LONG TITLE

Committee Note:

The Legislative Process Committee recommended this bill.

General Description:

This resolution modifies Senate rules.

Highlighted Provisions:

This resolution:

- defines "minority leader" and "minority party";
- addresses rules and procedures that apply to an extraordinary session;
- clarifies the dates on which the Senate convenes;
- clarifies the rules that apply to a guest who accompanies a senator on the Senate floor;
- clarifies procedures related to a Senate executive office confirmation committee;
- clarifies when the presiding officer may speak to a point of order;
- modifies the procedure for legislation on the consent calendar;
- modifies the rules that do not apply during a committee of the whole; and
- makes technical and conforming changes.

40 *Be it resolved by the Senate of the state of Utah:*

41 Section 1. **SR1-1-101** is amended to read:

42 **SR1-1-101 . Adoption, amendment, or suspension of Senate rules.**

43 (1)(a) The Senate shall adopt Senate rules, by a constitutional two-thirds vote, at the
44 beginning of each new Legislature convening in an odd-numbered year.
45 (b) If a motion to adopt the rules under Subsection (1)(a) meets or exceeds a majority
46 vote but fails to reach a constitutional two-thirds vote:
47 (i) rules adopted by the Senate during the immediately preceding annual general
48 session, as amended during that general session and any intervening session, apply
49 to the conduct of the Senate; and
50 (ii) the presiding officer shall announce to the Senate that the previously adopted
51 rules apply to the newly convened Legislature.
52 (2)(a) Except as provided in this rule:
53 (i) during an annual general session held in an even-numbered year, rules adopted by
54 the Senate during the immediately preceding general session, as amended during
55 that general session and any intervening session, apply to the conduct of the
56 Senate; and
57 (ii) during any special session or extraordinary session, Senate rules apply as
58 provided in JR2-1-101.
59 (b) For a session described in Subsection (2)(a), the presiding officer shall announce to
60 the Senate that the previously adopted rules apply to the newly convened session.
61 (3) Except as provided in Subsection (4), additional rules may be adopted and existing rules
62 may be suspended, amended, or repealed by a majority vote, except for those rules that
63 require a two-thirds vote to adopt, suspend, amend, or repeal, including:
64 (a) rules governing motions for lifting tabled legislation from committee under
65 SR4-3-104; and

66 (b) rules governing consideration of legislation during the last three days of a session.

67 (4)(a) A rule that includes a voting requirement of more than a constitutional majority
68 must be adopted and may only be amended, suspended, or repealed by a
69 constitutional two-thirds vote.

70 (b) If the suspension of any Senate Rule is governed by the Utah Constitution or Utah
71 statutes, the Senate may suspend that rule only as provided by that constitutional or
72 statutory provision.

73 Section 2. **SR1-3-102** is amended to read:

74 **SR1-3-102 . Duties of the president.**

75 (1) The general duties of the president are to:

76 (a) assign responsibilities to and supervise the officers and employees of the Senate;
77 (b) assign places and determine access for news media representatives;
78 (c) call the Senate to order at the time scheduled for convening, and proceed with the
79 daily order of business;
80 (d) announce the business before the Senate in the order that it is to be acted upon;
81 (e) receive and submit all motions and proposals presented by senators;
82 (f) put to a vote all questions that arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the
83 results of the vote;
84 (g) enforce the Senate Rules governing debates;
85 (h) enforce observance of order and decorum;
86 (i) inform the Senate on any point of order or practice;
87 (j) receive and announce to the Senate any official messages and communications;
88 (k) sign all acts, orders, and proceedings of the Senate;
89 (l) appoint the members of committees; and
90 (m) represent the Senate, declaring its will and obeying its commands.

91 (2) The president shall:

92 (a) sign, or authorize a designee to sign, all requisitions on the Division of Finance to
93 pay Senate expenses; and
94 (b) give final approval of all expenditure requests as authorized by the majority leader
95 and the minority [leaders of the Senate] leader, as that term is defined in SR3-2-101,
96 including compensation and reimbursement for expenses for in-state and out-of-state
97 travel on legislative business.

98 Section 3. **SR1-5-101** is amended to read:

99 **SR1-5-101 . Convening -- Hour of meeting.**

100 (1) In addition to the dates provided in JR1-2-101, the Senate shall convene on the date set
101 by proclamation of the president that convenes the Senate into an extraordinary session.

