WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2013 General Session of the Sixtieth Legislature of the State of Utah, matters have arisen that require immediate legislative attention;

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into Special Session; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gary R. Herbert, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Utah, call the Sixtieth Legislature of the State of Utah into a Second Special Session at the Utah State Capitol, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 16th day of October 2013, at 2:30 p.m., solely for the following purposes:

1. to consider appropriating and/or authorizing the use of state funds to open and operate certain national parks, national monuments and/or national recreation areas;

2. to consider appropriating and/or authorizing the use of state funds to offset previously incurred obligations occasioned by delays in federal funding to the Child Nutrition Program;
3. To consider appropriating and/or authorizing the use of state funds to cover the benefits of certain furloughed employees which are unpaid because of a lapse in federal funds; and
4. for the Senate to consent to appointments made by the Governor.

WELCOMING REMARKS BY PRESIDENT NIEDERHAUSER

As we begin the legislative session, let us remind ourselves of the fundamentals of freedom. In the heat of the session when political pressure is weighing upon us, it is easy to forget these principles that formed the foundation of our nation and our state. Many of the problems facing us today are a result of failing to remember or ignoring these elements. There are voices, which are often convincing, that weaken the pillars of the past in favor of the new world that we face. “Old fashion” are the adherents of a time gone by. I am not suggesting an uncritical acceptance of the wisdom of the past. Each generation is obligated to evaluate and examine the fundamentals anew.

About 20 years ago, I was a young CPA experiencing significant success in real estate development. My business partners and I had entered into lucrative options on some prime property in Salt Lake County. Everything we touched seemed to turn to gold. At this time, I was reaping the fruit of hard work, critical analysis, managed risk and “luck”. Melissa and I were building a new home and everything seemed to be going our way. Then came the business opportunity of a lifetime. The returns were extraordinary and it required very little work. People we knew were making large returns. Never–mind the critical analysis and principles of sound investing. This was a new age with amazing opportunities. And, never–mind my conservative father who counseled me against such unbelievable outcomes. He had always been one to avoid as much risk as possible. Invest with an eye on the long–term was his motto. Why should I listen to him?

Well, we went ahead and invested a chunk of money. It sounded so good, almost too good, and so it was. My company lost a lot of money on one of the oldest games in the book, a ponzi scheme made to look like a sophisticated venture. I felt foolish. Me, a CPA with critical analysis skills sucked into what

should have been an obvious red flag. The investment defied every sound and proven investment principle.

A recurrence or a return to the mind of sound investment principles would have saved me and my business partners in a critical situation. Since that time, I have found it valuable to remember my experience and to be reminded of the elements of wise finance and to remember my father and his conservative ways, which by the way, resulted in his success without a high level of risk.

We will do well as a legislative body to do the same. Once again, I am not suggesting an uncritical acceptance of the wisdom of the past, but a recurrence and a reminder of valuable principles.

Please pass out the new senate coin to the members of the body along with the Virginia Declaration of Rights.

On the one side is the Senate Seal and on the other are some symbols of fundamental principles of government.

Around the edge of the coin are the words, "Frequent recurrence to fundamental principles is essential to the security of individual rights and.... free government", which is an abbreviation of:

Article I, Section 27 of the Utah Constitution. [Fundamental rights]Frequent recurrence to fundamental principles is essential to the security of individual rights and the perpetuity of free government."Recurrence is defined as: to return to the mind, to come up again for consideration as a question.

Here is some history:

The Virginia Declaration of Rights Virginia's Declaration of Rights was drawn upon by Thomas Jefferson for the opening paragraphs of the Declaration of Independence. It was widely copied by the other colonies and became the basis of the Bill of Rights. Written by George Mason, it was adopted by the Virginia Constitutional Convention on June 12, 1776.

See Section 15

That no free government, or the blessings of liberty, can be preserved to any people but by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality, and virtue and by frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

Here is some interesting debate from the Utah Constitutional Convention:

Mr. (W.G.) VAN HORNE. Mr. Chairman, I move to strike out section 29. (29 was the then existing number for the Fundamental Rights section)

Motion seconded.

Mr. (HEBER M.) WELLS. Mr. Chairman, the committee deem this to be a patriotic utterance, that frequent recurrence should be made to fundamental principles, because the tendency of the times might be as it has been in the past, not to recur very often to fundamental principles. When the people are oppressed and do not get their rights, it may be necessary to recur to fundamental principles. We thought it a patriotic utterance that did no harm in the declaration of rights, and as the gentleman says, we copied it from Washington.

Mr. (ORSON F.) WHITNEY. Mr. Chairman, I shall oppose the striking out of the section. This is not the first section in this document which declares a fundamental principle without guaranteeing it. We declare that all men have the inalienable right to enjoy and defend their lives and liberty. We suppose that the Legislature shall provide how they will be secured to them. The declaration of a general principle does not hurt anything. I think it ought to stand as it is.

Mr. (Franklin Snyder) RICHARDS. Mr. Chairman, I hope this motion will not prevail to strike this out. Of course this, like some other portions of this article, is simply a declaration of rights and the criticism that was made about not being enforceable or whether it is binding upon the officer or the citizen, or the application that should be made of it, I think ought not to weigh in determining this question. It seems to me that it is there as an admonition from the great sovereign power of this State to every officer and every citizen and every person within the State, that there shall be frequent recurrence to fundamental principles, and to say that it is not enforceable [*note*] in itself, is not an objection to the section, and I hope it will stand.

The motion to strike out was lost.

(March 26, 1895, page 362, Official Report of the Proceedings and Debate of the Convention Assembled at Salt Lake City on the Fourth Day of March 1895, to Adopt a Constitution for the State of Utah).

Thank Heaven that it remained!

Let's go over just a few of these fundamental principles. This is not an exhaustive list, but some highlights.

The Bill of Rights: A Transcription

The Preamble to The Bill of Rights

Congress of the United States begun and held at the City of New–York, on Wednesday the fourth of March, one thousand seven hundred and eighty nine.

