

Individual Placement & Support/Supported Employment (IPS/SE)

- Evidence-based employment program
- October 1, 2014-March 31, 2018 846 served by Weber Human Services and Southwest Behavioral Health
- > 71% or 601 have a history of trauma
- ► Military Service 2% or 17 in the Armed Forces
- Family Member of Military 32% or 271
- Working FT or PT within first 6 months Increase 12% to 48%
- Now available at Weber Human Services, Davis Behavioral Health, Salt Lake County (Alliance House). Wasatch Mental Health, Southwest Behavioral Health
- Starting in Salt Lake County (Volunteers of America, First Step House) and San Juan Counseling



Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT)

- Evidence-based wrap-around treatment for individuals on civil commitment with a history of non-compliance with treatment
- October 1, 2016-March 31, 2018 108 served by Weber Human Services and Davis Behavioral Health
- ► History of trauma 62% or 67 individuals
- Military Service 2% or 2 individuals
- ► Family Member of Military 31% or 33 individuals
- ► AOT is available at Weber, Davis, Salt Lake County, Tooele
- All Local Authorities have some level of community supports/inhome supports





Homeless/Chronically Homeless Veterans



- In 2017, there were 2,807 homeless individuals (point-in-time count).
- 1,049 were homeless veterans
- 385 were chronically homeless veterans



Collaborative Agreement to Benefit Homeless Individuals

- Assertive community outreach teams (ACOT) provide wrap-around services to homeless veterans, chronically homeless veterans, and chronically homeless individuals with serious mental illness
- October 1, 2014-September 30, 2017 data available from 105 individuals served across the Wasatch Front
- ► History of Military Service 8.6% or 9 individuals
- ► Family Member of Military 13.3% or 14 individuals
- Data point Individuals who dropped out of treatment reported more trauma symptoms at baseline than individuals who did not drop out of treatment
- ACOT and intensive CM teams have been maintained across the Wasatch front (ORG)



Highest suicide rates

- After accounting for differences in age, the Veteran suicide rate in Utah was significantly higher than the national Veteran suicide rate (2015)

- Rural Four Corners Counseling, Northeastern Counseling, Central Utah Counseling

HealthyMindsUtah.Org

- Anonymous screening site includes the SPRINT-4 for PTSD
- ▶ 1,247 PTSD screens completed since October 2015
- ▶ 80% are 18-44 yoa, 26% male, 83% have no treatment history
- 44% have had suicidal ideation at least some of the time

If you're thinking about suicide or are worried about someone else, call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline 1-800-273-TALK (8255), dial 911 or go/take them immediately to the nearest hospital emergency room for an evaluation.

- > 76% said that they would seek help for their symptoms
- Referral at the end of the screen is to their Local Mental Health Authority
