessary to the function and oversight of the Utah Schools for
- 217 the Deaf and the Blind.
- 218 ~~(2)(a) The state board shall appoint a superintendent for the Utah Schools for the Deaf~~
- 219 ~~and the Blind.]~~
- 220 (a) With the approval of the state board, the state superintendent of public instruction
- 221 shall appoint and supervise a superintendent of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the
- 222 Blind who reports directly to the state superintendent.

248 (1) As used in this section:

249 (a) "Eligible institution" means an institution of higher education as defined in Section
 250 53H-1-101.

251 (b) "First credential" means a certificate awarded by the state board to an eligible student
 252 who meets the criteria described in Subsection (7).

253 (c)(i) "Industry-recognized credential" means a credential that is:

254 (A) developed and offered by, or endorsed by, a nationally recognized industry
 255 association or organization representing a sizable portion of the industry sector;

256 (B) sought or accepted by employers within the industry or sector as a recognized,
 257 preferred, or required credential for recruitment, screening, hiring, retention, or
 258 advancement purposes; and

259 (C) regularly reviewed, updated, and validated by the issuing body to ensure
 260 ongoing alignment with industry standards and labor market needs.

261 (ii) "Industry-recognized credential" may also include a credential offered through a
 262 catalyst center as described in Section [53E-3-507.1] 53F-5-224.

263 (d) "Master credential list" means the list of approved industry-recognized credentials
 264 maintained by the state board in accordance with this section.

266 (f) "Technical college" means the same as that term is defined in Section 53H-1-101.

- 267 (2) The commissioner of higher education, the state superintendent of public instruction,
268 and the governor's education advisor shall establish the First Credential Oversight
269 Committee comprised of:
- 270 (a) representatives from industries, including:
- 271 (i) members of professional associations or trade groups; and
- 272 (ii) employers from high-demand sectors as the state board determines in
273 collaboration with the Utah Board of Higher Education and the Department of
274 Workforce Services;

- 309 (g) strategies for promoting stackability and sequencing of credentials;
- 310 (h) approaches to ensure regional relevance of credentials;
- 311 (i) mechanisms for collaboration between educational institutions, industry partners, and
- 312 workforce development agencies;
- 313 (j) strategies for continuous evaluation and improvement of the program;
- 314 (k) the creation of a credentials review committee, including membership and duties;
- 315 (l) in accordance with Subsection (17), an established framework of planning,

- 319 (i) assigns higher values to credentials based on:
- 320 (A) alignment with high-demand, high-wage occupations;
- 321 (B) incorporation of multiple learning pathways, including coursework,
- 322 apprenticeships, internships, work-based learning, and related service
- 323 opportunities;
- 324 (C) industry recognition and portability; and
- 325 (D) stackability with other credentials or degrees; and
- 326 (ii) uses the weighted values to:
- 327 (A) determine incentive funding levels;
- 328 (B) prioritize program expansion support; and
- 329 (C) guide student career planning; and
- 330 (n) guidelines for LEAs to procure industry-recognized certification program licenses,
- 331 including:
- 332 (i) verification that certifications appear on the master credential list;
- 333 (ii) requirement for competency-based assessments in proctored environments;
- 334 (iii) documentation of local industry endorsement; and

- 335 (iv) alignment with state and federal computer science initiatives where applicable,
336 including the Computer Science for Utah Grant Program described in Section
337 53H-13-306.
- 338 (5) In accordance with the Utah First Credential Master Plan, the state board shall:
- 339 (a) ensure that the credentials review committee membership reflects a balance of
340 perspectives and expertise;
- 341 (b) develop an online application and submission system for credentialing organizations
342 and providers to submit programs for inclusion in the master credential list;
- 343 (c) establish and maintain the master credential list based on the recommendations of the
344 credentials review committee;
- 345 (d) develop clear mechanisms for students to understand how earning one credential can
346 lead to higher-level certifications or degrees; and
- 347 (e) foster partnerships between high schools, technical colleges, employers, and
348 apprenticeship programs to ensure students have access to meaningful work-based
349 learning opportunities.
- 350 (6) The state board shall:
- 351 (a) automatically include on the initial master credential list any existing credential that:
352 (i) meets the definition of industry-recognized credential under this section; and
353 (ii) is currently recognized by the state board or Utah Board of Higher Education as
354 of July 1, 2024; and
- 355 (b) review all automatically included credentials within one year to ensure ongoing
356 compliance with program requirements.
- 357 (7) The state board shall award a first credential certificate to an eligible student who
358 completes one of the following:
- 359 (a) concurrent enrollment courses, composed of:
- 360 (i) between 12 and 18 core general education credits, or as industry standards dictate,
361 with courses from different general education categories; or
- 362 (ii) a prescribed set of courses as the Utah Board of Higher Education designates;
- 363 (b) an industry-recognized credential included on the master credential list;
- 364 (c) 300 hours of completion through a youth apprenticeship program that:
- 365 (i) is described in Sections 35A-6-102 and 35A-6-104.5; and
- 366 (ii) includes courses that fulfill the requirements for an industry-recognized credential
367 included on the master credential list;
- 368 (d) completion of a technical college certificate; or

