

OPERATION RIO GRANDE FUNDING AND PERFORMANCE UPDATE

SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE STAFF: MADDY ORITT

ISSUE BRIEF

This brief reviews the background of Operation Rio Grande, funding commitments for the \$15.4 million appropriated to the project, current funding requests, and performance. This brief is for informational purposes only and requires no legislative action.

BACKGROUND: LEGISLATION AND FUNDING

In August 2017, state and local government began a homeless services initiative, known as Operation Rio Grande, to assist the existing homeless services system and target those members of the population in greatest need of assistance, while reducing criminal activity in and around the current downtown shelter. This initiative was intended as a transition program, following the decision to build three new resource centers to replace the downtown shelter by July 1, 2019. This transition initiative covers a wide range of areas, including law enforcement, substance abuse treatment, the justice system, and housing and employment counseling. This is a multi-jurisdictional effort, bringing together state, county, and city governments. Each government would fund a portion of the total cost of the program.

H.B. 1001, "Operation Rio Grande Funding Amendments" was passed in the 2017 1st Special Session to provide stop-gap funding until the Legislature could convene in the 2018 General Session. In this bill, \$4.9 million was transferred from Department of Corrections nonlapsing balances to the Department of Workforce Services (DWS) Operation Rio Grande line item. This bill granted DWS authority to "transfer or divert money to another department, agency, institution, or division only for the purpose of law enforcement, adjudication, corrections, and providing and addressing services for homeless individuals and families," through the end of FY 2019.

During the 2018 General Session, the Legislature appropriated \$10 million in new General Fund and \$500,000 in transfers from General Assistance to DWS to continue this program through the end of FY 2019. Ongoing costs associated with law enforcement, services, and treatment expansion that will continue beyond the end of FY 2019 have been separated by relevant agency; funding requests to be considered during the 2019 General Session for these costs will be discussed below.

FUNDING COMMITMENTS

The \$15.4 million appropriated for Operation Rio Grande has been committed to the following entities.

The agency uses of funding are described in the table below.

Agency	Description
Department of Public Safety (DPS)	Law enforcement support for Operation Rio Grande.
Housing Authority of the County of Salt Lake (HACSL)	 Permanent Supportive Housing for the Shelter Plus Care program, a HUD-funded program that provides rental assistance in connection with supportive services. Assists hard-to-serve homeless individuals with disabilities and their families. Primarily includes those with serious mental illness, chronic problems with drugs/alcohol, and HIV/AIDS/other diseases.
Salt Lake Community Action Program d/b/a Utah Community Action (UCA)	 Housing Safety Net Connection and Short Term Support Program to apply a diversion assessment to referred individuals engaging in homeless services in the Rio Grande vicinity.
Department of Human Services (DHS) - Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health (DSAMH) (subcontracted to Salt Lake County) DHS - DSAMH	 New program under ORG to place people in affordable housing while receiving treatment for substance abuse. Program pays housing costs for eligible clients while they look for employment (up to three months). Also includes transportation, skills development, resume and interview preparations. One Assertive Community Outreach Treatment (ACOT) team
Catholic Community Services (CCS)	 Extended hours at the Weigand Homeless Resource Center Due to establishment of the Safe Space surrounding the Weigand Center.
Department of Administrative Services (DAS), Division of Facilities Construction and Management (DFCM)	Operation Rio Grande Leased Area
DHS - DSAMH	 New Assertive Community Outreach Treatment (ACOT) team and funding for an existing Cooperative Agreement to Benefit Homeless Individuals (CABHI) outreach team CABHI is a federal grant program through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the Center for Mental Health Services, and the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Goal is to improve behavioral health and housing coordination and provide services, permanent supportive housing, and access to public health benefits for chronically homeless individuals and veterans with behavioral health disorders across the Wasatch Front.
Volunteers of America (VOA)	One case management team to provide housing case management for the Shelter Plus Care program (see description above).






OVERALL OUTCOME: Improve public safety and order in the Rio Grande area.




