Dose Form

A “medicinal dose form” is defined as:





Would Fail to Meet Definition of Useable Feed

Adding Industrial Hemp or CBD to commercial animal feed would render it “adulterated” and not useable, according to Utah Commercial Feed Act 4-12.





Subject to FDA Regulation

Adding Industrial Hemp or CBD to commercial animal feed would make the product subject to Federal Drug Administration regulation. Code of Federal Regulations, Title 21, Parts 225 and 226, Sections 225.1-225.115 and 226.1-226.115.





Edibles

UDAF has fielded numerous requests to offer edible forms of the medication for Industrial Hemp and Marijuana. But there are problems with the food safety definition, form of dose, and issues with portions.



Food Safety

Edibles would violate Wholesome Food Act (UCA 4-5-103) as defined by Food Additives (21 US Code 348).

An edible would be considered “adulterated” if it “bears or contains any food additive that is unsafe.”



Dose Form

Edible as a form of medication does not qualify. A “medicinal dose form” is defined as:





Portion Control

On the commercial market edibles come with significant amounts of THC because one unit often contains multiple servings.

The onset of psychoactive effects in edibles is dramatically slower than smoking marijuana – 30 to 60 minutes or longer. As such, inexperienced users can easily over-consume believing the edible is weak
