What are the new federal laws on opioids and impacts to Utah?

Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act of 2016

- Task force to review, modify, and update best practices for pain management and prescription pain medication.
- Make grants to assist State and local governments in addressing the prevention and treatment of addiction to opioids.

Specifically, legislation would

- Expand availability of naloxone
- Improve prescription drug monitoring programs
- Shift resources towards identifying and treating incarcerated people who are suffering from addiction
- Prohibit applicant questions about possession or sale of illegal drug convictions on the FAFSA financial aid form