THE Conventions of a number of the States, having at the time of their adopting the Constitution, expressed a desire, in order to prevent misconstruction or abuse of its powers, that further declaratory and restrictive clauses should be added: And as extending the ground of public confidence in the Government, will best ensure the beneficent ends of its institution.

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, two thirds of both Houses concurring, that the following Articles be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States, as amendments to the Constitution of the United States, all, or any of which Articles, when ratified by three fourths of the said Legislatures, to be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the said Constitution; viz.

ARTICLES in addition to, and Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress, and ratified by the Legislatures of the several States, pursuant to the fifth Article of the original Constitution.

Note: The following text is a transcription of the first ten amendments to the Constitution in their original form. These amendments were ratified December 15, 1791, and form what is known as the “Bill of Rights.”

Amendment I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment II

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

The Utah Constitution – Equally Important to Us

Preamble

Grateful to Almighty God for life and liberty, we, the people of Utah, in order to secure and perpetuate the principles of free government, do ordain and establish this CONSTITUTION.

Article I, Section 1. [Inherent and inalienable rights.] All men have the inherent and inalienable right to enjoy and defend their lives and liberties; to acquire, possess and protect property; to worship according to the dictates of their consciences; to assemble peaceably, protest against wrongs, and petition for redress of grievances; to communicate freely their thoughts and opinions, being responsible for the abuse of that right.

Article I, Section 2. [All political power inherent in the people.] All political power is inherent in the people; and all free governments are founded on their authority for their equal protection and benefit, and they have the right to alter or reform their government as the public welfare may require.

Thomas Jefferson

Notes on the State of Virginia, Query 14 – 1781

Category: History

History by apprising [citizens] of the past will enable them to judge of the future; it will avail them of the experience of other times and other nations; it will qualify them as judges of the actions and designs of men; it will enable them to know ambition under every disguise it may assume; and knowing it, to defeat its views.

Federal Framer #16

If a nation means its systems, religious or political, shall have duration, it ought to recognize the leading principles of them in the front page of every family book. What is the usefulness of a truth in theory, unless it exists constantly in the minds of the people, and has their assent (Federal Framer #16, Richard Henry Lee)

Declaration of Independence

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

The Declaration of Independence was a foundational document for the US Constitution, many Acts of Congress, State Constitutions and Supreme Court decisions through the many years of our countries existence.

As expressed in this great document, fundamental principles have their beginnings with the Laws of Nature and Nature's God. Therefore, a recurrence to fundamental principles is a recurrence to the Laws of Nature and Nature's God.

Letter to the Legislature of Massachusetts – 1794

Category: Laws of Nature

In the supposed state of nature, all men are equally bound by the laws of nature, or to speak more properly, the laws of the Creator.

Alexander Hamilton

To grant that there is a supreme intelligence who rules the world and has established laws to regulate the actions of his creatures; and still to assert that man, in a state of nature, may be considered as perfectly free from all restraints of law and government, appears to a common understanding altogether irreconcilable. Good and wise men, in all ages, have embraced a very dissimilar theory. They have supposed that the deity, from the relations we stand in to himself and to each other, has constituted an eternal and immutable law, which is indispensably obligatory upon all mankind, prior to any human institution whatever. This is what is called the law of nature....Upon this law depend the natural rights of mankind. (Alexander Hamilton, *The Farmer Refuted*, February 23, 1775).

It should be noted that during the 1895 Utah Constitutional Convention, the delegates also repeatedly discussed the natural rights described in the Declaration of Independence.

And so, we have engraved on the Senate Coin this year the words: "Frequent recurrence to fundamental principles is essential to the security of individual rights and free government."

This is my plea to Senate and the whole Legislature.

Lest we forget!

Lastly, I want to mention one other idea! This year during the session and interim, let's make a conscious effort to find ways to simplify and repeal outdated

and unenforceable statute. “Clean out the closet” so to speak. I believe that if we focus on this challenge, the code will be smaller after the 2015 Session and we will have done a great thing.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY

REMARKS BY CHIEF JUSTICE MATTHEW B. DURRANT

Thank you! Speaker Lockhart for the invitation to join you today to report on the state of Utah's judiciary.

I have with me today Associate Chief Justice Ronald Nehring, Justice Jill Parrish, and Justice Tom Lee. Justice Christine Durham regrets that she cannot be here. I count it a great privilege to serve with such extraordinary jurists. We are joined by our superb court administrator, Dan Becker.

I'd like to begin with a personal story. It concerns the 1984 NBA draft, possibly the greatest draft in NBA history. It included future all-time NBA greats Hakeem Olajuwon, Charles Barkely, and none other than Michael Jordan. And my brother-Devin Durrant. At that time, Dave Checketts was the president and general manager of the Utah Jazz, who had the number 16 pick. As it happened, Dave was a friend of mine from my days in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and he told me that the Jazz were very interested in Devin. And as draft day approached, it looked more and more like the Jazz would pick Devin.

My family and I were of course thrilled at the prospect that Devin would be playing in Utah. But the day before the draft, Dave called and told me that he had some bad news. Very apologetically, he said the Jazz had decided to go another direction. I was devastated and asked him who the Jazz's pick would be. He replied, "A guard out of Gonzaga named John Stockton." I was shocked. This

Stockton guy was a nobody. With great emotion, I made this solemn pronouncement: “Dave,” I said, “You’re making a huge mistake.” I tell this story so that you might know that you can have complete confidence in my judgement as Chief Justice . . . or at least perhaps some confidence as to non-basketball matters, such as the ones I’ll be discussing here today.

And the first matter I’d like to discuss is a number – 93. That’s the percentage of people who reported that they agreed with the following statement:

I am satisfied with my experience at court today.