- 369 (e) completion of a Career and Technical Education Pathway program.
- 370 (8) The Utah Board of Higher Education shall ensure that credits earned for a first
371 credential certificate are:
- 372 (a) accepted and transferable to institutions of higher education, including technical
373 colleges;
- 374 (b) applicable towards relevant degree programs; and
- 375 (c) recognized by relevant industries as adequate preparation for employment.
- 376 (9) Subject to legislative appropriations, the Utah Board of Higher Education shall award a
377 first credential scholarship to each student who earns a first credential certificate.
- 378 (10) The first credential scholarship may be used at the following institutions:
- 379 (a) an institution of higher education as defined in Section 53H-1-101; or
- 380 (b) a private, nonprofit college or university in the state that is accredited by the
381 Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities.
- 382 (11) The Utah Board of Higher Education shall annually determine the first credential
383 scholarship amount based on:
- 384 (a) the number of eligible students; and
- 385 (b) appropriations made by the Legislature.
- 386 (12) A student may use the first credential scholarship for:
- 387 (a) tuition and fees;
- 388 (b) books and supplies; or
- 389 (c) other educational expenses as the Utah Board of Higher Education determines.
- 390 (13) The Utah Board of Higher Education shall ensure the scholarship is valid for use
391 within three years from the date the student graduates from high school.
- 392 (14) A student may earn the first credential scholarship in addition to any other
393 state-sponsored scholarships for which the student may be eligible.
- 394 (15) The first credential oversight committee shall present the master plan described in
395 Subsection (4) to the Education Interim Committee by the November 2025 interim
396 committee meeting.
- 397 (16) Every three years, the First Credential Oversight Committee shall:
- 398 (a) review the Utah First Credential Master Plan;
- 399 (b) as needed, create a list of recommendations and update the Utah First Credential
400 Master Plan;
- 401 (c) report the list of recommendations and the updated Utah First Credential Master Plan
402 to:

- 403 (i) the state board;
- 404 (ii) the Utah Board of Higher Education;
- 405 (iii) the Department of Workforce Services;
- 406 (iv) the Education Interim Committee; and
- 407 (v) the Economic Development and Workforce Services Interim Committee.
- 408 (17)(a) The state board shall administer a first credential grant program for an LEA and
- 409 award a grant in accordance with the following process.
- 410 (b) The First Credential Oversight Committee shall establish:
- 411 (i) a needs assessment tool that evaluates:
- 412 (A) an LEA's current first credential offering;
- 413 (B) an LEA's capacity to develop or expand a first credential pathway;
- 414 (C) resources and support needed for a first credential program, including
- 415 resources available through institutions of higher education, industry
- 416 partnership opportunities, and general resource availability; and
- 417 (D) each potential barrier to implementation; and
- 418 (ii) a continuum of need to place each applying LEA.
- 419 (c) An LEA seeking a first credential grant shall submit to the First Credential Oversight
- 420 Committee:
- 421 (i) a completed needs assessment; and
- 422 (ii) a grant application that contains:
- 423 (A) current first credential data, including current credentials offered;
- 424 (B) preliminary goals for creating or expanding first credential opportunities
- 425 within the LEA; and
- 426 (C) if applicable, plans for procurement of industry certification program licenses,
- 427 including certification details and alignment with master credential list,
- 428 documentation of employer endorsements, assessment and proctoring
- 429 procedures, and integration with existing computer science programs.
- 430 (d) The First Credential Oversight Committee shall:
- 431 (i) review each submitted application and needs assessment;
- 432 (ii) assign the LEA a placement on the continuum of need; and
- 433 (iii) provide to the LEA a specific requirement for an implementation plan based on:
- 434 (A) the LEA's continuum placement;
- 435 (B) each identified area for growth;
- 436 (C) each available resource; and

- 437 (D) each additional factor the First Credential Oversight Committee determines
438 relevant.
- 439 (e) An LEA shall submit to the First Credential Oversight Committee an implementation
440 plan that includes:
- 441 (i) specific goals for expanding a first credential opportunity;
 - 442 (ii) each implementation step and timeline;
 - 443 (iii) a detailed cost projection; and
 - 444 (iv) each additional element the committee requires based on the needs assessment
445 results.
- 446 (f) The First Credential Oversight Committee shall:
- 447 (i) review the implementation plan;

- 1157 (ii) if a middle or junior high school includes grade 6, grade 6.
- 1158 (g) "State suicide prevention coordinator" means the state suicide prevention coordinator
1159 described in Section 26B-5-611.
- 1160 (2) In collaboration with the public education suicide prevention coordinator, a school
1161 district or charter school shall implement a youth suicide prevention program, which, in
