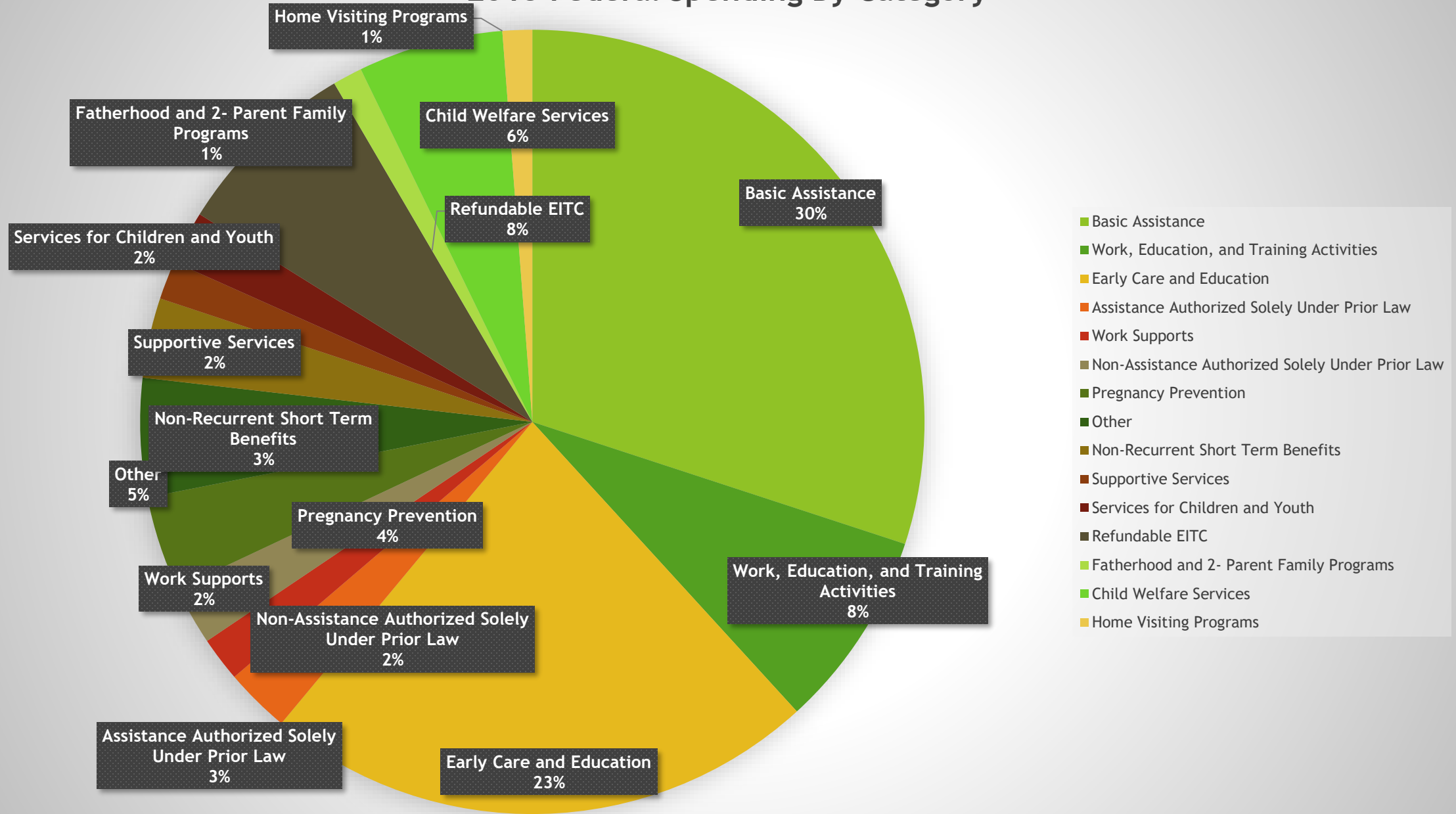
TANF History and Basics

- ▶ □ TANF established in 1996 as a block grant under President Clinton's Welfare to Work Reform
- ▶ □ Funds must be spent on these four purposes
 - ▶ 1. Provide assistance to needy families so that children can be cared for in their own homes
 - ▶ 2. Reduce dependency by promoting job preparation, work and marriage
 - ▶ 3. Prevent and reduce the incidence of out-of wedlock pregnancies
 - ▶ 4. Encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families