That question was one of 20 included in a survey conducted of litigants, lawyers, witnesses, and others as they concluded their business in courthouses across the state last summer. The survey is administered every other year in an effort to provide feedback to the courts on how we are perceived by those we serve. Keep in mind that a court decision often results in both a winner and a loser, so for 93% of those respondents to say they were satisfied with their experience is remarkable. The most likely explanation for this number is that they must have based their responses on something other than whether they won or lost.

Their responses to other questions might help explain this high level of satisfaction:

I understood what happened in my case - 93%

I know what I should do next in my case - 93%

The judge, commissioner, referee, or mediator listened to all sides - 92%

I finished my business in a reasonable time - 89%

The hearing was fair - 90%

Both sides at the hearing were treated the same - 89%

And one question that I think is particularly important:

I was treated with courtesy and respect - 96%

When people truly believe that they have been treated with respect, they in turn respect the process, regardless of the result. This correlation is one that has been studied closely in the past few years. The term used to describe it is *procedural fairness*.

The elements of procedural fairness are voice, neutrality, and respect. Voice means the ability of court participants to express their viewpoints. In others words, the judge asks for input and actively listens. Neutrality means just that - consistently applied legal principles, unbiased decision makers, and a “transparency” in how decisions are made. Lastly, respect, meaning individuals are treated with dignity and their rights are affirmatively protected. It means that

judges not only protect the rights of litigants, but explain that is what they are doing. It makes a difference.

When there is procedural fairness, people believe they have an opportunity to speak and are listened to (their voice is heard), they feel they are treated with respect, and they understand what is happening, and why. The judge focuses on them individually, rather than on getting through the court calendar. With heavy dockets, this is no small accomplishment. But we have taken the research in this area to heart. We have educated our judges and helped them hone these skills.

93%. That is a number of which I am extremely proud. It's a number that our judges and staff are proud of, and it's one you should be proud of as well.

Of course, I'm not so naïve as to think that everyone who comes to court feels this way. Indeed, the numbers that I have just shared are state-wide figures. When you examine the results courthouse to courthouse, there are various issues in particular locations that we need to address. But that's why we conduct this survey, to check-in with our court users to see what they see and to hear what they hear, so that we can identify the weak points we need to shore up.

My guess is that from time to time, you hear from constituents who have an unfavorable opinion of their court experience. 93% is not 100% and I would be surprised if you haven't had some who have sought you out to complain about a decision, a procedure, or a rule. That's the nature of the legislative process. But their perspectives are not representative of the experience of the vast majority of court participants.

To provide some context for the concerns you might hear, last year our courts, at all levels, handled just under 900,000 cases. Think about the types of issues you've directed our courts to handle, the issues our judges and staff are called upon to deal with in these 900,000 cases. They involve commerce, property, families, crime, juveniles, highway safety, drugs, mental health, homelessness; you name it. Our society's most complex, emotional, and difficult problems and disputes make their way to our courts, and our job is to provide a just and fair resolution.

Among the most emotional cases are divorces, where years of emotional and financial entanglements have to be unraveled, and the expenses of one household have to be spread across two. If children are involved, judges have to decide how to keep them a part of both parents' lives for years to come. And parents are rarely on their best behavior during a divorce.

Child welfare matters are, unfortunately, brought to us far too often. Our judges are asked to find the truth when there are allegations of child abuse, and when abuse is found, we face the enormously difficult task of balancing the future

safety of vulnerable children with their parents' fundamental right to continue to parent them. These decisions have to be made expeditiously, so that children don't languish in foster care, but also judiciously, because a wrong decision can result in harm to or even the death of a child.

Our most serious crimes require a careful judicial balance as well, where the constitutional rights of defendants, presumed innocent, come up against the rights of victims, and society's collective interest in safety. Sometimes these cases also require the most serious decision one human being can make about another, the decision to order that a person be put to death.

Civil cases don't reach us unless other ways of resolving disputes have failed. Property disputes fill our dockets. Decisions about our natural resources, energy, air quality, scams that target our elderly, and, yes, ethics and elections issues are all brought to us for fair resolution. We do not go looking for any of these issues. Each is brought to us, and our role is defined by our constitutions and laws.

This business of resolving disputes isn't easy work, but it's important work—important to the individuals involved, important to our community, and important to our society. I assure you, we take our work, our oaths, seriously, and I believe we do our work in a way in which the public should, and does, have confidence.

One measure of public opinion is reflected in the courthouse survey results I shared a few moments ago, and those results are consistent with the strong public confidence in our courts found by the broader independent public opinion poll I shared with you last year. In short, when we have asked our constituents how we are doing, they have said "very well, thank you." My view is that they have confidence in our branch of government because in recent years we have strived to be responsive and have adhered to certain core principles, three of which I would like to explain further: accessibility, efficiency, and transparency.

Accessibility

This is where our greatest challenges lie: increasing numbers of Utahns can't afford the cost of legal assistance; increasing numbers of litigants choose to represent themselves; increasing minority populations are coming to our courts, some of whom distrust our governmental institutions, others who don't speak English well enough to understand what is happening in a court proceeding; and, for all of our court users, the cost in time and travel to conduct business at a courthouse can be significant.

This is also where we are seeing tremendous progress, although the amount of work that remains is daunting. Last year I reported to you on the nascent success of

our statewide implementation of the courts' Self-Help Center. This center is our phone, email, and text-based resource of procedural help for any who contact us. Our staff of specially trained lawyers helped 16,000 people last year. They helped with everything from directions to courthouses to information about how to obtain a domestic violence protective order.

The Self-Help Center staff also frequently direct callers to resources on our website. We have developed increasingly comprehensive and sophisticated forms, both static and interactive, that allow litigants to represent themselves more competently. As an example, our online guardianship and conservatorship resources are very specific. Our guardianship self-help resources include everything from a manual on the responsibilities of guardians to a true-false test for prospective guardians to take so that they may demonstrate their understanding of their statutory responsibilities.