102 (2) The Senate shall meet at 10 a.m. daily except Saturdays and Sundays, unless
103 otherwise announced by the presiding officer.

104 Section 4. **SR2-4-101** is amended to read:

105 **SR2-4-101 . Admittance to the Senate chamber.**

106 (1)(a) While the Senate is convened in annual general session or special session and
107 except as specifically provided elsewhere in this rule, only legislators, legislative
108 officers and employees, professional staff, former legislators who are not registered
109 as lobbyists, legal spouses of legislators, legislative interns, and individuals invited
110 by senators are allowed in the Senate chamber, halls, and lounge.

111 (b) The president of the Senate may deny access to the Senate chamber, halls, and
112 lounge to any individual, other than a legislator, if the individual uses that access to
113 influence legislative decisions.

114 (2)(a) A senator or the senator's legislative intern shall accompany each visitor in the
115 chamber, lounge, or hallways and is responsible for that visitor.

116 (b) After the visit, the senator or the senator's legislative intern shall ensure that the
117 visitor leaves the chamber, lounge, or hallway.

118 (3)(a) A senator may invite a guest to accompany the senator on the Senate floor,
119 provided that:

120 (i) the senator ensures that the guest does not encroach on a neighboring senator's
121 desk space, impede staff work, or distract from the work of the Senate, and no
122 neighboring senator makes such an objection; and

123 (ii) the guest complies with [the requirements of SR2-4-102 and SR2-4-103] Senate
124 rules and practice.

125 (b) A senator who believes that a guest is intruding on desk space, is impeding staff
126 work, or is distracting from the work of the Senate may communicate the senator's
127 objection to the senator who has invited the guest, or through the majority leader, the
128 minority leader as defined in SR3-2-101, or the president of the Senate.

129 Section 5. **SR3-2-101** is amended to read:

130 **SR3-2-101 . Definitions.**

131 As used in this chapter:

132 (1) "Chair" means:

133 (a) the chair of a standing committee; or

134 (b) a standing committee member who is authorized to act as chair under SR3-2-202.

135 (2) "Committee" means a standing committee created under SR3-2-201.

136 (3) "Dispose of legislation" refers to a committee action that transfers ownership of

137 legislation to the Senate Rules Committee, to another standing committee, or to the

138 Senate floor.

139 (4) "Favorable recommendation" refers to a committee action that transfers ownership of

140 legislation to the Senate second reading calendar.

141 (5) "Legislation" means a Senate bill, House bill, Senate resolution, House resolution, joint

142 resolution, or concurrent resolution.

143 (6) "Majority vote" means a majority of a quorum as described in SR3-2-203.

144 (7) "Minority leader" means the highest ranking individual elected to lead the minority

145 party.

146 (8) "Minority party" means the political party in the Legislature with the second most

147 members.

148 [⑦] (9) "Original motion" means a non-privileged motion that is accepted by the chair

149 when no other motion is pending.

150 [⑧] (10) "Pending motion" refers to a motion starting when a chair accepts a motion and

151 ending when the motion is withdrawn or until the chair calls for a vote on the motion.

152 [⑨] (11)(a) "Privileged motion" means a procedural motion to adjourn, set a time to

153 adjourn, recess, end debate, extend debate, or limit debate.

154 (b) Privileged motions are not substitute motions.

155 [⑩] (12) "Substitute motion" means a non-privileged motion that is made when a

156 non-privileged motion is pending.

157 [⑪] (13) "Under consideration" means the time starting when a chair opens a discussion

158 on a subject or piece of legislation that is listed on a committee agenda and ending when

159 the committee disposes of the legislation, moves on to another item on the agenda, or

160 adjourns.

161 Section 6. **SR3-3-101** is amended to read:

162 **SR3-3-101 . Senate executive office confirmation committees.**

163 (1) The president[-shall]:

164 (a) shall:

165 (i) appoint one or more Senate executive office confirmation committees composed

166 of no more than seven senators, no more than five of whom are from the same

167 political party; and

(ii) designate one senator to act as chair of the committee; and

(b) may appoint as members of the confirmation committee the Senate appropriations subcommittee chair and the Senate standing committee chair having jurisdiction over the agency or entity to which the nominee is appointed[; and]

[(e) designate one senator to act as chair of the committee].

