Public School Attendance Amendments

2026 GENERAL SESSION

LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill establishes comprehensive student attendance monitoring, chronic absenteeism supports, and accountability requirements for local education agencies.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- establishes comprehensive student attendance monitoring and accountability requirements;
- requires local education agencies to implement enhanced attendance tracking and intervention programs;
- mandates performance metrics for attendance notifications and enforcement actions;
- creates data quality standards for student participation reporting;
- adds chronic absenteeism interventions as an allowed use of a school's School LAND Trust Program allocation; and
- makes technical changes.

 44 instructional periods; and

45 (b) a student receives direct teacher interaction and instruction for the course or program
 46 the student is enrolled in.

 48 program" means public education programs for kindergarten, elementary, and secondary
 49 school students that are operated and maintained for the amount derived by multiplying

305 enrolled in a public school shall attend the public school in which the school-age child is
306 enrolled.

308 board, or school district may impose administrative penalties on a school-age child who
309 is:

310 (a) in grade 7 or above, unless the school-age child is less than 12 years old; and

311 (b) truant.

349 (1)(a) As used in this section, "intervention" means a series of non-punitive and
 350 increasingly frequent and individualized activities that are designed to:

- 351 (i) create a trusting relationship between teachers, students, and parents;
- 352 (ii) improve attendance;
- 353 (iii) improve academic outcomes; and
- 354 (iv) reduce negative behavior referrals.

355 (b) "Intervention" includes:

- 356 (i) mentorship programs;
- 357 (ii) family connection to community resources;
- 358 (iii) academic support through small group or individualized tutoring or similar
 359 methods; and
- 360 (iv) teaching executive function skills, including:
 - 361 (A) planning;
 - 362 (B) goal setting;
 - 363 (C) understanding and following multi-step directions; and
 - 364 (D) self-regulation.

 366 attendance and resolve school absenteeism and truancy issues for each school-age

418 with Section 53G-6-702;

419 (b) parental refusal to comply with actions taken by school authorities in violation of
420 Section 53G-10-202, 53G-10-205, 53G-10-403, or 53G-10-203, does not constitute
421 educational neglect;

422 (c) parental refusal to support efforts by a school to encourage a minor to act in
423 accordance with any educational objective that focuses on the adoption or expression