Our Online Court Assistance Program, or OCAP, has been retooled to be even more user-friendly, and now is available to prepare fully fileable documents for divorces, parentage cases, enforcement of domestic orders, garnishment, landlord-tenant cases, guardianships and conservatorships, protective orders, and stalking orders. Last year over 60,000 documents were generated using this tool.

There are, of course, situations when self-help resources aren't enough, when only a lawyer will do, and the State Bar has stepped up with two important programs. The first is the Pro Bono program, in which lawyers accept cases without any compensation, and the second is the recently developed Modest Means program, in which litigants pay on a sliding fee schedule, based on their ability to pay. Both of these efforts require willing lawyers, as well as coordination to get the willing lawyers together with clients in need. The Bar is providing both, and they deserve our thanks for making legal representation more accessible.

Utah's increasing ethnic diversity also presents access challenges. All court users have a right to understand their court proceedings, and to that end we provided translators for 47 languages in our courts last year, and they provided almost 20,000 hours of translation. The logistics of this coordination of translators, litigants, facilities, judges, and lawyers is the responsibility of our court staff, and they too have done a remarkable job. We have even adopted technology that allows us to use interpreters in Salt Lake to interpret real-time court sessions in the Uintah Basin, for example, saving taxpayers money and litigants time.

The Judicial Council is also currently studying how best to reduce the time and cost associated with attending some types of proceedings in rural parts of our state. For example, it's now technologically possible for a judge located in Logan

to conduct a hearing involving people who are in a courtroom in Kanab, providing convenience for the parties and their counsel, while making better use of the judge's time and substantially reducing travel cost for the litigants and their lawyers. Our committee is sorting out what types of cases lend themselves to these types of remote hearings and what rules or procedures need to be tweaked to facilitate this kind of accessibility. The challenge is to find opportunities for efficiency, without sacrificing the local character and autonomy of our rural communities. We should have more to report to you in this regard next year.

With each of these initiatives, our objective is to not only operate more efficiently, but to actually improve access by reducing costs and improving convenience for those in our state who need the service of their courts. In other words, accessibility.

Efficiency

Our courts are leading the way in efficiency. We've been informed by the National Center for State Courts, the sister organization to your National Conference of State Legislatures, that Utah's state courts have the most comprehensive and advanced electronic court record system in the country. No other state has the same statewide implementation of e-filing, e-payments, and e-warrants, combined with real-time, on-line access to not just dockets, but documents and data. The public is well served by the innovations we have promoted and you have supported.

The remarkable progress we have made in implementing the electronic record has also had its intended effect on the nature and quantity of work we ask our court clerks to do. Their jobs have become more about data quality than data entry. And because the data quality work is electronic, their efficiency is higher, and now fewer people can process more casework. This has allowed us to reduce our court clerk workforce by 8% over these last two years of electronic record implementation, which of course reduces our personnel costs. This is in large measure why our budget requests last year and this year have been so limited.

These efficiencies affect not only our staff and your budgeting, but the public as well. Case documents are available on-line, which allows for fewer trips to the courthouse for lawyers, the general public, and yes, the media. Anyone with access to a computer can, without venturing to a courthouse, check for scheduled hearings, make a payment, or review a document. The electronic record allows us to move work to where staff is available, or a court hearing to where a judge is available, and the benefits are substantial.

Moving to an electronic record also means we have lower costs for postage, paper, file folders, and storage equipment. Five years ago we spent \$150,000 on

file folders alone. This year, \$0. Also, our paper costs have been reduced by \$210,000. And with no paper files, another substantial benefit is becoming increasingly apparent - freed up space, previously devoted to records storage.

A very concrete example of this is our experience just this winter in Summit County. Increases in caseloads in this county have required that we begin the process of adding a courtroom to our existing Summit County facility. Normally, we would have come to you for assistance in building and funding a new courtroom. But as we walked through the existing building, it became apparent that there was space that was becoming available - our file storage rooms. Moving to an electronic record has made available sufficient space to allow us to do a much simpler remodel and add a much needed courtroom within the walls of the existing courthouse.

The ability to recover space within other existing courthouses and put that space to new uses should prove to be a money saver in other parts of the state as well, adding to the list of efficiencies gained by our e-everything approach.

Transparency

I believe our court system is as transparent, if not more so, than any other part of government. When I say this it sounds boastful, and maybe it is, but let me explain: We have extensive, relevant performance measures, not just at the state level, but right down to the individual courthouse, and this data is available to the public on our website. Public opinion polls and court user surveys have become a part of our routine process of self-evaluation, and a part of what we report to you and to our communities. Published time standards provide guidance for our courts and delimit expectations for the public.

Further, the business of the court is done in open courtrooms, where the public is encouraged to attend. Since April 1st of last year, the media has been permitted to use video cameras in court to cover proceedings. Since that date, trials and hearings in over 100 cases in the district, juvenile, and justice courts have been videotaped by the media. And, in one instance, an entire two week trial was beamed across the world via a real-time broadcast. It is our hope that by allowing cameras into the courtroom we will bring the work of our courts closer to the public and that the trust and confidence of the public in the fairness and effectiveness of Utah's courts will continue to increase.

In one of the most visible ways in which our courts are transparent, each individual judge has his or her performance as a judge assessed by an independent body, the Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission. The extensive work of that commission is then published and promoted to the public for their use in

individual retention elections. This, to my knowledge, is the most formal, involved, detailed, and transparent evaluation procedure of any public servant, at any level of government.

Now, if I may address one last issue. Our Judicial Council has repeatedly proven its ability to wrestle difficult issues to the ground and advance meaningful change and, on any number of occasions, has brought to this body well thought out recommendations for you to consider. If you have issues or ideas relating to our courts, bring them to the Judicial Council. Work with us on identifying what further improvements are possible.

We are proud of the success of our new business model and of our ability to use existing resources to provide increased access, efficiency, and transparency in everything we do. We are also proud that we have not asked and are not asking you to restore funding cuts of the past few years. But most of all, we are proud of our extraordinary judges and staff.