If called by the chair, [the] a Senate executive office confirmation committee shall, before any Senate [econfirmation] extraordinary session at which gubernatorial nominees are considered for confirmation:

(a) meet to review gubernatorial nominations to fill an executive branch position; and

(b) make a recommendation to the Senate to either confirm or not confirm the nominee.

(a) A majority of Senate executive office confirmation committee members constitutes a quorum.

(b) The action of a majority of a quorum constitutes action of the confirmation committee.

④] (4)(a) [The] A Senate executive office confirmation committee shall review the resume and qualifications of any full-time gubernatorial executive branch appointee and may interview appointees.

(b) If a meeting is held, the confirmation committee shall submit a committee report to the Senate in a form that identifies to the Senate the votes "for" and votes "against" confirmation.

④] (5) A [standing] Senate executive office confirmation committee may close a committee meeting only by following the procedures and requirements of Utah Code Title 52, Chapter 4, Open and Public Meetings Act.

Section 7. **SR4-2-102** is amended to read:

SR4-2-102 . Obtaining the floor.

When a senator wishes to be recognized to speak, the senator shall rise and address the presiding officer as:

(a) "Mr. (Madam) President"; or

(b) "Mr. (Madam) President pro [temp] tempore."

If two or more senators rise at the same time to speak, the presiding officer shall decide which senator is to speak first.

After being recognized, the senator shall confine the senator's remarks to the issue under consideration.

Section 8. **SR4-2-201** is amended to read:

SR4-2-201 . Point of order.

(1)(a) If a senator believes that there has been a breach of order, a breach of rules, or a breach of established parliamentary practice, the senator may rise and, without being recognized, state: "point of order."

(b) When a senator raises a point of order:

- (i) the presiding officer shall interrupt the proceedings;
- (ii) the senator who has the floor shall yield the floor; and
- (iii) the presiding officer shall ask the senator raising the point of order to "state your point."

(c) When the presiding officer responds "state your point," the senator shall briefly explain the alleged breach to the body, citing to appropriate authority if possible.

(2)(a) The presiding officer may speak to points of order [in preference to] before other senators rising for that purpose.

(b) The presiding officer may:

- (i) rule on the point of order immediately;
- (ii) consult with the secretary of the Senate, other staff, or another senator before ruling on the point of order; or
- (iii) defer the point of order until the presiding officer can research and rule on the point of order.

(c)(i) Although points of order are generally decided without debate, the presiding officer may submit the point of order to the Senate for decision in doubtful cases.

(ii) If submitted to the Senate for decision, a presiding officer shall allow debate or discussion on the point of order by recognizing members of the Senate who wish to speak to the point of order.

(iii) A decision by the Senate deciding a point of order is not subject to appeal.

(3) When the presiding officer rules on the point of order, any senator who disagrees with the presiding officer's decision may appeal that decision to the Senate by following the procedures and requirements of SR4-2-202.

Section 9. **SR4-3-102** is amended to read:

SR4-3-102 . Consideration of bills.

(1) Except for the 1st, 43rd, 44th, and 45th day of the annual general session, or any day during a special or an extraordinary session, legislation may not be read for the third time until at least the day after it is placed on the third reading calendar.

(2) Legislation on the third reading calendar shall be considered in the order that it appears

236 on the calendar unless a constitutional majority vote of the members of the Senate
237 directs other action.

238 Section 10. **SR4-4-101** is amended to read:

239 **SR4-4-101 . Standing committee reports.**

240 (1) As used in this rule, "favorable committee report" means a report produced by a Senate
241 standing committee for legislation that the committee voted to favorably recommend.

242 (2) The secretary of the Senate or the secretary's designee shall read each standing
243 committee report.

244 (3) If the Senate adopts a favorable committee report, the secretary of the Senate or the
245 secretary's designee shall:

246 (a) place the legislation, including any substitute or amendment recommended by the
247 standing committee, on the second reading calendar; or

248 (b) if the favorable committee report recommends that the legislation be placed on the
249 consent calendar:

250 (i) read the legislation for the second time; and

251 (ii) place the legislation on the consent calendar.

252 (4) If the Senate adopts a standing committee report that is not a favorable committee
253 report, the legislation is placed in accordance with the standing committee report's
254 recommendation.

