

Jerry W Stevenson proposes the following substitute bill:

Cardiac Emergency Response Plans in Schools

2026 GENERAL SESSION

LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill establishes requirements for cardiac emergency response plans in schools.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- defines terms;
- requires each school to develop a cardiac emergency response plan;
- requires plans to include evidence-based core elements for emergency cardiovascular care;
- requires appropriate placement and maintenance of automated external defibrillators

(AED);

- requires training of appropriate school staff in first aid, CPR, and AED use;
- establishes a grant program to aid in implementing cardiac emergency response plans; and
- requires the State Board of Education to make rules.

Money Appropriated in this Bill:

This bill appropriates \$200,000 in operating and capital budgets for fiscal year 2027, all of which is from the various sources as detailed in this bill.

Other Special Clauses:

This bill provides a special effective date.

Utah Code Sections Affected:

ENACTS:

53G-9-216, Utah Code Annotated 1953

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **53G-9-216** is enacted to read:

53G-9-216 . Cardiac emergency response plans.

(1) As used in this section:

- 29 (a) "AED" means automated external defibrillator.
- 30 (b) "Cardiac emergency response plan" or "CERP" means a plan developed by a school
31 that addresses the appropriate use of school personnel to respond to incidents
32 involving an individual experiencing sudden cardiac arrest or a similar
33 life-threatening emergency while on school grounds.
- 34 (c) "Emergency cardiovascular care" means immediate medical care provided to an
35 individual experiencing a life-threatening cardiovascular emergency.
- 36 (d) "Evidence-based core elements" means practices and standards for emergency
37 cardiovascular care that are:
- 38 (i) recommended by the American Heart Association; or
- 39 (ii) nationally recognized, evidence-based standards focused on emergency
40 cardiovascular care.
- 41 (e) "High-needs school" means a school:
- 42 (i) designated as a Title I school under 20 U.S.C. Sec. 6301 et seq.; or
- 43 (ii) where more than 50% of students are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch
44 under the National School Lunch Program.
- 45 (2) Beginning in the 2026-2027 school year, each school within an LEA shall develop a
46 CERP that integrates evidence-based core elements.
- 47 (3) An LEA shall ensure each school's CERP includes:
- 48 (a) appropriate placement of an AED that:
- 49 (i) is determined by the CERP in accordance with guidelines for AED placement that
50 an organization focused on emergency cardiovascular care establishes;
- 51 (ii) is identified with appropriate signage;
- 52 (iii) is on-site at the school or placed on school property in a location that is
53 accessible within three minutes; and
- 54 (iv) is maintained in an unlocked location on school property that enables placement
55 on a victim within three minutes; and
- 56 (b)(i) designation of appropriate school staff to be trained in:
- 57 (A) first aid;
- 58 (B) cardiopulmonary resuscitation, or CPR; and
- 59 (C) AED use that follows evidence-based guidelines; and
- 60 (ii) for the training under Subsection (3)(b)(i), relevant staff to attend the training,
61 which may include:
- 62 (A) an educator;

63 (B) a school nurse; or

64 (C) an athletic trainer.

65 (4)(a) An LEA shall ensure that each AED shall be tested and maintained according to
66 the manufacturer's operational guidelines.

67 (b) Each school within an LEA shall provide notification to the appropriate first aid,
68 ambulance, or rescue squad or other appropriate emergency medical services
69 provider regarding the AED, the type acquired, and the AED's location.

70 (5)(a) Subject to legislative appropriations, the state board shall distribute grant money
71 for implementing a CERP on a first come first served basis to LEAs with a
72 demonstrated need as the state board determines.

73 (b) The state board shall ensure grant money under this section be used for activities and
74 equipment that further promote CERP preparedness, including:

75 (i) the purchase of an AED;

76 (ii) AED maintenance, including pads and battery replacement;

77 (iii) the purchase of CPR training kits or CPR training for faculty and staff;

78 (iv) basic first aid training; and

79 (v) educational materials.

80 (c) In awarding grants under this section, the state board shall give priority to high-needs
81 schools.

82 (6) An LEA may accept gifts, grants, and donations, including in-kind donations designated
83 for the purchase of an AED that meets the standards established by the United States
84 Food and Drug Administration and for the costs incurred to inspect and maintain an
85 AED and train school staff in the use of an AED.

86 (7) In accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, the
87 state board may make rules to establish:

88 (a) grant application and distribution criteria; and

89 (b) compliance and monitoring for the requirements described under this section.

90 **Section 2. FY 2027 Appropriations.**

91 The following sums of money are appropriated for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
92 2026, and ending June 30, 2027. These are additions to amounts previously appropriated for
93 fiscal year 2027.

94 **Subsection 2(a). Operating and Capital Budgets**

95 Under the terms and conditions of Title 63J, Chapter 1, Budgetary Procedures Act, the
96 Legislature appropriates the following sums of money from the funds or accounts indicated for

97 the use and support of the government of the state of Utah.

98 ITEM 1 To State Board of Education - Contracted Initiatives and Grants

99 From Public Education Economic Stabilization

100 Restricted Account, One-time 200,000

101 Schedule of Programs:

102 Contracts and Grants 200,000

103 Section 3. **Effective Date.**

104 This bill takes effect on July 1, 2026.