Are there things that we could further improve upon? Of course. What part of government couldn't be improved upon? But even John Stockton didn't shoot 93% from the free throw line. And that was with nobody guarding him. I'm confident my brother Devin would have done better. But it's probably time I get past that.

So the final numbers read:

John Stockton-83%

Utah Courts-93%

As always, thank you for your gracious attention, thank you for the work you do on behalf of all Utahns, and I wish you a productive session.

President Wayne Niederhauser called the Joint Convention to order at 6:15 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized Rebecca Lockhart, Speaker of the House.

President Niederhauser announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Niederhauser appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Ralph Okerlund, Stuart Adams and Karen Mayne, and Representatives Brad Dee, Greg Hughes, and Jennifer Seelig to notify Governor Gary R. Herbert that the 2014 General Session of the Sixtieth Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear his State-of-the-State address.

President Niederhauser acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Ralph Okerlund made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Herbert’s State-of-the-State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Herbert to the House rostrum.

**STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS
BY GOVERNOR GARY R. HERBERT**

President Niederhauser, Speaker Lockhart, Legislators, Justices of the Utah Supreme Court, Utah’s First Lady, my wife Jeanette, and my fellow Utahns.

We are joined this evening by our new Lieutenant Governor, Spencer Cox, and our new Attorney General, Sean Reyes. Let me take time to recognize the Lieutenant Governor's Office, as well as the Legislature, for their recent investigations of campaign and election law violations.

We must continue to require ongoing review of our election laws to ensure strict compliance. Upholding the public trust in elected office starts with demonstrating our election laws must be adhered to and when they are not, there will be serious consequences.

To everyone assembled here tonight, welcome to our State Capitol. This building symbolizes the pride we have in our past and the optimism we share for Utah's future.

In 1914, when Governor William Spry cemented the cornerstone in place, some wondered why the Capitol needed to be so large when Utah's population was so small. The answer is simple. They were not building for what they were. They were building for what Utah could become.

Just as they laid a solid foundation to make Utah what it is today, it is our responsibility to continue to build upon that foundation and make Utah even stronger.

We are already seeing significant success in that endeavor.

Two years ago, we set the goal to create 100,000 jobs in 1,000 days. I am pleased to report we are on track.

So far, nearly 70,000 jobs have been created in the private sector and our unemployment rate just dropped to 4.1 percent, the fourth-lowest in the nation.

Our economy is not only growing, it is growing the right way. Utah now has the fourth-most diverse economy in the nation. Our economic growth is remarkable and as someone who spends every day focused on growing Utah's economy, I assure you this did not happen by chance.

We measure our performance in statistics, but the true impact of those numbers is felt in homes across our state.

Utah's strong economy means if your son wants to work for Goldman Sachs, he doesn't have to go to New York City; he can stay here in Salt Lake City. If your daughter wants to work for Adobe or eBay, she doesn't have to go to Silicon Valley; she can go to the Silicon Slopes of Lehi and Draper. And if you want to work in cutting-edge manufacturing, you don't have to go to Washington State; you can go to Washington County.

Utah is the place to be and we have worked hard together to make it that way.

It is not only important to bring more dollars into the state, we also need to become more efficient with the dollars we have. So last year, I challenged state employees and agencies to improve their performance by 25 percent over the next four years. And the results are impressive.

Let me give you just one example of many.

The Utah Department of Commerce has implemented strategies to accelerate the speed of issuing business licenses. Over the past year, the department has issued more than 200,000 licenses all within three days of receiving applications. This means people wanting to do business in Utah can get to work without unnecessary delay.

Across state government we are determined to get more from every taxpayer dollar so we don't need more dollars from every taxpayer.

But we are not here tonight to just talk about our many successes. We have some challenges we must confront as we build upon our foundation for future generations. Tonight, I want to highlight three of them.

The first challenge we face is population growth. Utah is now the second-fastest growing state in the nation. We now number over 2.9 million people, and our population is projected to nearly double in the next 35 years. This population growth impacts everything we do.

Take education, for example.

We have a fast-growing student population, which creates a major funding demand. It costs us nearly \$70 million per year in additional money just to pay for our new students. We have a unique challenge in Utah to fund education. For example, nearly 70 percent of Utah's land is controlled by the federal government, generating no property taxes to help us pay for that growth.

Because our ability to get all the dollars we need is limited, we need to be more innovative with the dollars we have to achieve our educational goals.

This session, Senator Stuart Adams will champion legislation to create a "report card" that will help parents, teachers and administrators understand what our schools are doing right and how they can improve. Along with enhancing accountability in our education system, we must continue to align classroom instruction with changing workforce needs, so our high school graduates are ready for college and the workplace.

Science, technology, engineering and math are essential to prepare our students for high-tech, high-quality and high-paying jobs. Last year we provided \$10 million to the STEM Action Center, and my budget this year calls for another \$4.5 million. I have also asked Senator Steve Urquhart and Representative Brian King to find ways to encourage more high school students to complete computer science and information technology classes. The private sector is also stepping up. Tomorrow, we will announce a major new campaign, funded by the business community, to promote STEM education in our schools.

As we all know, today's students have access to a world of information at their fingertips; we need to ensure they also have access to the information that will put them on the path to success. That is why I have proposed another \$2 million in my budget to improve high school career counseling.

Of course, teachers have the critical role of educating our children in the classroom. While we cannot thank them enough, we can and should pay them more. Because of our success in growing the economy in challenging times, my budget contains an additional \$61.6 million to increase teacher compensation, the largest increase since 2008.

All these efforts drive us toward our goal that 66 percent of adult Utahns will have a degree or post-secondary certificate by 2020, thus securing the foundation for enduring prosperity.

Often, asking the right question is as important as having the right information. A case in point is Angie Blomquist and her fourth-grade class from Monroe Elementary in Sevier County, some of whom are with us tonight.