255 (5) If the Senate fails to adopt a standing committee report, the legislation is returned to the
256 Senate Rules Committee.

257 Section 11. **SR4-4-401** is amended to read:

258 **SR4-4-401 . Consent calendar.**

259 (1) As used in this rule, "legislative day" means the same as that term is defined in
260 SR4-9-101.

261 (2) Subject to Subsection (3)(b), legislation shall remain on the consent calendar for two
262 legislative days after the day on which the legislation is placed on the consent calendar
263 under SR4-4-201.

264 (3)(a) Whenever the consent calendar contains legislation, the presiding officer shall
265 inform the Senate each day that:

266 (i) there are items on the consent calendar; and

267 (ii) if any senator objects to any legislation on the consent calendar, three or more
268 senators may move the legislation to the second reading calendar by notifying the
269 presiding officer verbally or in writing.

270 (b) If the presiding officer receives requests to move legislation from the consent
271 calendar to the second reading calendar from three or more senators, the secretary
272 shall:

273 (i) remove the legislation from the consent calendar; and
274 (ii) place the legislation at the bottom of the second reading calendar.

275 (4) If no more than two members have registered objections to the legislation during the
276 time period described in Subsection (2), the secretary of the Senate or the secretary's
277 designee shall read the legislation by title.

278 (5) When the secretary of the Senate or the secretary's designee has completed the third
279 reading of the legislation:

280 (a) the legislation is before the Senate; and

281 (b) subject to Subsection (6), the presiding officer shall:

282 (i) pose the final question: "This bill (resolution) has been read three times. The
283 question is, shall this bill (resolution) pass?"; and

284 (ii) place the question as a roll call vote.

285 (6) For legislation on the consent calendar, the presiding officer may not:

286 (a) accept a motion to amend or substitute the legislation; or

287 (b) allow for debate. [legislation shall be:]

288 [(a) read the third time;]

289 [(b) placed before the Senate; and]

290 [(c) considered for final passage.]

291 [(5)(a) The presiding officer shall pose the question on each consent calendar bill in the
292 following form:

293 "The presiding officer has determined that a quorum is present.

294 Those who favor the question say, 'aye.'

295 Does the chair hear a single dissenting nay to the question?"]

296 [(b) If the presiding officer hears no nays to the question a roll call vote shall be taken
297 immediately.]

298 [(6) Notwithstanding the requirements of Subsection (5), any senator may, before the roll
299 call vote is taken, make a motion to remove the bill from the consent calendar and place
300 it on the bottom of the third reading calendar.]

301 [(7) Nothing in this rule prevents a senator from challenging the ruling of the chair or
302 asking for a vote on any question.]

303 Section 12. **SR4-5-102** is amended to read:

304 **SR4-5-102 . Procedure in committee of the whole.**

305 (1) The presiding officer shall chair and preside over the committee of the whole.

306 (2) Senate Rules apply in the committee of the whole, except that:

307 [(a) a senator may not speak more than twice on the same subject;]

308 [(b)] (a) roll call votes are out of order during a committee of the whole; and

309 [(c)] (b) a senator may not appeal the decision of the chair.

310 Section 13. **SR5-1-101** is amended to read:

311 **SR5-1-101 . Definitions.**

312 As used in this [Senate Rule] title:

313 (1)(a) "Government official" means:

314 (i) an individual elected to a position in state or local government when acting within
315 the individual's official capacity; or

316 (ii) an individual appointed to or employed in a full-time or part-time position by
317 state or local government when acting within the scope of employment or within
318 the individual's official capacity.

319 (b) "Government official" does not mean a member of the legislative branch of state
320 government.

321 (2) "Lobbyist" has the meaning identified in Utah Code Section 36-11-102.

322 (3) "Minority leader" means the same as that term is defined in SR3-2-101.

323 (4) "Minority party" means the same as that term is defined in SR3-2-101.

324 [(3)] (5)(a) "Volunteer lobbyist" means a person not registered as a lobbyist who engages
325 in lobbying within the meaning of Utah Code Section 36-11-102.

326 (b) "Volunteer lobbyist" does not mean an individual who appears on the individual's
327 own behalf to engage in lobbying within the meaning of Utah Code Section
328 36-11-102.

329 Section 14. **Effective Date.**

330 This resolution takes effect upon a successful vote for final passage.