TANF Basics

- ▶ □ Can transfer up to 30% of block grant into child care and/or social services block grant (SSBG - up to 10%)
- ▶ □ Must maintain certain level of spending (MOE) at 80% of historic spending levels (75% if meet work rates)
- ▶ □ Established work requirements and time limits

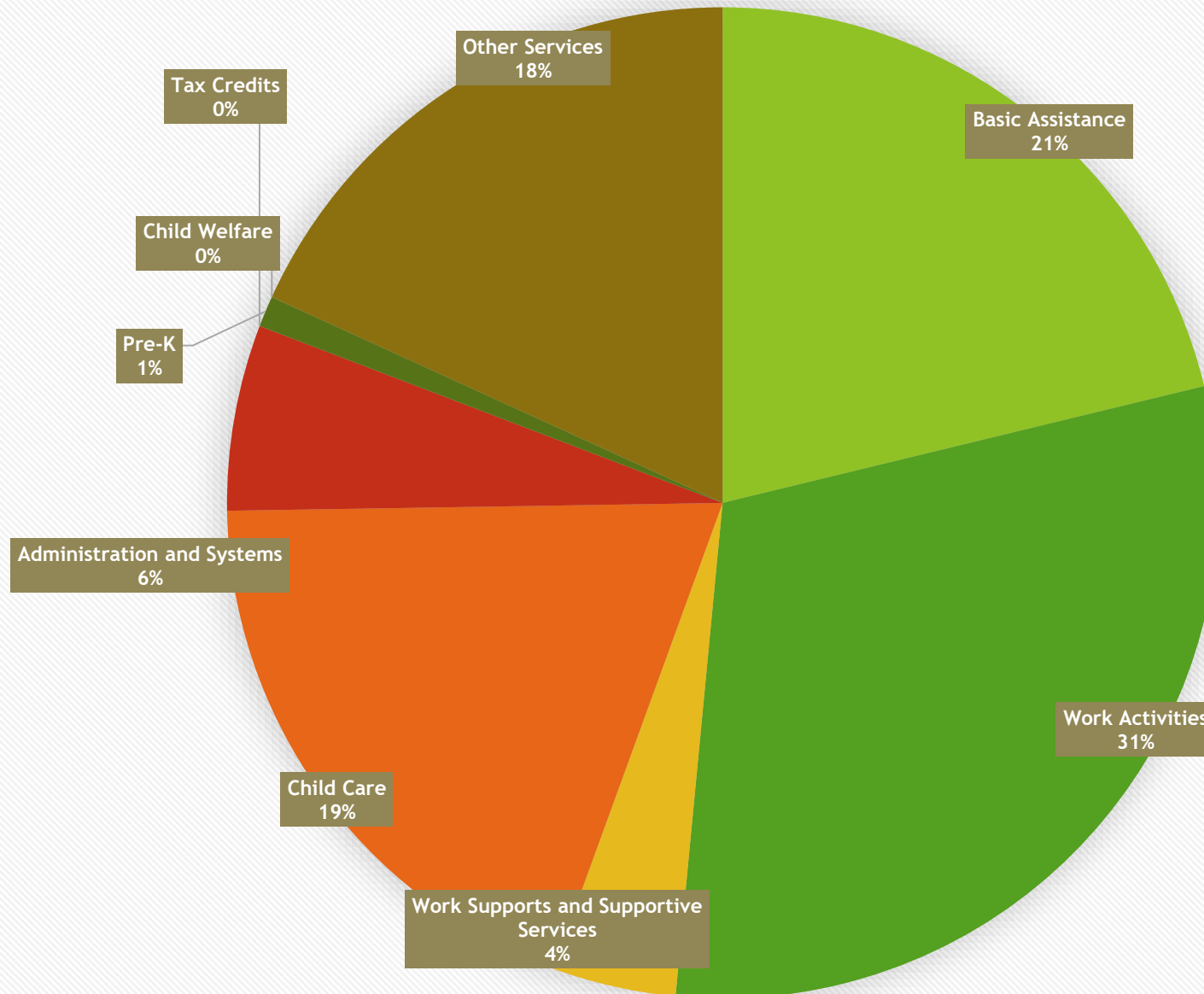
2015 Federal Spending By Category

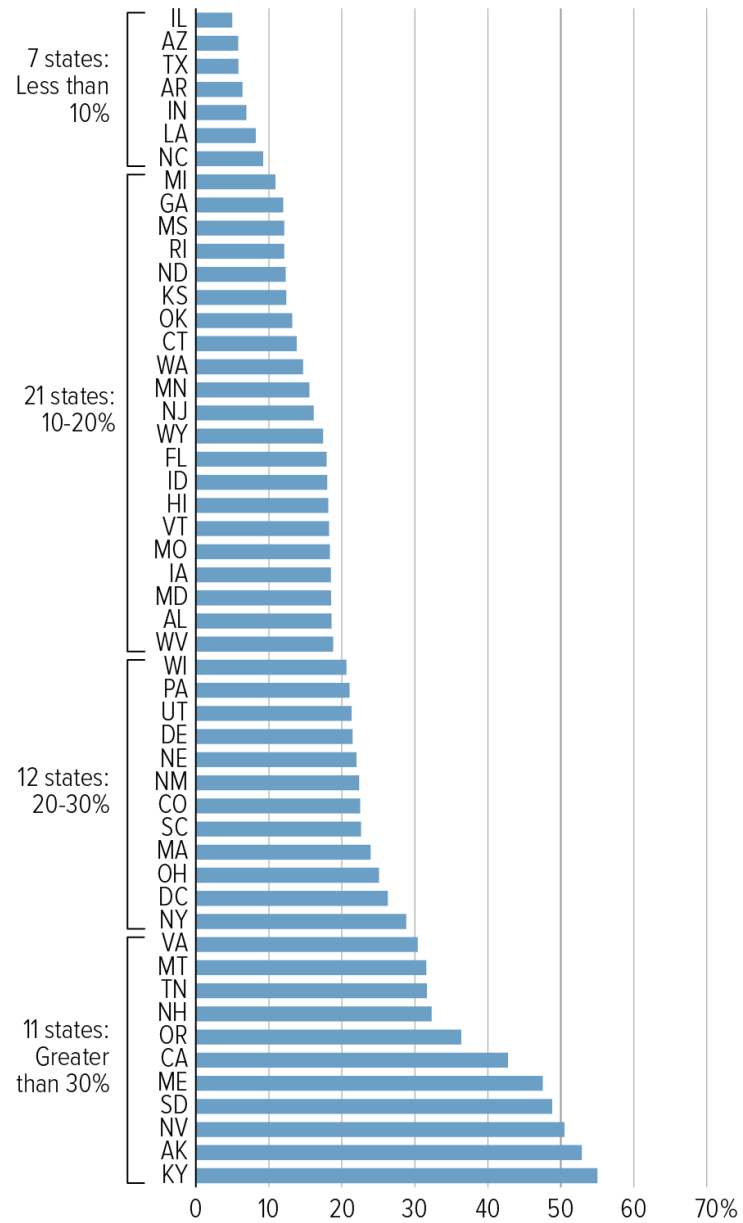