A few months ago, these fourth-graders asked a question many of us have wondered about for years: "Why is our Utah state tree the Colorado Blue Spruce?" Their persuasive argument has convinced me that with regard to the state tree, it is time to branch out and turn over a new leaf. They have also persuaded Senator Ralph Okerlund and Representative Brad Wilson to introduce legislation to make Utah's new state tree the Aspen. These fourth-graders exemplify the importance of participation in the political process and the ability we all have in this state to effect change.

Dealing with population growth will certainly require our best efforts.

We must think strategically, look forward, but act now. The "Your Utah, Your Future" initiative I launched in October is the most comprehensive planning effort ever undertaken in our state's history. This effort, among other things, is aimed at ensuring there is sufficient water and clean air for future generations.

When our pioneer ancestors made the desert blossom as a rose, they understood they could not do it without water. What was true then is also true for us today. To take care of this most precious resource, I have put together a Water Advisory Team to evaluate strategies to secure Utah's water future.

Another growth-related challenge that is fundamental to our quality of life is the quality of our air. It is a challenge we all share, and we all share in the responsibility to fix it.

We have already implemented a plan to rid our air of 100 tons of pollutants a day, and we now require industries to install new technology to eliminate an additional 4,600 tons of pollution per year. I have further required state agencies to reduce travel, to restructure our entire fleet, prohibit idling in state vehicles, and we have provided transit passes to state employees at no extra cost to taxpayers.

I recently organized the Clean Air Action Team, made up of stakeholders from across the spectrum, to act as a clearinghouse for the best public input and strongest science to make recommendations and help guide our policy decisions. Taking seriously the word "action" in their title, team members have already identified two significant steps that will make a big difference, and we will begin implementing those recommendations tonight.

First, we will accelerate the transition to cleaner Tier 3 gasoline and the next generation of lower-emission vehicles. Because nearly 60 percent of our pollution during inversions comes from tailpipes, and the technology already exists to do something about it, there is absolutely no reason to wait. By taking initiative, we ensure these cleaner gasolines and lower-emission vehicles, which burn 80 percent cleaner than current models, are made available in Utah as soon as possible.

Second, University of Utah research has shown wood smoke alone makes up approximately 5 percent of the particulates in our winter air and endangers public health. We have learned that burning one log for an hour is equivalent to driving an automobile from Salt Lake City to St. George and back again. So tonight, I call on the Air Quality Board to limit wood burning in non-attainment areas during our entire inversion season.

These two steps are among the most significant and effective we can take immediately to clean our air. But there is more we can do. During this session, let us start to replace older school buses and state vehicles with lower-emission models. These actions, and others, will have real costs and real impacts on all of us. But I'm convinced the benefits to our economy, to our communities and, most importantly, to our public health, will justify the costs.

Addressing population growth also involves improving our criminal justice system and providing structure for individuals to become productive members of society. There has been a great deal of discussion about relocating the state prison. This is a discussion worth having, but it must be done in the larger context of reforming our criminal justice system as a whole.

I have asked for a full review of our current system to develop a plan to reduce recidivism, maximize offenders' success in becoming law-abiding citizens, and provide judges with the tools they need to accomplish these goals. The prison gates through which people re-enter society must be a permanent exit, and not just a revolving door.

Our second challenge is asserting our rightful role as a sovereign state.

James Madison, the father of our Constitution, said: "The powers delegated by the proposed Constitution to the federal government are few and defined. Those which are to remain in the state governments are numerous and indefinite."

Unfortunately, our nation has strayed from what our founding fathers intended. Whether the issue is marriage, Medicaid or management of our public lands, our right to find Utah solutions to Utah issues is being hindered by federal overreach.

In Utah, we understand state sovereignty, and we will do everything in our power to represent the will of the people while respecting the democratic and judicial processes. Let me be clear that while I support traditional marriage and will continue to defend Amendment 3, there is no place in our society for hatred and bigotry.

Most importantly, let us all remember that although these issues may be controversial, they need not be contentious. As this important issue works its way through the courts, let Utah be a model of how to work through honest disagreements with civility and respect.

This challenge of self-determination also extends to how we address the health care needs of families and individuals in our state. Because of a flaw in the Affordable Care Act, we have about 60,000 Utahns living below the poverty line who receive less assistance through Medicaid than many who live above the poverty line.

This is not fair, and it is not right.

Assisting the poor in our state is a moral obligation that must be addressed. I look forward to working with you in the Legislature to create a Utah model for

fixing this hole in the safety net one that is based on four principles: first, those who can work, do work; second, support private markets; third, maximize state flexibility in administering federal programs; and fourth, serve the best interest of the Utah taxpayer.

This debate should not be about federal dollars versus state dollars. They are all taxpayer dollars. Every dollar the government spends comes from the people, and whatever we do in Utah should be in the best interests of the people of Utah.

We did not create the problem, but we can and must find a Utah solution.

By the way, caring for those in need is not just a function of government. Everyone has a role. No one personifies this more than Jon Huntsman, Sr. The Huntsman Cancer Institute has saved lives and made Utah a center of excellence for cancer research. Let us work together this session and make expanding this facility a top priority.

More effective management of our public lands is also critical to our state. At no time was this more evident than during the federal government shutdown. Our national parks were closed, tourists were turned away and the livelihoods of Utah business owners were put in peril. Yet we were told by many in Washington there was nothing we could do to solve this problem.

We do a lot of things well in Utah, but “doing nothing” is not one of them. I was determined to open the parks, and I told Interior Secretary Sally Jewel we simply had to find a way and that’s exactly what we did. It took a little common sense and a lot of hard work. It took people of good will, including Representative Brad Dee, and legislators on both sides of the aisle working together to find the solution.

As our parks re–opened, cheers resounded throughout the state and frankly, from across the nation and around the globe. The Fasoli family of Massachusetts was able to fulfill their dream to visit Zion National Park. My chief of staff, Derek Miller, en route with his family to Natural Bridges, joined other Utahns in breathing a sigh of relief knowing they would not be denied access to our national parks and recreation areas. There were cheers at Ruby’s Inn, where the Syrett family has welcomed visitors to Bryce Canyon for five generations.

As the opening of our national parks proved, Utah is in the best position to optimize the use of our public lands. That is why I signed House Bill 148 and also why I am working with Congressman Rob Bishop on his Public Lands Initiative. This initiative presents us with a unique opportunity to resolve this issue by identifying public lands for multiple–use such as energy development, farming

and ranching, and protecting our iconic vistas and venues. Again, we are finding Utah solutions to Utah challenges.

Our third major challenge is to continue to expand our economy.

Utah is doing very well, but the demand for more and higher-quality jobs continues. I have set the goal to increase our exports by an additional \$9 billion by the end of 2015. We will accomplish this goal with continued outreach to big businesses as well as smaller start-ups businesses along the Wasatch Front as well as those in rural Utah.

Take, for example, Phillip and Holly Clingo. They needed employment if they were to fulfill their dream of raising their family in Wayne County. So they founded Signature Log Furniture and they are now selling custom-made products across North America from our soon-to-be state tree, the Utah Aspen.

You know, there is a reason why the Clingos and thousands of other small-business owners choose Utah. There is a reason why the most requested transfer destination for Oracle employees is Utah. And there is a reason why Boeing calls its Utah workers the “Can Do Team.”

The reason is not because we don’t have challenges; the reason is because we know how to overcome them.

So yes, we face the challenge of a growing student population. But we are solving it, and as we do, we will secure the youngest and best-educated workforce in the nation. And yes, we face the challenge of protecting our water supply and cleaning our air. But we are solving it, and as we do, Utah will continue to provide “Life Elevated” for our children and our grandchildren.

And yes, we face the challenge of federal overreach. But we will preserve our right to chart our own path forward to a better future. And yes, we face the challenge of accelerating our economic development efforts. But as we overcome that challenge, we will become the nexus for new ideas, and new businesses and new jobs.

I have no doubt we will overcome our challenges. We are blessed with a solid foundation. We have a proud heritage. We have a shared vision of where we are going and what we must do to get there. Tonight, I ask you to join with me in building upon the foundation laid by those who came before us a century ago.

As elected officials, we are entrusted by the people to manage the affairs of the state, and to provide vision and leadership. Let us set aside any personal agenda and work to benefit the Utahns we serve.

Let us renew our commitment to the principles of good governance, of fiscal prudence and of individual responsibility to continue to make Utah the best place to live, the best place to raise a family and the best place to do business.

The state of our state is strong.

And you and I remain committed to making it even stronger.

May God bless you, May God bless this great nation, and may God continue to bless the Great State of Utah.

REMARKS BY CONGRESSMAN JIM MATHESON

Thank you, gosh, I didn't know that my mother was going to be here – now the pressure's on. Thank you, thanks for giving me a little of your time. I know you've got a number of folks from the Federal delegation rolling through here and I'm not sure you want to hear all of us speak, but you get to anyway, so there you go. After all, isn't that the way we should all serve as elected officials, with the commitment to leave our state and nation better than the way we found it? I've always believed that to accomplish this, it takes foresight, patience, and wisdom. It requires us to look ahead and set worthy goals and not get caught up in the emotions of the moment. It requires us to bring others together, to look for common ground, and know that our system of government rewards those who work together, not those who seek to exclude opposing points of view. For me, the wisdom of placing priority on working together toward the common good is something that I hope will take hold broadly, more so in the coming years than it has in the past few.

We all know how poorly politicians are perceived these days. And the approval ratings of elected officials, as a group, are at all-time lows. I believe the public is fed up. They're fed up with the polarized partisan bickering that seems to dominate our politics today because when you have polarization, it gives you gridlock. Regular folks, the ones who elect us, would rather see elected officials getting something done. That's why voters are parting ways with both political parties and giving low marks to the most partisan federal legislative branch in our country's history. The reality is, more people in America today now identify as Independent instead of Democrat or Republican than at any time since the Gallop organization began polling in this country. And yet, most elected officials, in both parties, are going the opposite direction.

We're not supposed to be a parliamentary system of government for office holders simply voting the party line. We're supposed to be a representative form of

government. And I believe the future of this country depends on changing this trend of polarization. I'm not here today to extol my own virtues, but I think I know a thing or two about the direction politics should be going in our state and in our country. And if my own approval rating is a good measure, a solid majority of Utahans agree with me. Throughout my career, my approach has been to bring people together to solve problems and achieve progress. This frame of mind is the way we move forward and overcome the all or none mentality that plagues modern politics. To limit consideration of today's issues to a simplistic paradigm where the positions of the two parties are the only points of view on the table is absurd. The issues that face today's leaders aren't simple and it's a disservice when they are distilled into a sound bite or a bumper sticker.

During the time I have been fortunate enough to be a representative of this state, I've tried to tackle this problem head on and serve in a way that acknowledges the complexities we face as a country and to seek constructive solutions. I appreciate that there aren't just two points of view on any given issue. There can be dozens and I've been willing to listen to each one and consider their merits. I truly believe that good ideas can come from either political party or from people who don't care a thing about politics. And being a leader means placing the highest value on making these good ideas a reality. Now I don't believe in playing political games. The way to move forward is to extend a hand, not to draw a line in the sand. I think I've been pretty successful. I've partnered with local officials to plan for future growth to the I-15 corridor and channeled federal resources to help build airports, roads, and public spaces for our growing communities. I've advocated for Downwinders to receive compensation for their sacrifices and fought to make sure that nuclear weapons and nuclear waste never threaten the safety of Utah families again. I've insisted that the Federal government clean up the messes it has made in places like Moab and brought together wide ranging interests to preserve the pristine beauty of our state for future generations. I spent hours listening to the needs of a large group of diverse stake holders and worked across the aisle and across the United States Capitol building to pass the first major Utah Public Lands bill in almost 30 years. I've championed policies, programs, and legislation that make our economy stronger and make it easier to do business. And I've worked every day to address the needs of the men and women who place their trust in my stewardship to solve their problems and make government work better for them.

As I conclude this phase of my service this year, I hope all elected officials will embrace the wisdom and have the fortitude to come together to get things done. Quite frankly, representative government only functions when we do just that. The reality is, each of us in this building have some belief in the intrinsic value of this type of governing or we wouldn't have sought elected office. I hope

you remember and share worthy parts of government that motivated us and inspired us to service. And as a representative of this state, I hope we collectively take up the mantel of leading in the way that shows what can be done rather than what can't. Our constituents deserve nothing less. Thank you.

(2) If any payment on a contract with a private person, firm, or corporation to construct waterworks, sewer collection, sewer treatment systems, gas works, electric works, telecommunications lines, cable television lines, or public transportation systems is retained or withheld, it shall be retained or withheld and released as provided in Section 13-8-5.

(3) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (3)(b), (5), or (9), a municipality may not sell or deliver the electricity produced or distributed by its electric works constructed, maintained, or operated in accordance with Subsection (1) to a retail customer located beyond its municipal boundary.

(b) A municipality that provides retail electric service to a customer beyond its municipal boundary on or before June 15, 2013, may continue to serve that customer if:

(i) on or before December 15, 2013, the municipality provides the electrical corporation, as defined in Section 54-2-1, that is obligated by its certificate of public convenience and necessity to serve the customer with an accurate and complete verified written notice described in Subsection (3)(c) that identifies each customer served by the municipality beyond its municipal boundary;

(ii) no later than June 15, 2014, the municipality enters into a written filing agreement for the provision of electric service with the electrical corporation; and

(iii) the Public Service Commission approves the written filing agreement in accordance with Section 54-4-40.

(c) The municipality shall include in the written notice required in Subsection (3)(b)(i) for each customer:

(i) the customer's meter number;

(ii) the location of the customer's meter by street address, global positioning system coordinates, metes and bounds description, or other similar method of meter location;

(iii) the customer's class of service; and

(iv) a representation that the customer was receiving service from the municipality on or before June 15, 2013.

(4) The written filing agreement entered into in accordance with Subsection (3)(b)(ii) shall require the following:

(a) The municipality shall provide electric service to a customer identified in accordance with Subsection (3)(b)(i) unless the municipality and the electrical corporation subsequently agree in writing that the electrical corporation will provide electric service to the customer.

(b) If a customer who is located outside the municipal boundary and who is not identified in accordance with Subsection (3)(b)(i) requests service from the municipality after June 15, 2013, the municipality may not provide that customer electric service unless the municipality submits a request to and enters into a written agreement with the electric corporation in accordance with Subsection (5).

(5) (a) A municipality may submit to the electrical corporation a request to provide electric service to an electric customer described in Subsection (4)(b).

(b) If a municipality submits a request, the electrical corporation shall respond to the request within 60 days.

(c) If the electrical corporation agrees to allow the municipality to provide electric service to the customer:

(i) the electrical corporation and the municipality shall enter into a written agreement;

(ii) the municipality shall agree in the written agreement to subsequently transfer service to the customer described in Subsection (4)(b) if the electrical corporation notifies, in writing, the municipality that the electrical corporation has installed a facility capable of providing electric service to the customer; and

(iii) the municipality may provide the service if the Public Service Commission approves the agreement in accordance with Section 54-4-40.

(d) The municipality or the electrical corporation may terminate the agreement for the provision of electric service if the Public Service Commission imposes a condition authorized in Section 54-4-40 that is a material change to the agreement.

(6) If the municipality and electrical corporation make a transfer described in Subsection (5)(c)(ii):

(a) (i) the municipality shall transfer the electric service customer to the electrical corporation; and

(ii) the electrical corporation shall provide electric service to the customer; and

(b) the municipality shall transfer a facility in accordance with and for the value as provided in Section 10-2-421.

(7) (a) In accordance with Subsection (7)(b), the municipality shall establish a reasonable mechanism for resolving potential future complaints by an electric customer located outside its municipal boundary.

(b) The mechanism shall require:

(i) that the rates and conditions of service for a customer outside the municipality's boundary are at least as favorable as the rates and conditions of service for a similarly situated customer within the municipality's boundary; and

(ii) if the municipality provides a general rebate, refund, or other payment to a customer located within the municipality's boundary, that the municipality also provide the same general rebate, refund, or other payment to a similarly situated customer located outside the municipality's boundary.

(8) The municipality is relieved of any obligation to transfer a customer described in Subsection (4)(b) or facility used to serve the customer in accordance with Subsection (5)(c)(ii) if the municipality annexes the property on which the customer is being served.

(9) (a) A municipality may provide electric service outside of its municipal boundary to a facility that is solely owned and operated by the municipality for municipal service.

(b) A municipality's provision of electric service to a facility that is solely owned and operated by the municipality does not expand the municipality's electric service area.

(10) Nothing in this section expands or diminishes the ability of a municipality to enter into a wholesale electrical sales contract with another municipality that serves electric customers to sell and deliver wholesale electricity to the other municipality.

(11) {—A—} Except as provided in Subsection (12), a municipality's actions under this section related to works or systems involving public telecommunications services or cable television services are subject to the requirements of Chapter 18, Municipal Cable Television and Public Telecommunications Services Act.

(2) Each lobbyist who obtains a license under this section shall update the licensure information when the lobbyist accepts employment for lobbying by a new client.

(3) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (4), the lieutenant governor shall grant a lobbying license to an applicant who:

(i) files an application with the lieutenant governor that contains the information required by this section; and

(ii) pays a ~~-\$100-~~ \$110 filing fee.

(b) A license entitles a person to serve as a lobbyist on behalf of one or more principals and expires on December 31 of each even-numbered year.

(4) (a) The lieutenant governor may disapprove an application for a lobbying license:
